## New Brunswick Western Association in Annual Session at Woodstock.

Woodstock, N.B., July 11.—Beautiful Woodstock was at its fairest when the second annual meeting of the association of United Baptist churches of New Brunswick opened yesterday morning at ten o'clock. Rev. Jos. McLeod, D. D., moderator, was in the chair, and Rev. Wellington Camp of St. John, led the devotional exercises.

The moderator, in his address, spoke of the aims of the meeting and urged upon the association great care in their deliberations because of the interests involved. Union was a success. The United Baptists are now at least twice as large as the next largest Protestant denomination. Not only was the matter of union not only a matter of pride but also a call to greater service because of their added responsibilities. He pleaded for an utter consecration to God.

F. W. Emmerson, secretary of the association executive, reported two meetings during the year. They recommended: That the home mission executive be composed of associated executive with three additional members from St. John, and that this committee be elected by ballot without nomination.

That salaries under the minimum salary plan be increased to the extent of some \$100 to \$150.

After correspondence with pastoral schools in England five men were recommended by their pastors. All legacies shall hereafter be payable to this organization.

Communications were received from the fifth district requesting a change in its boundaries; from the sixth district urging the institution of a course of Sunday school teacher training and bible study. From Dr. Manning informing the association of his retirement from his position as missionary secretary-treasurer and extending thanks for kindness received; from the Fredericton church requesting the ordination of Fred S. Porter and Malcolm Orchard.

C. S. Wallace, of Aylesford, N.S., was invited to a seat on the association.

The Woman's Missionary Society

met also at ten o'clock, the president Miss Augusta Slipp, in the chair.

Mrs. C. W. Weyman, corresponding secretary, presented a report showing a most prosperous year at home and abroad. The outlook is most hopeful.

After the appointment of committees and discussion as to their work, this afternoon the association listened to a sermon by Rev. A. A. Rideout, pastor at Fredericton. He preached on "The Disciplining of Nations."

A letter was read from the association at Visnagar, India, to this association, reporting great things accomplished during the past year.

There was interest in religious teachings, large attendance at the meetings, many professing conversion and being baptized. They were very much pleased with the visit of J. S. Simms, of St. John. India seems in possession of an advance movement and the future seems very hopeful. The letter was signed by Elizabeth E. Gaunce, late of Kings county, N. B.

In the women's meeting the constitution and powers of the provincial ministers' association were considered. The district reports were received. They were of an encouraging nature.

Mrs. W. E. McIntyre, of St. John, conducted a count table on mission band work. There was then an interesting address on foreign mission work by Miss Harrison, a returned missionary. The officers elected were as follows: Mrs. C. W. Weyman, Apohaqui, president; Mrs. McMaster, St. John, vice-president; Mrs. Cox, Anagance, corresponding secretary; Miss Lydia Fullerton, St. John, recording secretary; Mrs. J. W. Clarke, Sussex, treasurer; Mrs. W. E. McIntyre, St. John, mission band superintendent.

Last evening the association was addressed by Rev. Wellington Camp, of St. John, on "Sunday School Work," Rev. H. G. Dockrell, of Moncton, on "Men's Work," and by Prof. Tufts, of Acadia College, on "The Educational Institutions of Wolfville, N. S."

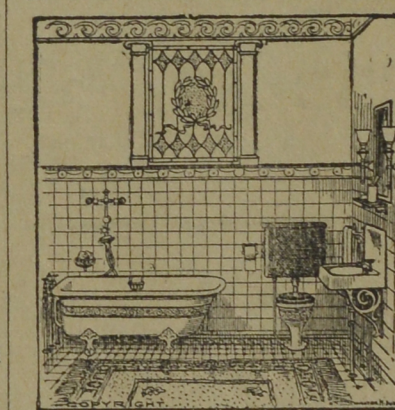

### THE TOT WAS TAGGED.

Arthur Horne, Aged Nine Years Travelled by Himself From England.

Tagged like an ordinary sack of flour, but very much alive and curious little bit of baggage arrived in Toronto, with the last shipment of English immigrants. This was little Arthur Horne, perhaps the most youthful of all the homeseekers leaving the Old Land, absolutely alone, to make his fortune in Canada. In the buttonhole of his coat was fastened the tag, on one side of which was his name, and on the other, a sentence or two asking conductors and vesselmen to see that the little fellow arrived safely in Kingsville, where his aunt, Mrs. Atkinson, awaited him.

Apparently about five years old, the youthful traveler claimed to be nine. He told the News that he came from Liverpool, sailing on the steamship, "Tunisian." He was not at all down hearted, and talked and smiled as cheerfully as if he were crossing the road for a friendly call.

About three hundred came with him, arriving in Toronto Saturday night and Sunday morning. Only about half of these remained in the city, the others going to Western parts of the province.
