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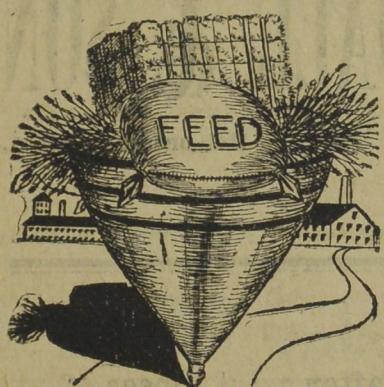

Lieut. Shackleton Departs from London.

Lieutenant Shackleton, the commander of the new Antarctic Expedition, left London on Nov. 7, bound for Lyttelton, New Zealand. The expedition is one of the best-equipped which has ever set out for Polar regions. A motor-car is being taken for transport purposes and a motor-launch for the use of the party in scientific investigations. Depots will, it is expected, be established on King Edward VII. A SENSATIONAL CASE

Wife was Flirting, Joseph Henry says with Mothersill—
He saw it When they thought he was Star-Gazing

BRAMPTON, Ont., Nov. 12—Two for three nights, I saw Mothersill young women, one armed with a stick the spider and the other with a long stick, attacking a top buggy occupied by a man, who had aroused the enmity of the stormers, would be a remarkable spectacle, and give animation to any landscape. Yet this is what John Henry, a well-to-do farmer of Chinguacousy township, Peel County declares happened at 11 of the clock one night in July, 1903, when his neighbor, Joseph Mothersill, drove his (Henry's) wife home in his own buggy.

"She had gone to Gagetown with me," said Henry, "but she came home with Mothersill, and y daughters were so mad that they nearly tore the top off his buggy."

Henry is claiming unstated damages for Mothersill at the Peel Assizes here, for alienation for his wife's affections. Mr. Justice McGee is presiding. Henry is represented by Mr. H. H. Dewost, K. C., and Mothersill by Mr. Rabenelle and Mr. J. M. Godfrey.

A plaintiff's counsel holding aloft a pair of well-worn overalls and using them as an exhibit to strengthen a piece of testimony given by Henry most the most dramatic scene at the trial. The plaintiff, as the first witness called, was in the box for 3 hours. At times he laughed, and again he looked very sober, in fact on one occasion he wiped away a tear.

The trousers, it is claimed, belonged to Mothersill. On the eighth of June last Henry, finding him in his property, gave him some rough handling and then chased him. Mothersill was in such a hurry, the plaintiff alleges, that his trousers came off in the game, and the fugitive had to traverse a considerable distance of country wearing only one boot, a shirt, a vest, and a worried look. At least, that is Henry's story.

WITH AN AXE.

"I picked up an axe and made after him, shouting that I'd break every slat in his body, but he is a better runner than I am," said Henry. "He looked more like a kilt than anything else. He said he would give me \$500 to settle, but I shout ed \$500, the diggings! And made after him."

The defense will contend that the case has developed out of an attempt to exact blackmail of Mothersill. Henry denied that he had ever attempted to secure a settlement or hinted at such.

"Did not you, your wife agree to knock on the floor or do something like that so that you would be attracted from hiding and catch Mothersill in the house?" asked Mr. Robinett.

"Nothing of the kind," declared Henry.

During the greater part of the three hours during which the plaintiff was in the box, Mothersill sat directly in front of him, and wore a broad smile.

Mr. Dewart asked his Lordship that the defendant be requested to reserve his smiles for another occasion.

Mothersill moved his chair nearer his counsel.

"He certainly was not laughing much that day," observed the witness, referring to the day of the chase.

AFTER MANY YEARS.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry were married twenty-three years ago. Everything went happily until, the 24th day of August, 1901. On that day the husband did some detective work.

"She and Mothersill were walking along a street in Gagetown, arm in arm," said he. "I followed them, but kept dodging behind the poles on the street. At last I could stand it no longer, and ran up. Mothersill sneaked away. That night I went home alone. My wife got home about eleven o'clock. I slept in the stable

some time after this, and told him that if I had a revolver I'd blow my brains out. He told me to go home, and he'd trouble me no more.

"My wife was always chewing at me after that," said Henry. "If I was late for dinner she would kick about it."

"On the 5th of December, 1901, I found tracks in my lane, and I followed them to his premises. I knew Mothersill's feet; he wears 10's or 11's.

"One summer day I was sitting on my couch when I found Mothersill's tiepin. I've seen the pin on him."

The pin was filed as an exhibit in the case.

TRIED TO FOOL HIM.

"Mothersill had a telescope," said Henry, "and one Sunday he showed it to me to attract my attention while he talked to my wife. I had a look at the people coming from church, but I also noticed Mothersill nudge my wife with his elbow."

Henry stated that only once since June has he eaten at the same table with his wife, and that was as the result of a hotel waiter's action, who knew nothing about the troubles.

The plaintiff produced a number of diaries, in which entries appear proving the dates which he brings into the case.

A large number of witnesses have been summoned on both sides.

The plaintiff and defendant are prosperous farmers of Chinguacousy township, in Peel County.

DAUGHTERS GIVE EVIDENCE.

Hiding behind a piano in the front room of their home in Chinguacousy township the two daughters of John Henry heard Joseph Mothersill, who is now a defendant at the Peel Assizes in an action claiming damages for alienation of affections, conducting a flirtation with their mother.

The case developed a very pathetic feature this morning when one of the daughters entered the witness box, and during a close questioning by counsel, wept a great deal. "We heard a lot of silly talk," said the daughter, recalling the occasion referred to "and feeling guilty at being an eavesdropper we jumped up. When Mothersill saw us he swore at us and told us to get out. As I was going out I threw a brush at him and shortly afterwards he left the house."

USED TO BRING WHISKEY.

"Mothersill used to bring whiskey to the house and on one occasion when he produced a large bottle we told him to take it home and place it in front of his own wife and daughters."

Witnesses called this morning stated that on a number of occasions during the past six years they saw Mothersill crying up to the Henry house when they knew the husband was away. In the witness box Henry states that he could not swear that there was any objectionable conduct on the part of Mothersill. "Up to 1901 our home life was quiet and happy," said a daughter this morning.

"Since then I have heard mother telling father that he was not a good farmer and they are not now living in the same part of the house."

CALLED HIM "R. R. R."

FORTUNE FOR A TOWN.

Miser's Legacy for Recreation Purposes.

The market town of Portadown, County of Armagh, Ireland, has been notified of a substantial legacy in curious circumstances.

On Monday the death occurred of Mr. William John Watson, who was over seventy years of age. Although born in Portadown, the old man's early life was spent in Australia, where he amassed a fortune of about £10,000. Returning to his native

place, he purchased property, but himself lived in utmost poverty in a small, three-roomed house. On Monday, as he had not been seen for two days, the police broke into his house, and found the old man lying dead. Death from apoplexy was the verdict of the coroner's jury, and the funeral took place on Wednesday. Later, the will of the deceased was read, and it was found that Watson had left the whole of his property to Portadown for the purpose of providing healthy recreation for the people. He also provided that the urban council should have a dinner every five years, the expenses not to exceed £1 per head. At each of these dinners the testator's will is to be read.

SEOT BY A DOG.

Curious Gun Fatality In a Motor-Car, in England.

Dr. Vernon Paul, a young Harwich medical man, was the victim of a curious shooting fatality at Ramsey, near Harwich.
