

DISTRICT MEETING

Methodists of Fredericton Jurisdiction
in Session at Boiestown

The financial district meeting of the Fredericton district was called in the Methodist church at Boiestown on Tuesday, Sept. 3.

The chairman of the district, Rev. J. C. Berrie, presided. The following ministers and laymen were present: Revs. J. W. McConnell, W. B. Thomas, E. Ramsay, J. A. Ives, J. K. King, W. R. Pepper, W. J. Kirby, A. C. Bell and Messrs. C. L. Ward, R. L. Young, S. Bird and Asa Currie.

The session opened with exercises of unusual interest and profit, after which the morning session was devoted to the consideration of the financial interests of the semi-independent circuits and the missions of the district. Every circuit and mission showed a satisfactory increase in the estimates for the year amounting to a total of \$226.

The Nashwaak, through the faithful and energetic service of the pastor, the Rev. E. Ramsay, and the large liberality of the people, has passed from the semi-independent to the status of an independent circuit, and in the future will pay its full requirements.

The district passed unanimously a most flattering resolution in commendation of the liberal spirit of the people and the splendid work done by the pastor in bringing up all the interests of the circuit. During the past two years a debt of \$500 has been paid on the church at Covered Bridge. Over three hundred dollars has been expended on the parsonage property, besides improvements made on other churches, amounting to about \$350. The ladies have placed in the bank nearly \$200 towards the erection of a new church at Taymouth.

EPIDEMIC IN TORONTO.

Supposed to Result From Some Article of Drink.

TORONTO, Ont., September 4.—Toronto was visited yesterday by an outbreak of a peculiar epidemic, which attacked a number of citizens, rendering many unconscious, and from the after effects of which some are still suffering. The disease is not unlike sleeping sickness, but in many cases is accompanied by violent paroxysms of rage, and in others by nausea. Optical illusions form a typical

symptom in all the reported cases. It selected for its victims as a rule the strong and hearty, and few cases of women, and none of children are reported.

The patrol wagon at No. 1 police station made forty-two trips before midnight, and several after, frequently collecting several patients enroute. It is rumored that the epidemic is the result of something that the victims have taken in their food or drink, which seems probable from its widespread attacks.

SHOT A POLICEMAN.

New Jersey Burglar Killed Man Who Arrested Him.

LINDHURST, N. J., Sept. 4.—George Cassidy, a policeman, was shot and killed today while endeavoring to arrest two burglars who had been caught in the act of robbing a store. The burglars were pursued by a crowd, and rather than submit to capture, one of them killed himself in a swamp. The other burglar escaped.

Cassidy had arrested the men and started with his prisoners for the station house, when one of them whipped a revolver from his pocket, and, pressing it against Cassidy's coat, pulled the trigger.

Cassidy fell dead, and the two men ran away. The noise of the shooting aroused the neighborhood, and a crowd gave chase. The burglars separated, one of them making for the Passaic River.

When the crowd pressed too close the burglar turned and fired a fusillade of shots, but no one was hit. The burglar ran into the swamp, trying to find a place where he could swim the river, but the mud and slime dragged him down and he became exhausted in his efforts to escape. Realizing that he would be captured he used the last cartridge in his revolver and shot himself. He was dead when his pursuers found him.

GATES FROM CANADA.

London Appreciates the Dominion's Splendid Gift.

LONDON, September 3.—It is seldom that a public gift has met with more general appreciation than the contribution of the Dominion of Canada to the Queen Victoria memorial. Who first suggested the happy thought of adding to the architectural beauties of London by giving, not some second-rate statue of marble or bronze, or even some pretentious building, but a splendid gateway, does not seem to be known, but whoever it may have been deserves the deep gratitude of the people of the city.

The gates are now in position at the end of the new road through the Green Park, to the immediate left of Buckingham palace. In the scheme of the Queen Victoria memorial they form one of the live outlets from the circle now known as Queen's Gardens, in the centre of which stand Brock's statue of the Queen. The gates will be the means of passing out to Piccadilly. They are of wrought iron, with designs emblematic of the maple leaf. That they are masterpieces of this recently revived art-constructed observer.

A DRESSY AFTERNOON FROCK.

There is always a place in the well appointed feminine wardrobe for a pretty frock that may be worn upon any occasion and at any season of the year, and the model here sketched is a charming realization of such a costume. The waist, simulating the popular over-bloss, is prettily shirred and tucked over a fitted lining, and is finished at the neck with a chemise of all-over lace. Full length sleeves may be substituted for the elbow sleeves shown, in which event the plain lower portions may be covered with lace matching the chemise. The skirt, which can be made in either sweep or round length, owes much of its graceful effect to the circular upper part, which is shirred around the hips and lengthened by the addition of shaped sectional dounce, this also being shirred at wide intervals. Lace insertion is used for trimming, but passementerie or silk braid may be substituted. As pictured, the dress is modelled in pongee colored foulard, figured in golden brown, but voile, cologne, nun's veiling or Henrietta are suitable materials. To develop the medium size 2 1/2 yards of 27 inch goods will be needed for the waist and seven yards of the same width for the skirt.

ELEPHANTS AS FIREMEN.

Jumbo's Mother Saved Man From Burning Wreck.

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—The Tribune has received the following despatch from Wheeling, W. Va.: Bacil, an elephant, over two hundred years old, said to be the mother of the famous Jumbo, owned by the John Robinson circus, saved a man from death yesterday. A freight train on the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad had been wrecked near Morgantown and the engineer was caught underneath. The wreck caught fire, and it seemed that the man was doomed.

Two sections following the wrecked train having aboard the circus coming up, Bacil lifted the wreckage with her trunk from the body of the engineer, and he was taken out just as the flames reached him. Eight other elephants were organized into a fire department, and, going to the Monongahela River, filled their trunks with water and extinguished the burning cars.

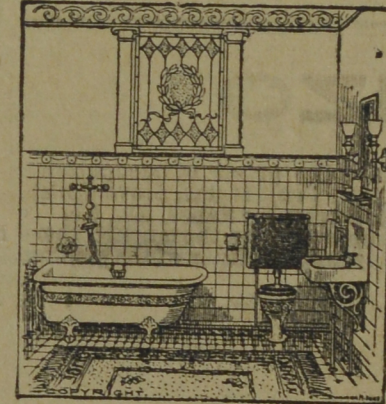
