COBALT STRIKE.

Prospect of Settlement at Some Mines—Others are Hopeless and Men Leaving in Large Numbers.

Ottawa, July 12—(Special)—A telegram from Cobalt received by the Labor department from F. A. Ackland, secretary of the department, states that negotiations are now proceeding between the mine owners and the men in a few of the larger mines looking to a speedy adjustment of the strike.

In the other mines however, there is no prospect of any settlement and the miners are leaving the district in large numbers.

THE LAST SAD TRIBUTE.

The funeral of the late Miss Helen W. Coulthard took place from the home of her parents, Waterloo Row at 3.30 o'clock this afternoon and had a very large and representative attendance, the greatest sympathy being manifested. Rev. J. W. McConnell conducted a very impressive service at the house, after which the remains, which were enclosed in a beautiful white plush casket with silver mountings, were borne to the hearse, and the long funeral cortege being formed slowly wended its way to the rural cemetery where interment was made in the family lot. The chief mourners were: W. B. Coulthard, John J. Weddall, J. W. Spurden, O. H. Sharp, W. S. Benson, C. H. Lee, P. G. Hall and D. Lee Babbitt. Undertaker John G. Adams was the funeral director.

CAPTURED A DRUNK.

A stranger, carrying a rather heavy bag created some excitement near the Fredericton end of the highway bridge at noon today. He imagined he was a millionaire for the time being, and was making things very lively when Policeman Phillips arrived in response to a telephone message, and placed him under arrest. THAT SPUR LINE.

A party of C. P. R. engineers are at work today surveying a route for the proposed spur line to the Aberdeen mill site by way of Smythe street. The distance by the route already surveyed across the Odell property is exactly one mile, and by the alternate route suggested it will be a mile and a half. There are no serious engineering difficulties on either route but it goes without saying that the line could be constructed by way of the Odell property much more cheaply than by the other route. In either case it cannot be built without encroaching on private property.

Why a Swelling Follows a Blow.

The swelling which follows from a blow is nature's effort to protect the part from further injury and to keep it at rest while repair is going on. What actually takes place at the seat of injury is not even now quite understood. The injury to the smaller blood vessels interferes with the flow of blood through them, and the white corpuscles, with part of the serum, the watery part of the blood, escape into the surrounding tissues. At the same time the blood vessels in the neighborhood dilate, and the increased flow of blood with the thoroughfare obstructed increases the swelling. It is probable that the white corpuscles of the blood pass into the tissues to assist in the repair, as bees or ants assemble at an injury to their storehouse, but with this difference—that the substance of the corpuscles is probably converted into the tissue of repair. From one point of view the human body is only one gigantic colony of individuals and the swelling that follows injury but the rush of these to repair the breach.

A Quaint Scotch Wedding Custom.

A quaint wedding custom still prevails in many of the little country towns and mining villages in Scotland. When a wedding is held the contracting parties make their guests pay in full for the eating, drinking and dancing facilities which are usually provided on such occasions. The practice still seems to survive even in Glasgow. A correspondent observed a notice posted up in the Cowcaddens, a low class Glasgow thoroughfare, informing the public that a soldier would shortly enter into the bonds of wedlock and that twopenny would be charged for admission to the ceremony and an additional sixpence imposed for attendance at the wedding feast. The practice seems to be peculiarly Scotch, but sixpence certainly seems moderate enough for a marriage supper.—Westminster Gazette.
