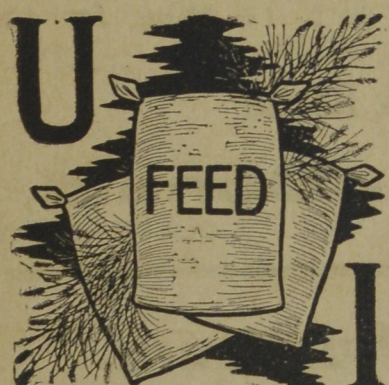

It is rumored that William Sheley who bought the "Crest" Hotel at Centreville, Carleton County, or his family have come into a snug little property in England, so has sold the hotel back again to S. A. Perkins, and returned to old England.

Jane, wife of John W. Blackie, proprietor of the Queen Hotel, Woodstock, after a short illness died at her residence, the Queen Hotel, on Sunday evening, Dec. 1st, in her 67 year. The funeral took place on Wednesday.

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James Turnbull of Woodstock, who has been connected with the C. P. R.

engineering staff, with resident engineer M. F. Rutter, for the past six months, has resigned. He left for Montreal on Saturday, where he has a position awaiting him. Before leaving he was presented by the office staff with a pipe and tobacco pouch.

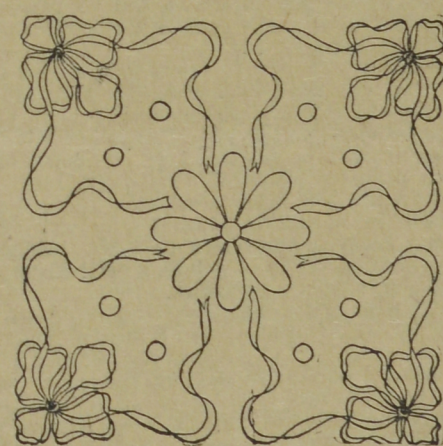

EXECUTIVE OFFICE SCENE OF TRAGEDY.

Insane Man Fatally Wounded One Man and Injured Two Others at Boston.

BOSTON, Dec. 6.—John A. Steele, an insane man of Everett, walked into the anteroom of the executive chamber of the State House yesterday afternoon and, finding Governor Guild's door closed, turned on three prominent labor leaders and fired three shots at them, probably fatally wounding Edward Cohen of Lynn, president of the state branch of the American Federation of Labor; seriously wounding Dennis D. Driscoll of Boston, secretary of the same board, and painfully wounding with the muzzle of his revolver Arthur M. Huddell, of Boston, formerly president of the Central Labor Union of this city.

Steele was overpowered by Private Secretary Chas. S. Groves and General J. H. Whitney, chief of the state police. Steele was released on parole last month from the Danvers Insane Asylum. He is 37 years old.

Governor Guild was in his office only a few few days when the shooting occurred, and, rushing out, assisted in subduing Steele, and subsequently directed the removal of the wounded men to the Massachusetts General hospital. Cohen was shot

through the head and is in a critical condition. The third bullet struck Driscoll a glancing blow on the side of the forehead and rendered him unconscious. He recovered consciousness half an hour later. Huddell's wound was not serious.

The three labor leaders came to the State House to meet the Governor in regard to a pardon. They found that the Governor was busy at the time, and were asked to wait in one of the ante-rooms.

Steele is well known to the State Board of Insanity, having been under observation in various institutions for a number of years.
