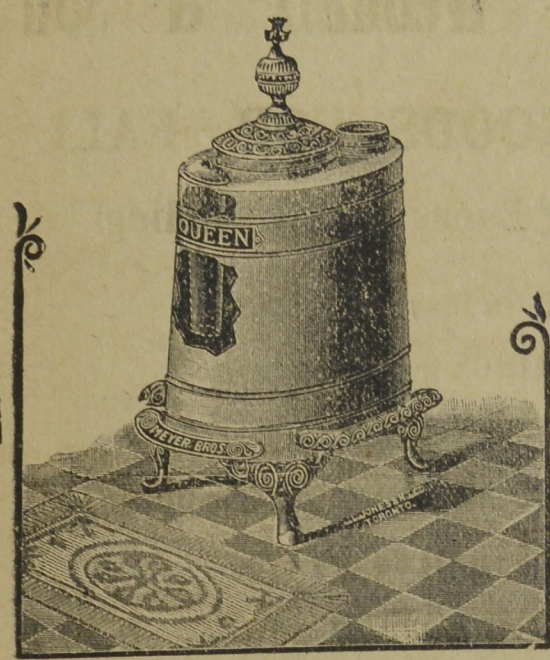

LADY DONEGAL'S ACTIVITY.

Former Frederictonian Organizer Imperial Colonial Club.

LONDON, Oct. 3.—Lady Donegall, appropriately enough the organizer and moving spirit of the new Imperial Colonial Club and Overseas Union, is prominent among the small group of colonial-born peeresses. Daughter of the late Henry St. George Twining, of Halifax, Canada, she married five years ago, when in her very prime, the fifth Marquis of Donegall, who was then eighty years old, and who passed away very soon after his little son, the present Marquis, was born. The youthful peer, who will be four years old this month, ought to grow up a strikingly handsome man for his father was almost as good looking as a typical guardsman hero of Ouida, while his mother, tall and

radiantly fair is noted for her characteristically Anglo-Saxon beauty.

It is evident that Lady Donegall is as clever as she is beautiful, for her club, designed to promote good fellowship and cordial understanding between Great Britain and her colonies, has been organized by her on what are clearly the right lines. The first necessity, a good house overlooking the Park has been secured, and Lady Donegall has had the wit to seize the right moment for launching the enterprise.

Mrs. Hilda Williams has designed the decorations and furniture of the club, which is, of course, to be open to men as well as women, and one of the glories of the house is to be the Rajah's Gallery, which is to be hung with portraits of India's great feudatory princes.

TREASURE IN THE DEEP

EXPEDITION WILL SEEK MILLIONS UNDER OCEAN'S WAVES.

Party Leaves London to Search For Wealth Off the Coast of Africa—Air of Romance and Adventure—Bulwark of Old Dutch Galleons Said to Line Tide Water At Many Places.

There is a fascinating air of romance and adventure about the expedition which left the East India Docks in the steamer Alfred Nobel, to search for sunken treasure worth \$30,000,000 off the coast of Africa.

According to Captain C. A. P. Gardiner, of Bloomsbury, who heads the expedition, the African coast is lined with bulwark sunk in every kind of vessel, from old Dutch galleons to modern liners. Here is an alluring list of a few of the treasures which, it is hoped, will be brought to the surface: Immensely rich treasure captured from pirates and sunk in the Wilhelm der Secunda.

Pricelless China.

Pricelless china bullion, tin, lead and silver, sunk in the Dutch galleon Middleburg, which was scuttled off Hoetje's bay 192 years ago, to avoid capture.

Valuable cargo lost is the Dutch Government's armed merchantman Crazenstein in 1698.

Copper, tin and silver of great value, which went down in the Aberdeen White Star boat Thermopylae.

Captain Gardiner has served in the British and Chinese navies, and is an officer of the Royal Naval Reserve. His attention was drawn to the records of the many wrecks which have occurred along the African coasts, and he spent several years in endeavoring to locate them.

Twenty-Nine Wrecks.

He was rewarded by the discovery of twenty-nine wrecks which could be reached, and the result of his discoveries was the formation of the South African Salvage Company, Limited, with a capital of \$125,000.

The steamer Alfred Nobel, once the Ormea, a pleasure yacht, and more recently engaged in carrying dynamite, was chartered, and neither pains nor money was spared in equipping her as a salvage vessel.

There will be twenty hands, including two divers, all ex-navy or naval reserve men. They will sign on for five years, and will be given a 5 per cent. share of all treasure found.

The Cape Government claims 15 per cent. of the value of all silver raised, 25 per cent. of the value of gold and precious stones and 10 per cent. of the value of other articles, but Captain Gardiner is quite satisfied that there will be enough left to please everybody concerned.

"Brainless Dolls."

Remarkable statements about English women are made by a special correspondent of the Berliner Zeitung, who came specially to this country to investigate the matter.

"Anyone who observes English society and sees sweet, dainty women in gorgeous frocks, and then notices how chivalrously and with what reverence men treat them, may easily come to the erroneous conclusion that this display is all genuine. But this outward chivalry is nothing but a sham. The Englishman refuses, on principle, to take women seriously. Woman is, for the Englishman, nothing more than a beautiful doll, useful to amuse the male portion of humanity during those hours of unoccupied business. English women thus become beautiful, but brainless, dolls, an object of sport, and nothing more.

"There is no real community of interests between English husbands and wives. The English wife is frequently ignorant what profession her husband pursues, and the English woman has become in character just what Burne-Jones represents her as being in his pictures—lifeless, soulless, brainless.

"The Englishman is to blame for this. He has made the English woman what she is. English women are not treated as human beings, but as articles in man's possession. Woman is an object of sale.

"I have before me a long document, in which a woman whose hand has been sought in marriage states her conditions, naming how much pocket money she desires, what allowances for clothes, and how many horses, carriages, servants, &c., she requires to be placed at her disposal after marriage.

"It is sad, but truth compels me to record the fact that woman occupies a degraded position in England."
