ONTARIO LIBERALS

New Minister of Railways had a
Heartly Reception at Their Hands

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 5.—The meeting of the Ontario Reform Association was terminated yesterday afternoon by some talk relative to the removal of Hon. George P. Graham from the provincial leadership of the cabinet.

The proceedings of the gathering all morning were harmonious and enthusiastic. Reports, resolutions and addresses were received with acclaim, and Hon. Mr. Aylesworth's statement that Mr. Graham was chosen for cabinet preference because he "was unequalled by any other man in Ontario," passed unchallenged.

Dr. Chamberlain entered stout protest against the way in which the old stalwarts who fought the battles of the party were overlooked when chances of preferment came.

In the course of his presidential address, Mr. Mowat deplored the tendency to independence in some of the Liberal press. Party men, he said, were unappreciative of the uncertainty, and if the party newspapers were to suffer gradual elimination the Liberal party in Ontario would be less well equipped to understand and argue political questions.

Mr. Aylesworth, in his address, said he was no longer the baby minister. He paid a tribute to Mr. Graham as the right man in the right place, and said he had been chosen because he was unequalled by any other man in Ontario. Alluding to the past, Mr. Aylesworth said that no Liberal had any cause to be ashamed of Hon. Mr. Hyman. He had been attacked and vilified in a most unworthy and disgraceful way by the Tory press.

Hon. Mr. Graham promised to devote his attention particularly to Ontario. The outlook was not discouraging in provincial affairs. He urged that members of the legislature to get together at the earliest possible moment and choose one of themselves as their new leader. In the Dominion arena, Mr. Graham would always devote himself most heartily to Ontario. He hoped to assist in securing a majority for Sir Wilfrid Laurier from this province.

Friends of Mackenzie King, deputy minister of labor, feel that he is inclined to enter the political field. The Ontario house offers a better opportunity for a man of his years and talents than the federal house holds out at the present time. The first thing to secure for Mr. King is a seat and the constituencies mentioned are Brockville, from which Mr. Graham has just resigned; North Oxford and Brantford.

Liberals think that Premier Whitney will appeal to the country in June next and while Dominion Liberals hope for two more sessions they would not be surprised if Sir Wilfrid Laurier appealed to the country in September, 1908.
