DESPERATE CRIMINALS

Four of them Seriously Assaulted Quebec Bank Manager, Blew Open the Safe and get away with \$2,400

MONTREAL, Quebec, November 15.—In the early hours of yesterday morning four desperate characters, evidently criminals of wide experience, ransacked the contents of the safe at the branch of the Bank of St. Johns, at Napierville, Quebec.

Paul Brault, the manager of the branch was sound asleep in his apartment, situated above the bank premises, when he felt a heavy hand laid upon his shoulder and the demand made that he should awaken up and go down stairs with them to the vault.

Brault put up a brave fight of it until a heavy blow on the head sent him reeling to the floor. The three men then seized hold of him bodily and carried him to the ground floor.

With a man standing at either side holding a revolver to his temples and another keeping up the rear guard, with a gun pointed at the back of his head, the unfortunate banker was peremptorily commanded to open the safe or else tell the combination so that they could do it themselves.

Three minutes they gave their victim to do as they commanded or they would fire. Mr. Brault showed considerable nerve. He fumbled at the door of the safe for a minute and a half, pretending to try and arrange the combination. He was in hopes that perhaps assistance might arrive if he could only delay.

At last he turned to them and pro-

tested that he had lost so much blood and had received such awful blows on the head he could not remember the combination.

The three men consulted for a moment, and then catching hold of their prisoner, started to carry him back to his apartments. They were much less gentle than when they brought him downstairs and unmercifully bumped him at every step. They carried him to his bedroom and threw him upon the floor beside his fainting wife.

One man was still left in charge, and the other three went again into the bank, where they blew up the safe with nitro-glycerine. The whole contents of the safe, which amounted to \$2,400 in bills, they put in their pockets and called to their comrade upstairs.

The four of them speedily decamped, Mr. and Mrs. Brault being in too weak a condition to give an immediate alarm.

They took to their heels towards the D. and H. station, and there boarded a handcar, which they had in readiness for a hurried departure. The car was found in the morning near Lacolle, though no trace of the men was to be found.

Notification of the theft has been given to the American authorities and all roads leading to the United States are watched by detectives, from Rouse's Point to Plattsburg.
