

THE GOVERNOR GENERAL

Pen Sketch of His Excellency's Public Career, Family, etc.—Countess Grey and Her Helpful Sympathy With Her Illustrious Husband

The governor-general of Canada, Albert Henry George Grey, fourth Earl Grey, today an honored visitor in Fredericton, comes of a distinguished family. His ancestors rendered good service to the state, sometimes on the field of battle, sometimes in the field of government.

His grandfather was the second Earl who sat for over twenty years in the House of Commons, was a Lord of the Admiralty in the Pitt administration, Secretary of Foreign Affairs and afterwards Prime Minister. His uncle, the third Earl, was for six years—1846 to 1851—Secretary of State for the Colonies, and in that period his name was in constant circulation in these provinces. On the death of the third Earl without a direct successor, the title came to the present Lord Grey, whose father was Hon. Charles Grey, a general in the army and a son of the second Earl.

The present Earl was born on November 25, 1851, was educated at Harrow School and at Trinity College, Cambridge, graduating with honors in 1873. Of course it was the most natural thing in the world for a member of the Grey family to turn his attention to politics, and in 1878 Arthur Grey ran for the south division of Northumberland as a Liberal, and he got the majority of the votes, but was unseated on a technicality. In 1880 he again ran and was again successful and sat in the parliament of 1880-1885 as a supporter of Mr. Gladstone's administration, and was returned at the general election of 1885 for the Tyneside division of the same county.

On the introduction of the Gladstonian home rule policy he joined the ranks of the liberal unionists, and, in offering himself for re-election on Mr. Gladstone's appeal to the country, was defeated. He did not again sit in the commons, and in 1894 succeeded to the peerage by his uncle's death.

It was just as natural for Earl—then Mr. Grey, to take an interest in colonial affairs as it was for him to enter politics. The third Earl had given much attention to these affairs as Colonial Secretary and had taken the strong position that the colonies should be governed for their own welfare, and not simply for the benefit of the mother country and the colonies working in constant harmony for the whole empire, with perhaps, the idea that they will then dominate the world.

When the third Earl died the present Earl was in South Africa studying the somewhat critical situation which was then coming about in that region. "From the experience he there gained," says a contemporary writer, "his reputation as a cautious and capable man, and his imperial sympathies, he was looked on as the most suitable successor so the late Cecil Rhodes, as administrator of the Rhodesia, and he acted in that capacity during 1896-97. It was under his regime that the Matabele rising took place and was finally quelled, and the Earl was largely instrumental in arranging the basis of settlement which has resulted in the stability and progress of that important district of South Africa."

When the Governor-Generalship of Canada became vacant in 1904 on the retirement of the Earl of Minto—whose wife is Earl Grey's sister—the attention of leading men, both in Canada and England, was turned to Lord Grey, as a man eminently fitted to succeed to the position, and he was accordingly appointed.

It is the simple truth to

say that he has discharged his duties of office to the entire satisfaction of the people north and south, east and west. He has studied the conditions of the country, he has manifested deep interest in the concerns of all its sections, he has used his influence to promote good feeling, and he has so arranged public affairs that government has steadily proceeded along the lines of the well understood wishes of the people; and his influence has been thrown in favor of measures looking to the social well-being of the Dominion. In Canada in such matter as prison reform, with special reference to the conditions of the jails, he has been quite active, and in the mother country his efforts to promote temperance by the conversion of the bar into a real home of refreshment, and so administering the license laws that these laws should not be of advantage to the vendor, attracted a great deal of attention. "The Central Public House Trust Association" absorbed quite a number of the ordinary licensed houses with it, it is believed, much gain man of active mind and much energy, His Excellency is constantly employed. His principal work in Canada has been to strengthen the ties between the mother country and the colonies and he makes every Canadian feel that he is truly a citizen of a great empire.

A man of a kindly happy nature, the governor-general is very much liked by all who know him personally. It is not, perhaps, necessary to distinguish His Excellency by all the titles which adorn his name when he is summoning parliament or on like occasions, but the fact may be mentioned that he is Lord Lieutenant of the County of Northumberland, and a Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George.

In 1877 His Excellency married Alice, daughter of Mr. Robert S. Holford, of Gloucestershire. They have had five children, three of whom are living. Their youngest child, a daughter, died when quite young, in 1895. Their eldest daughter, Lady Victoria, born in 1878, married in 1901 to Mr. Arthur Norton Grenfell, died less than a year ago.

The other members of the family are Viscount Howick (Chas. Robert Grey) in the Life Guards born in 1879; Lady Sybil Grey, born in 1882; Lady Evelyn Alice Grey, born in 1886. At Ottawa the vice-regal family is much liked. The delicate health of Her Excellency Lady Grey has prevented her from taking as active a part in the varied forms of life as some of her predecessors at the Canadian capital have taken, but she is kind, sympathetic and ever ready to assist in beneficent and philanthropic work of which there is so much to do in Canada. As a result she is greatly beloved.

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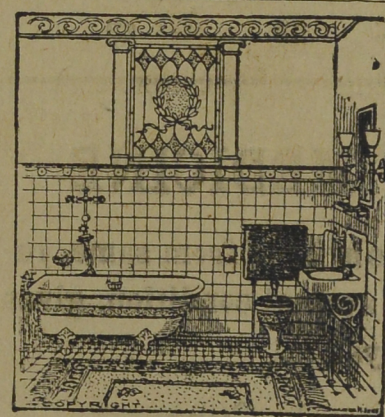
