HUSBAND KILLED HER.

Coroner's Jury in Davidd Case Places Responsibility for Woman's Murder on Prisoner in Jail Here.

EVIDENCE AND VERDICT AT THE WOODSTOCK ENQUIRY.

Murderer Had Threatened His Victim Before Leaving that Town.

Woodstock, N. B., July 12.—(Special)—The inquest over the remains of Mrs. Julia Davidd was held in the coroner's chamber last night, before Coroner W. W. Hay, Solicitor-General Jones representing the Crown. The following jury were empanelled: J. J. Plummer, Isaac Draper, William Lilly, John Cogger, C. R. Watson, Hugh Dalling and John E. Leard.

THE TESTIMONY.

David Had Threatened His Wife in Presence of Witness.

KALKI ALBOND.

Kalki Albond, (sworn): Said he lived in Woodstock, knew the deceased since June 5th. Saw her in the hospital after she was shot. Drs. Butler and Rankine, of Woodstock, were present. Never knew Thomas Davidd until last Saturday. He made no threats against his wife in my presence. I understand Jim Andrews told him to leave her alone and he said he had a 32 revolver that he would use if she would not return with him. I was in the hospital when she died, at 28 minutes to five on Wednesday afternoon. Before her husband on Sunday she told me that he had threatened to kill her. I asked him if that was so, and he said he did not mean it, he was joking. She told me she came from Lowell, Mass., and on Sunday in her husband's presence she told me that she would not go with him as she was afraid he would shoot her.

SADIE PORTER.

Sadie Porter, (sworn): said she was captain of the Salvation Army in Woodstock. Was in McAdam on Monday morning on her way to St.

John, N. B. Noticed the man Mrs. Davidd called her husband shoot her. The first shot was fired with the revolver pointed at her. Also heard the second shot. Saw the man that did the shooting arrested by Policeman Gardiner. Heard his name was Davidd, (his last name). Was there until Dr. Butler came and took charge of the case. I took off her clothes and saw the wounds and assisted the doctors. I then went to St. John.

DR. GRANT.

Dr. N. P. Grant, (sworn): said he was medical doctor in Woodstock at present on the hospital staff. First he saw deceased on Monday, when, through a telephone message, he went there. Doctors Butler and Rankine, were present. Found Julia Davidd suffering from the bullet wound on the lower right portion of the groin. Patient was conscious, not suffering much pain but her general condition was very good. The two other doctors and myself had a consultation and decided not to operate at that time.

Next day we did the same and found that the ball entered the abdominal cavity and perforated the bowels in six places. In such cases, as a rule, the wound causes death. If the bullet had not touched the bowels she might have got better. I was not present when she died. Was present at the post mortem held today.

THE VERDICT.

After a careful consideration, the jury under Foreman Plummer rendered the following verdict:

"That the said Julia Davidd came to her death from the effects of a wound caused by a bullet from a revolver in the hands of her husband, Tom Davidd, while in the ladies' waiting room of the C.P.R. at McAdam Junction on Monday last."

SHAMEFULLY TREATED.

St. John Hotels Drew Color Line Against Distinguished American Educationalist and his Family, who had to Sleep in Electric Light Station.

St. John, N. B., July 12.—(Special)—St. Rosewell Roles, a prominent colored American educationalist, who here in the interests of the Belleville, Virginia, industrial and training school, arrived last night from St. Stephen, accompanied by his wife and Miss Clement, teachers in the school, and two small children. They were directed to the Hotel Edward, where they called, but were refused admission. After being turned down by several other hotels, because they were colored, they wandered about the streets

till three o'clock this morning when they were taken by a policeman to the electric light station where they stayed till daylight.

Miss Clement slept on a bed of engine packing with one of the children, the other boy slept on a table, and Mr. and Mrs. Roles in chairs. One of the men gave them his lunch and made tea for them.

All are now with Rev. Mr. Johnson, pastor of St. Philips A. M. E. church, Queen street.

Mr. Roles thinks this is hard lines to be thus treated in towns under British rule.

ORANGE CELEBRATION.

Ottawa, Ontario, July 12.—(Special)—The Orangemen of Ottawa this morning sent delegates from all the local lodges to participate in the Smith's Falls celebration.

There was no demonstration in Ottawa.

The disorders which were promised at Buckingham, have not materialized. The Orangemen condemned the proclamation of Mayor Kelly, forbidding the holding of an Orange procession. They say that they never intended to have it, and if they had there would have been no occasion for trouble.

MURDERER CAPTURED.

Whaler Captain who Brutally Slew an Officer on his Ship four Years Ago in the Hands of Justice.

QUESTION AS TO JURISDICTION IN HIS TRIAL.

Ottawa, Ontario, July 12.—(Special)—A whaling captain has been arrested for a crime which is four years old, and the Canadian and United States authorities have now to decide under which authority he will be tried.

Word reached Ottawa this morning from San Francisco that Captain Klengenber, commanded of an American whaler, had been arrested and was being taken to that port.

The United States and Canadian officials have been after him for four years.

The man will be tried for murdering his first mate in Arctic waters, at the mouth of the Mackenzie river four years ago on an American vessel.

According to the justice department here, the murder was a most brutal one.

Klengenber, who seems to be a replica of the "Sea Wolf" of fiction, terrorized his crew for months and ill-treated his first officer, finally shooting the latter in cold blood.

He then frightened the crew into making false affidavits in the log book as to how the victim met his death.

The story leaked out afterwards in San Francisco. It is not known whether Klengenber will be tried by the American or Canadian authorities, as no particulars as to how he was captured have so far been received.

THE STOCK MARKET.

Tone Was Stronger Today—Montreal Power on the Rise—Dominion Coal Weaker.

Montreal, July 12.—(Special)—The tone of the stock market was stronger today, but trading was slack.

The strength may be due however more to the absence of pressure to sell than anything else.

Montreal Power which was a strong feature in yesterday's late trading on reports of probable increase in dividend to 6 per cent. opened with small fraction higher at 93½, but failed to move higher. Later it sold to level of yesterday's close at 94½. Dominion coal which developed some weakness yesterday, under selling pressure, was firmer at 57, compared with 56 yesterday. Toronto railway changed hands at 102.
