SCOTT ACT GALORE

McAdam Man must Answer to Fifteen First Offences.

Col. Marsh has fifteen Scott act cases set down for trial at the police court tomorrow morning. This includes quite a rush of business, and the strange part of it is that they are all against one man, Thomas Nicholson, of McAdam Junction, and all are for first offences. The information was laid by the C. P. R. authorities of McAdam, who look upon the defendant as an undesirable member of the community, and are anxious to put him out of business.

The fifteen offences are said to have been committed during the month of October, and witnesses will be on hand to prove each offence.

The papers were served by City Marshall Roberts of this city, one day this week. Nicholson apparently got a tip that a storm was brewing, and endeavored to keep out of sight, but the city marshal had no trouble in landing him.

This is the biggest batch of Scott act cases ever brought on in one day in the Fredericton police court, and is probably a record breaker for New Brunswick. Should the defendant be convicted of the fifteen offences he will be called upon to pay in fines the sum of \$750, besides costs.
