THE NEW MINISTER.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley, who has been called to a seat in the federal cabinet, is easily one of Canada's brilliant and popular public men, and his appointment will be hailed with great satisfaction, not only in New Brunswick, but by the Liberal party all over Canada.

He is a born leader of men, a gentleman of great ability, energy, industry and tact, and will take front rank in Sir Wilfrid Laurier's cabinet.

ST. JOHN TORY MEETING

At St. John Monday evening, Mr. Borden largely repeated his Halifax speech, varying it only to suit the local conditions. It was practically the same speech of which he sent typewritten copies to his newspapers in advance, and which has been criticized and condemned in some of its chief features by such prominent Tory newspapers as the Montreal Gazette, the Montreal Star and the Toronto World.

Mr. Bergeron seems to have made the people laugh at St. John as he did at Halifax and Middleton, and he may be put down as the light comedian of Mr. Borden's troupe. Mr. Bergeron is a political light-weight and has no following in Quebec worth speaking of, but he amuses the Tory audiences, which, after Mr. Borden's ponderous speeches, are ready to applaud anything bright or witty. But Mr. Bergeron, neither in parliament nor in the country is taken seriously.

Mr. Fowler was not on the St. John program, but he was careful to present himself on the front row of people on the platform, and made a speech in response to calls from the crowd. It must have been distressing to Mr. Borden, who at least stands for decent political discussion, and no doubt he will deny all responsibility for Mr. Fowler's unexpected appearance.

Mr. Foster was invited by Dr. Daniel to attend the meeting, but he did not have the nerve to put in an appearance, for once exercising good judgment.

The enthusiasm over the leader does not appear to have been overwhelming, for it was left to a Fredericton man to start the cheering.

The meeting was well attended, for political feeling is on a rise in St. John, which is facing a federal by-election, and when Dr. Pugsley returns from Ottawa to formally open his campaign the interest will become intense.

Probably the most uneasy man in the constituency is Dr. Daniel, Tory M. P., who will be forced in a few weeks to witness the constituency which elected him by a large majority in the last election, glide gracefully into the Liberal column, with his own political support cut from under him.

It is pretty safe to say that neither Dr. Daniel nor any other St. John Tory will have a seat in the next parliament.

MR. GRAHAM

The Liberal opposition in the Ontario legislature has been so ably led by Hon. George P. Graham that its friends naturally object to the proposal to remove him to the larger federal arena, as a minister of the crown.

Mr. Graham took the leader-

ship just after his party had been badly defeated in a general election, when its members were greatly decimated by the Whitney triumph, but he has succeeded in infusing new life and hope into it, and there is scarcely a man in sight to adequately fill his place should he be called to Ottawa.

Mr. Graham is a gentleman in the prime of life, with a good, clean personal and political record, and in whatever sphere he may elect to act, his career is destined to occupy a very prominent position in the public life of Canada.

CURRENT COMMENT

The St. John Telegraph is still exhibiting political independence by lauding the Tory leader.

It will be interesting to observe what the Montreal Star has to say of Mr. Fowler's appearance at Mr. Borden's St. John meeting.

Mr. Foster is going on a stumping tour in Nova Scotia, but his political teeth have been drawn, and his influence is gone since the revelations of the insurance commission.

A man is known by the company he keeps, and Mr. Borden will fail to impress the country with the honesty of his intentions so long as he permits the land grafters to appear on the same platform with him.

When Mr. Foster was scheduled to address a Tory meeting at Truro last summer, he failed to turn up and was off to Toronto. Dr. Daniel invited Mr. Foster to last night's Tory meeting in St. John, and he wrote that he had engagements in Nova Scotia. Mr. Foster evidently is not anxious to face New Brunswick audiences.

The Chatham World says that Mr. Borden sacrificed an enormous professional income to enter political life. "What a patriot!" people would naturally exclaim, if they did not know that Mr. Borden is in receipt of \$9,500 a year as a politician, \$7,000 as leader of the Opposition, and \$2,500 sessional indemnity—and all from the public treasury at Ottawa. The World should tell the whole truth.

The St. John common council decided not to present an address to General Booth, the Salvation Army leader, but Mayor Sears will himself supply the deficiency. His Worship and the aldermen appear to be at cross purposes in about everything that comes before the council. In Fredericton things are different. We are able to get along quite comfortably without the corporation authorities seriously interfering with anything. The machine runs itself.

A NATTY CRAFT.

Mr. Burton Moore of Scotch Lake was in the city yesterday, having made the trip from Macquarie in a motor canoe, built and designed by himself. It is one of the handsomest and best sailing canoes seen here for some time and attracted a great deal of attention. It is twenty-two feet long, fifty-eight inches in the beam, and has a depth of twenty-one inches. A Toronto motor of three horse power has been installed and can send the craft along at an eight mile an hour clip. It is of the sponson type, and will accommodate seven people comfortably. It is certainly a splendid canoe and Mr. Moore has every reason to be proud of his work.

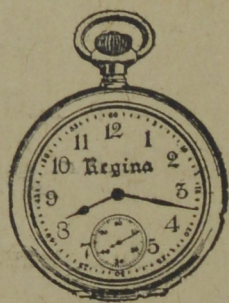

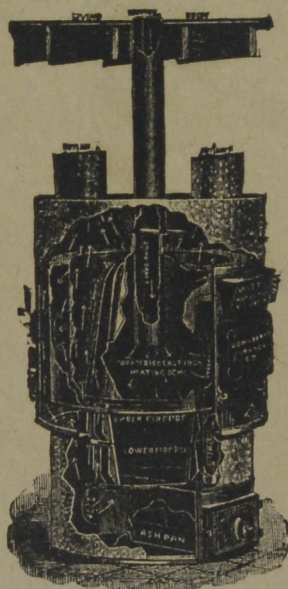

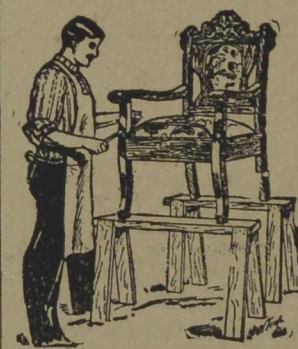
