WELCOME

The Herald, speaking in the name and on behalf of the loyal citizens of Fredericton, bids Earl Grey, governor-general of Canada, Countess Grey, and the members of their family a hearty welcome to the capital city of New Brunswick.

In the Countess Grey, His Excellency has a helpmate, who is quite as anxious as he is himself to mingle with the people to learn their hopes and ambitions to assist in their endeavors, and do what is within her power to forward the best interests of the country and the inhabitants.

Welcome then, thrice welcome to His Excellency and Lady Grey, and may they like us so well that they will find time before leaving Canada to make a more extended visit to this old city of the Loyalists than which the distinguished visitors will find none more beautiful and dutiful in all Canada.

CULTIVATING MCKANE

Mr. McKane had better tie up his purse strings and sit tight, because Mr. Hazen's Fredericton organ is evidently preparing for another descent on the north shore millionaire.

In half a column of sickening laudation of the new Tory financial nabob, Mr. Hazen's organ lays the foundation for a renewed assault on the McKane treasury, which is expected for the next few years to keep all New Brunswick Toryism afloat.

Mr. McKane is indeed regarded as the good Tory godmother, who, when her obedient child-

ren cry out for help, will rain a golden shower into their capacious laps.

How did New Brunswick and Canada possibly pull through before Mr. McKane struck it rich in the Nevada mines? But stop. Mr. McKane seeks no political preferment (?) How long since. How many years have elapsed since he was a Tory candidate for Parliament in a western constituency and got soundly beaten.

Mr. McKane is a shrewd business man, so his Tory worshippers say, he has been a lucky, speculator at any rate, but he is not spending his money without hope of future reward. The Tories will promise him a senatorship, the governorship, or anything else if he will continue to pour out his wealth in the support of needy Tory newspapers, and for needy Tory politicians, but it will be a long time before the promises can be redeemed.

The Tories are indeed boasting that Mr. McKane will put enough money into the next New Brunswick election to smash the Liberal party, but the Russell syndicate of Montreal tried that in 1904 and miserably failed to deliver the goods.

In the meantime, Mr. McKane is being eloquently written up in the subservient and needy Tory newspapers as one of the greatest things on earth, and he will be expected to launch out freely to keep the Tory pens well greased.

A DISTINGUISHED MAN

Dr. James A. McLellan, who died at Toronto Sunday, was an eminent educationalist, whom the Maritime Provinces gave to Ontario. The deceased gentleman was a native of Shubenacadie, N. S., where he was born in 1832. After teaching school in his native province for a few years, he removed to Ontario, graduated at Toronto University, and held many important positions in the educational life of the premier province, his last office being that of principal of the normal school at Hamilton. He was an L.L.D., of Toronto University and a man universally respected. The Toronto News pays the following tribute to the memory of the deceased:

"For many years Dr. J. A. McLellan was recognized as an educationalist of more than ordinary ability. His work for the province of Ontario will be undying, for he did much both by precept and example to raise the standard of the teaching profession. Gifted with the scientific temperament, he was an excellent organizer, a careful and indefatigable student and a man of study and unbending rectitude. He had the respect of the thousands of teachers who came under his instruction or influence, and his work as a whole was to lay broad and deep foundations upon which others will build. His career was a credit to himself and to his adopted province."

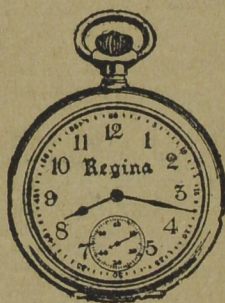

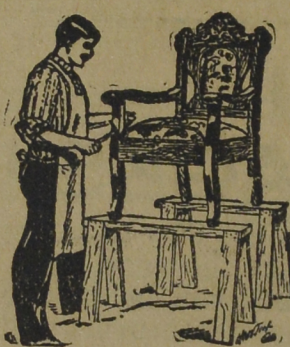
