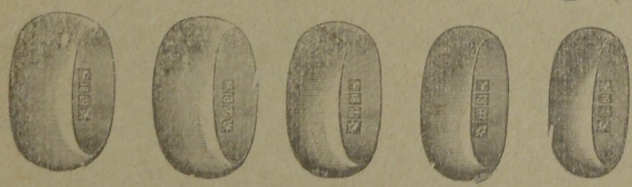

THE BISHOP'S FUNERAL POST OFFICE ROBBERY

Remains Laid to Rest in St. John's Ceme-
tery at Douglas---The Cathedral
Services.

Package Containing \$3,500 Stolen from
North Sydney Office---Officers on
the Scent of Robber.

In the presence of the clergy and the cathedral sidesmen, and next prominent laymen from all parts of the diocese the mortal remains of the late Right Rev. Hollingworth Tully Kingston, Lord Bishop of Fredericton, were committed to their last resting place in the family lot of St. John's cemetery at Nashwaaksis this afternoon. The funeral was one of the largest seen here in many years, and all classes of citizens joined in paying a last tribute of respect to the distinguished prelate. The body of the late bishop lay in state in the chancel of the cathedral from five until nine o'clock last evening, and from nine until one o'clock today, during which time it was viewed by hundreds of people, representing all denominations. The casket rested upon a catafalque with the head inclining upwards. The dead bishop wore his Episcopal robes and mitre, and many people who gazed upon his familiar features were heard to remark on their lifelike and natural appearance. A number of beautiful floral tributes tastefully arranged near the casket, elicited many expressions of admiration.

Since being placed in the cathedral the body had been faithfully guarded by relays of clergy and laymen. The list of those who performed this duty included Rev. Messrs Montgomery, Colston, Scovil and Hooper, and Messrs C. H. Allen, D. B. Winslow, C. H. Fowler, L. A. Joubert, A. F. Street, G. F. Wilkes, S. W. Babbitt, O. H. Sharp, T. C. Allen, G. Y. Dibblee, J. A. Winslow, R. S. Barker, A. A. Shute, John Cameron, L. H. Bliss, C. W. Whelpley, Dr. Steeves, and John Bebbington.

The funeral service began with communion at eight o'clock this morning. His Lordship Bishop Richardson was celebrant, and was assisted by Archdeacons Forsythe and Newnam, Canon Montgomery and Rev. Sub-dean Street. The service was full choral and was of a very impressive nature. There was a large congregation and a number of visiting clergymen were present.

The funeral service proper, which commenced at 2.30 o'clock, was conducted by His Lordship Bishop Richardson, assisted by Bishop Worrell of Nova Scotia. The cathedral was crowded to the doors and the beautiful and impressive service was followed with the greatest interest. Upwards of forty clergymen were present in their official robes, the list including: Rev. Archdeacons Forsythe and Newnam, Canons Hoyt, Hanington, Montgomery and Cowie, and Dr. W. O. Raymond, G. A. Khuring, G. F. Scovil, E. B. Hooper, A. H. Sampson, R. A. Armstrong, and J. E. Hand, St. John; Sub-dean Street, Richard Bole, Fredericton, A. B. Murray, Stanley, H. F. Whalley, Hampton, R. W. Colston, Welsford, W. B. Beliss Westfield, A. W. Smithers, Riverside, J. E. Flewelling, Canterbury, H. H. Gillies, Jernsey, R. L. Carson, Upham, H. E. Dibblee, Oromocto; M. Shewan, Greenwich, Scovil Neales, Sussex, Alder, Woodstock Neales, Richmond, and others.

The service commenced after the singing of hymn 538, "They Whose Course on Earth is O'er," after which Bishop Richardson read psalms 39 and 90, and the lesson read by Bishop Worrell followed. The singing of hymn 236, "Jerusalem, My Happy Home," came next, and was followed by the singing of the nunc dimittis. While the choir was singing the processional hymn "On the Resurrection Morn," the body was conveyed down the centre aisle by the canons and archdeacons and out of the western door to the hearse in waiting.

The members of the cathedral choir in coaches, headed the long procession, which was immediately formed on Church street. Next came the wardens and vestrymen of the parish church, other church corporations, including Oromocto, St. Mary's, Mauerville and Kingsclear. Lay representatives of the Church of England synod came next, including Messrs. A. C. Fairweather, of Rothesay; G. O. D. Otty, of Hampton; and Col. H. M. Campbell, of Apohaqui. They were followed by

NORTH SYDNEY, C. B., October 15.—Not for years has anything caused so much discussion as has the robbery of the post office here on Monday night last, when some daring thief secured a mail bag containing \$3,500.

The facts of the case are that on Monday a package of money containing the amount mentioned, with a label attached marked in large letters "3,500," was sent to the Bank of Nova Scotia agency here for transmission to the head office at Halifax. The money was received at the post office, and about 6.30 o'clock Monday night, Miss McKenzie, the young lady mail clerk, whose duty it is to look after all registered parcels, gathered up the different packages, letters, etc., and placed them in the respective bags, used for the purpose. Miss McKenzie placed the three registered letters for Halifax beside the parcel containing the \$3,500.

The work of sealing the pouches had all been attended to by Miss McKenzie, except the bag containing the bank's \$3,500. While the young lady was engaged in melting the wax with a match, it was extinguished. This annoyed Miss McKenzie, who let the bag drop. Mr. Leadbetter, an employe, however, then took hold of it, and finished the sealing process. What disposition was afterwards made of the bag no person in the office can ever surmise. What actually happened afterwards seems to be a blank. Still nothing was noticed by the clerk and the bag containing the small pouches was placed in the safe, and Tuesday morning was sent to the railway station.

That night the railway clerks, finding the pouch marked on the postal slip was missing, reported the matter to the post office here. A consultation followed, and as nothing irregular was dreamt of by the clerks they decided the bag containing the \$3,500 had been mislaid to Toronto, St. Pierre or Newfoundland. Enquiries expected.

NOVA SCOTIA LIBERALS

Will Give Fielding Grand Reception Tonight.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Dr. Pugsley
to take Part.

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 15.—(Spec-McIlreith and two hundred prominent Liberals of Halifax, who greeted them with rousing cheers as they alighted from their car.

Last night an informal reception was tendered to the Premier and Mr. Fielding at the Halifax Hotel when about one thousand citizens paid their respects to the distinguished visitors.

Liberals are arriving from all over Nova Scotia and P.E. Island, and if the weather is fine to-night's demonstration will be a record breaker.

Hon. William Pugsley and Sir Frederick Borden, who will also speak, arrived today.

The enthusiasm with which the Liberals of the province have responded to the suggestion of a reception, shows that the party was never in finer fettle or more attached to their leaders.

AWFUL RAILWAY WRECK

Sixteen Persons Killed and Many Others Injured by Train Run Off in England.

SHREWSBURY, England, Oct. 15.—road on which the train was running senger coaches bound from Scotland and the north of England to Bristol left the rails on entering the station here early this morning.

Sixteen persons including ten passengers were killed and many injured.

The London and North-western railway on which the train was running curves sharply as it nears Shrewsbury and there is a standing order that the engineers must not exceed a speed of ten miles an hour at this point. It is believed that the order was misunderstood.

Fortunately the wreck did not catch fire, and doctors and salvage corps did not have much difficulty in rescuing the injured.

Several hours elapsed before the last body was taken out.

The killed included the engineer, fireman and mail clerks.

HAS SMALLPOX.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 15.—(Spec was found. A case of smallpox has developed at St. Martins, 30 miles from St. John. The patient will be brought to the St. John isolation hospital. The house has been fumigated and isolated and no spread of the disease is anticipated.

The victim is Rev. Frederick J. Crisp, pastor of the St. Martins Methodist church. He has been ill for a week, but medical aid was not called until yesterday when smallpox of Gibson.)
