PUGSLEY THE MAN

Ex-Premier of New Brunswick Called to the Federal Cabinet and Will be Sworn in Friday

ONTARIO VACANCY NOT YET FILLED

(Special to Herald.)

OTTAWA, Ont., August 27.—Hon. Dr. Pugsley, who is in Montreal, was sent for today by the Premier.

He will arrive to-night and will be sworn in a member of the cabinet by Lord Grey on Friday.

Ontario's representative is not finally settled.

OTTAWA, Ont., August 27.—It is pretty well known here that Mr. Sifton has already been approached in regard to the vacant portfolio of public works, but declined at the time to accept.

If he could be prevailed upon

sent Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Frederick Borden, Hon. Messrs. Scott, Aylesworth, Paterson, Fisher and Oliver. Sir Richard Cartwright arrived from Kingston as the meeting concluded.

No steps were taken for the filling of the two vacant portfolios of railways and canals and public works. There will be another meeting of the government to-day, at which views as to the cabinet appointment will be exchanged and probably an announcement will follow.

The opinion is that the railway post will be given to ex-Premier Pugsley, of New Brunswick, and the public works portfolio to George Graham, of

to enter the cabinet at the present time he undoubtedly would be a source of strength to the administration, but as he is not in the city his views on the subject are not obtainable.

If not Sifton, then it will likely be Graham, although it is admitted that his coming to Ottawa will be a great loss to the Ontario legislature and to provincial Liberalism. As to the vacant portfolio for the Maritime Provinces it has been already said, pretty well decided that it shall go to Pugsley.

At the conclusion of the council meeting Sir Richard and Hon. Mr. Aylesworth had a long conference on the question of filling the Ontario vacancy. It is known that they are anxious to have a strong man taken in, but there is a question whether Mr. Graham would not be seriously missed by the men at the left of the Speaker in the Ontario house if he were to accept a place as federal minister.

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RECLAIMING A DREDGE

PORT HOPE, Ont., Aug. 27.—

After lying five years at the bottom of Lake Ontario, ten miles from here in eighty feet of water, the \$50,000 dredge Laurier, is expected by the Reid Wrecking Company, of Sarnia, who are in charge of the work of salvage, to be pumped out and on her way to Toronto within two days.

At Toronto a thorough overhauling will be given her by the Polson Iron Works Company, who built her.

Five years ago, the Laurier, while on her way to Montreal in charge of a tug, foundered in a storm off Port Hope.

The Reid Company commenced the work of raising the dredge five weeks ago.
