THE SCHOOL BOARD

Arrangement made with Trustees of the Madras School

The City School Trustees held their monthly meeting yesterday afternoon and decided to take over the Madras school building for the next term, and retain the services of Miss Annie Pinder as teacher. This matter came up at a special meeting of the board held a fortnight ago, and was referred to a committee composed of Messrs. Kitchen, Sharkey and Van Wart. The original proposal of the trustees of the Madras school was that the city should have the use of the building until the 1st of July next, on condition that the two teachers, Misses Sherman and Pinder, be retained until that time at the same salary. The committee thought that the city would not be justified in going quite so far, and the church authorities finally consented to make some modifications. They asked the school board to retain the services of Miss Pinder only, and to pay the salary of the janitor of the building until the end of January. This proposal was accepted by the committee, and was ratified by the full board yesterday.

The board, after some discussion, decided to use the Madras school building for the Sloyd department, and to appoint Miss Pinder to the Charlotte street school. She is to have the room now being used for the Sloyd purposes. Her salary will be \$100, including the government grant. The new arrangement will go into effect at the beginning of next term.

Miss Pinder will take the pupils of the 5th and 6th grades, now attending the Madras school and the others will be distributed among the other departments.

Mr. Daniel Elliott was awarded a contract to supply sixty cords of two foot wood at \$5.37 per cord.

A vote of thanks was tendered Mrs. G. E. Coulthard for the gift of a large map of the province.

Mr. F. A. Good, of the high school staff, was voted the usual allowance for the use of chemicals.

A letter was read from Mr. John E. Page, of the model school, stating that the children of Mr. T. Amos Wilson, recently transferred to his department from the Charlotte street school, were not sufficiently advanced in their work and would have to be again transferred. The matter was left in the hands of the secretary to deal with.
