HOCKEY.

TORONTO'S EYES ON STANLEY CUP.

TORONTO, Ontario, November 9.—The Stanley Cup for Toronto has heretofore seemed a forlorn hope, but that is the ambition of the professional team which will represent Toronto during the coming season and a glance at the proposed line-up will show that the septette will be perhaps the strongest which ever carried the local colors.

An organization meeting was held last night in the Mutual street rink. Bert Morrison, last winter with Calumet; Ken Mallen, Calumet; Herb Fyfe, Guelph; Slayton Misner, Canadian Soo; Hugh Lambie, Toronto; Mark Toole, Toronto; Howard Gee, Portage la Prairie; Jack Carmichael, Toronto; Jack Marks, Pete Charlton, Smith, of Regina, and several others, were among those at the meeting.

Bert Morrison, Rowley Young and Alex. Milne were elected a managing committee.

WESTERN HOCKEY LEAGUE IS GETTING READY.

WINNIPEG, Man., November 13.—The annual meeting of the Western Canada Hockey League was held last evening, and the professional puck-chasers expect to have a satisfactory season. Kenora, Portage la Prairie, and either one or two teams from Winnipeg will start the schedule. Efforts will also be made to have Brandon come in again, although they were not represented at the meeting. Portage la Prairie has an exceptionally strong team signed, and Kenora will be almost as formidable as ever. The Winnipeggers want to get into the game, and Manager Bell of the Arena rink, also wants a franchise. The league, however, has deferred action on these applications.

"Sell" McDonald, of Portage la Prairie, was elected president.

KING'S COLLEGE.

WINDSOR, N. S., November 14.—King's College will enter the inter-collegiate hockey league this winter. This action was decided on at a meeting of the King's College Athletic Association held last night. Application for admittance will be made immediately. The prospects for a good hockey team from the college are excellent, and Captain Martell expects to have the best team that King's has ever had.

FOOTBALL.

MONTREAL JUSTIFIED IN CLAIMING TITLE.

Last year Montreal was in the Quebec Rugby Union, along with Westmounts, Rough Riders and St. Patricks, but the last named club dropped out this year, and those who were at the head of football affairs in the east and west, decided to organize a new union—the Interprovincial—which would embrace the four best clubs of Quebec and Ontario divisions, viz: Montreal, Hamilton, Argonauts, of Toronto, and Ottawa.

The step which was taken was frowned upon by the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union, which promptly placed all players who participated in the Interprovincial Rugby Union's matches under the ban. That this action on the part of the C. A. A. U. was thought lightly of by the clubs concerned, was evidenced by the fact that they kept on playing out their schedule just as if the C. A. A. U. had never been heard of.

Last year Montreal won the championship for the first time in many years, of the Quebec Rugby Football Union, and played off in Hamilton with the Hamilton Tigers, champions of the Ontario Union, and was beaten on a wet field by a narrow margin.

Subsequently the Tigers came down here and on the McGill campus inflicted a crushing defeat on the Inter-collegiate champions, and clinched their right to the title of Dominion.

When the Rugby season opened this fall it was generally conceded that the championship would lie between the Tigers and Montreal, and that this assumption was well founded is indicated by the season's record.

BASE BALL.

MUST PLAY NINE INNINGS.

NEW YORK, November 14.—There will be no championship games of fewer than nine innings in the National League next year, barring, of course, the few that are natted on account of rain or darkness. Neither will there be any unnecessary or artificial double headers, framed up for the purpose of drawing a crowd. President Pulliam has declared himself strongly for these points.

Pulliam is a great stickler for regularity, and requires his umpires to hold the players to the spirit as well as the letter of the rules.

"It became a fad," said Pulliam, to a big league man recently, "to make the second half of a double-header only five innings. I think I made a serious mistake in ever allowing such cut-off contests to count as games. But the practice came on suddenly, and was in full swing before I realized what a bad thing it was for the game.

"It will never be allowed again. The rules expressly state that a game of ball must consist of nine innings unless stopped by the weather. All of the seven and five inning games this year were technically illegal. I expect a rule will be framed at a league meeting making it compulsory to

play games according to schedule whenever possible, and forbidding double headers except when they are absolutely necessary."

If Pulliam sticks to this it will be a hard blow to the fan who likes to receive \$1 worth of entertainment for fifty cents.

MCINTYRE MAY BE SACRIFICED FOR COBB.

Matty McIntyre, the great outfielder of the Detroit Club, professional rival and personal enemy of Ty Cobb, may wear a New York uniform next spring if the leg which he injured early last season shows that it is as strong as ever.

McIntyre, one of the greatest outfielders and best hitters in the business, dropped out of sight temporarily last season when he played in only thirty games. He was injured early and by the time he was ready to don his uniform once more, Jennings trio of Jones, Crawford and Cobb was working so well that he did not make any change.

It is almost a certainty that McIntyre will not be with the Tigers next spring as he and Cobb are bitter personal enemies, and Jennings undoubtedly feels that it would be good for the morals of the team if one of them were used in a profitable trade. As it is a cinch that Cobb will be retained this points to McIntyre.

McIntyre would like to play in New York, as his home is on Staten Island, where he has lived all his life. In the Yankee outfield he would improve the playing strength of the team immensely, and, added to this, he is a smart hitter, and a cool, skillful and daring base runner. He would be invaluable in steadying Griff's youngsters on the bases.

McIntyre is now on his way to Cuba with a barnstorming club. One of Griff's scouts will watch his work on the island, and if the leg does not look troublesome a deal for his services will probably go through.

PILGRIMS PICK UP A SLUGGER.

The Boston Pilgrims seemed to have picked up a wonder in outfielder Cravath, of the Los Angeles, Cal., club. This man is said to be a wonderful batter, after the pattern of Ty Cobb, and he is expected to make good from the very start when he breaks into big league company next spring.

The following from a Los Angeles paper gives some idea as to his ability:

"This is the big fellow from Santa Anna that so many of the fans called a bushy, even after he had played a year here, and he was certainly a wizard with the bat yesterday; and strange to say, he didn't have a chance to do any fielding in either game, or rather, to make any out. In six times at bat he hit home two runs, a two-bagger and two singles, and all of them were the kind of swats that hurt a man who tries to stop them."

MISCELLANEOUS.

ATHLETES ARE BLACKLISTED.

Federation Takes Summary Step With Runners Who Participated in Harriers' Race Saturday.

Fifty-six runners who competed in last Saturday's road race at Montreal against Tom Longboat, the Indian runner, who is under the ban of the A. A. U., have been blacklisted by the Amateur Athletic Federation of Canada. As a result these men will be unable to take part in any meets held by, or compete against any athlete of any club of the Federation or its affiliations. In other words, these men will be barred from all amateur competition in the United States, as they are under the A. A. U. ban, which is affiliated with the Federation.

Following is a copy of the letter sent to all affiliations of the A. A. F. of C.:

"Montreal, Nov. 12, '07. Dear Sir,—I beg to advise you that according to the rules of the Amateur Athletic Federation of Canada, the following athletes who competed in an unsanctioned road race on November 9th, held by the Montreal and District Independent Harrier League, and promoted by the Montreal Star, have thereby suspended themselves, and are ineligible to take part in any games held under the sanction of the Amateur Athletic Federation of Canada or any of its affiliated bodies:

MR. GRAHAM PLEASED

Minister of Railways was Impressed with Intercolonial and Country through which it Runs.

OTTAWA, Nov. 14.—Hon. George Graham, Minister of Railways, and J. M. Butler, Deputy Minister, returned to Ottawa today after an inspection trip over the Intercolonial railway. Mr. Graham said that this was his first trip over the system, and he had been greatly impressed with the possibilities of the country and the shrewdness of the people in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia.

He has also been struck with the enterprise which had been shown by the cities of St. John and Halifax in their efforts to make themselves ports for the handling of the export business of Canada during the winter. They are certainly alive to the importance of developing their facilities so that traffic may be accommodated.

Mr. Graham will be closely engaged at Ottawa until the opening of Parliament in preparing for the work of the session. It is understood that he will take the first opportunity which offers to make further examination of the Government system of railroads but this will not be possible until after the close of the session.

RESCUED FROM DEATH.

Miner was Imprisoned in Mine Directly Under His Home For Eighty-seven Hours.

POTTSVILLE, Pa., Nov. 14.—Imprisonment for eighty-seven hours several hundred feet beneath the surface of the earth, almost directly under his own home, where his wife and children mourned or him as dead Michael McCabe, of Giberton was today taken from his tomb in the Draper mine, barely alive after one of the most marvelous rescues in the history of anthracite mining.

Since Saturday afternoon, when the top of the chamber in which he was working caved in and caused a rush of gum and water from the surface, relays of workmen toiled unceasingly to reach him.

Shortly after midnight the rescuers detected a scratching noise, which told them that McCabe was still living, and a few well vigor fresh reliefs were put to work and at 5 a. m. he was reached.

THE LONDON BRIBERS

Defence will ask the Judge so Discharge the Men when Trial Bugines.

When the case against George Reid, in both London and Toronto, subpoena and pay the expenses of over 100 witnesses, engage legal men to look up evidence in Brockville, West Huron, West Elgin, and three London elections, secure a special commissioner to take evidence in Hong Kong, and scores of other details.

It was felt by the defence that a trial by jury in Toronto necessarily meant at least a preponderance of Conservatives on the jury, and consequently, the best that could be hoped for was a disagreement, in which case all the expense would have to be borne again.

Viewing conditions as they have existed in London for years, and the fact that both parties are said to have equally recognized the fact that political battles in the Forest City were not to be won by prayers, it was hoped by friends of the defendants that a stay of proceedings would have been secured, particularly subsequent to the supposed righting of any wrong done by the election of Major Beattie to the parliamentary seat occupied by Hon. Mr. Hymen, the victor in the bye-election upon which the case hangs.

It is stated authoritatively that many Conservatives in London voiced their belief that the ends of justice had been sufficiently served, that the defendants had been adequately punished by financial loss, loss of time and personal worry, and that, in an informal way, an effort was made by Conservatives to test the feeling of the Crown as to a lenient dealing with the case.

The response of the attorney general, as noted, is unmistakable. Mr. Foy is alleged to have stated that the day of saw-offs and settlements in cases involving electoral immorality, whether sought by one party or the other, or by both parties, was ended in Ontario.

The case will accordingly go on. The defence, however, professes confidence in having it thrown out upon the statute of limitations or other counts which they have ready. These will probably be argued on Monday.

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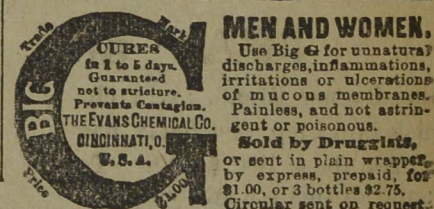
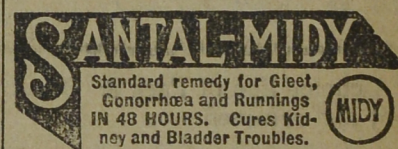
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
