The Ohio men attributed their bad shooting to the fact that they used government ammunition. In last week's matches they had especially loaded ammunition. A general exodus from the range began Saturday night. The Palma, or national team, left for Ottawa, Ont., Saturday night at 6.35.

NEW YORK MAN KILLED A BURGLAR.

Latter Tried to Asphyxiate Geo. Verrall's Family: Shot While Escaping.

NEW YORK, September 3.—Caught in the act of attempting to asphyxiate the seven members of George Verrall's family, a burglar who planned to rob the Verrall flat in East 83rd street, was shot and killed today, while endeavoring to make his escape. The cry of a restless infant saved the Verrall family. The burglar made two attempts to asphyxiate the family. He was shot three times by Verrall and instantly killed.

Early today the cry of Mrs. Verrall's infant awoke the mother, who detected the gas. She turned off the open gas jets and aroused her husband and told him of it. He fell asleep again, and Mrs. Verrall retired for the night. She grew restless, and did not close her eyes, and two hours later she again smelled gas. She hurried to the kitchen and found it filled with gas escaping from open

jets. She called to her husband, after finding that her five children were safe, and Verrall went for his revolver. A search was made, and a man was seen trying to escape from an adjoining flat to the fire escape. Verrall fired four shots, three of which struck the burglar, who fell dead as he was trying to get through a window.

All of the Verrall family are ill from the effects of the gas. The police have not yet identified the burglar.

DEATH OF REV. I. E. BILL

Baptist Hospital Visitor Passes Away Suddenly

Toronto Globe: A sudden attack of heart trouble carried off Rev. Ingram E. Bill at an early hour Sunday morning. Mr. Bill, who has been the hospital visitor of the Baptist churches of the city for the past four or five years, was apparently in good health, having been at the exhibition on Friday, and seemed very well on Saturday, but his daughter, happening to awake about 4 o'clock, heard him making some noise as if in pain, and hastened to his bedside. He passed his hand over his heart, saying that he had a strange pain there. She rushed off to get a doctor, but by the time she returned her father was dead, the heart having failed.

A specially sympathetic coincidence was that Rev. Mr. Bill was to have occupied the platform Sunday at Ossington Avenue Baptist church, of which he was a member, along with his son, Rev. I. E. Bill, jr., of Chicago, who was yesterday filling the pulpit in the absence of the pastor, Rev. William J. Scott.

The deceased minister was somewhat advanced in age, being about seventy years old. He was for many years pastor of a church in Nova Scotia, but had been a resident of Toronto for some ten years, being a member of Bloor street Baptist church before moving to the west end.

He made his home with his daughter, Miss Isabella Sears, at 524 Ossington Avenue. He is survived by his wife, his daughter, and his son, a pastor in Chicago, who happens to be visiting here at present.

120 FEET TO DEATH.

Girl's Amazing Leap From a Church Tower.

An extraordinary affair, culminating in a tragic death, occurred in the village of Sagart County of Dublin, Ireland, on Sunday, Aug. 25. At two o'clock in the afternoon a young woman, Minnie Hunt was seen to enter the tower of the Roman Catholic Church, and a few minutes later appeared on the roof, 120 feet above the ground.

A large crowd gathered at the foot of the tower and attempts were made to rescue her, but she had locked the door behind her, and threatened to fling herself down if anyone came near her. The Rev. Father Seaver, however, succeeded in reaching the top of the tower, and came within a few yards of the girl. Each time he approached her she rushed to the parapet.

He then knelt down and prayed, holding aloft a crucifix, which he implored the girl to take hold of. Her only reply was, "We shall meet on the ground." Father Seaver continued to pray for three hours, when the girl suddenly gave a loud cry, threw up her arms, and fell to the ground.

She received terrible injuries, which caused death, and a verdict to this effect was returned at the inquest.
