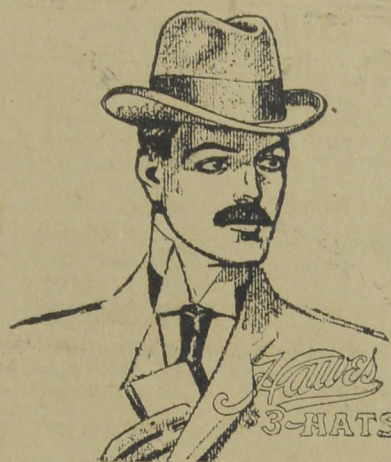

KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS

The twenty first annual meeting of the Grand Lodge of the Knights of Pythias of the Maritime Provinces opened in the K. of P. hall, York street, at ten o'clock this morning with the Grand Chancellor Mr. F. A. Marr, of Halifax, in the chair. The number of delegates in attendance is about one hundred representing the three Maritime Provinces.

This morning's session was taken up principally with business of a routine nature. Reports were submitted by the Grand Chancellor, the Grand Keeper of Records and Seals, the Master of the Exchequer, and the grand trustees. These reports were referred to the committee on distribution and subsequently to the finance committee.

The Grand Trustees reported a balance of \$641.39 to the credit of the Grand Lodge in the Bank of Nova Scotia at St. Stephen.

A report from the law and supervision committee on the revision of the Grand Lodge constitution was taken up section by section and adopted.

The report of the Grand Keeper of Records and Seals on the revision of bye laws of subordinate lodges was laid on the table for future consideration.

GRAND CHANCELLOR'S REPORT

The report of Grand Chancellor Marr was in part as follows:

As Grand Chancellor of the Domain it affords me great pleasure to extend fraternal greetings to you one and all at the twenty-first annual convention of our Grand Lodge, and I sincerely trust that our deliberations will result in material and lasting benefit to the brotherhood to which we have the privilege of belonging, by developing to the highest point the cardinal principles of our noble Pythian Order,—Friendship, Charity and Benevolence,—emulating the forward movement prevailing in other beneficent organizations throughout the Continent.

When you elected me Grand Chancellor, although fully aware that the duties incumbent upon me as your executive officer, I assure you I had much disquietude as to my ability to administer your affairs in conformity with the high standard the Order of Knights of Pythias has attained. As you had, however, deemed me worthy to fill the position, it developed upon me to justify your confidence to the fullest extent within my power. Having given my best efforts to that end it is gratifying to report that the year has been a successful one, largely owing to the hearty co-operation of the subordinate lodges.

It is a satisfaction to be able to report that a large majority of the Deputies have given due attention to their duties, it being my constant endeavour to keep in close touch with them and instill into their minds the paramount necessity of prompt and loyal fulfillment of the obligations involved in the acceptance of the commissions entrusted to them. My desire has been to visit all the subordinate lodges during my term of office, and I am pleased to state that to a very considerable extent I have succeeded in carrying out this resolve. Before formally reporting on existing conditions a brief resume of these official visits may prove of interest.

February 10th, I set out for a series of visitations in New Brunswick, and on the 12th visited the Fredericton Lodge, No. 6, which I found in a very prosperous condition; on the 13th, accompanied by a gathering of Fredericton Knights, I visited Marysville Lodge, No. 18, and can truthfully state that No. 18 was in the front rank in every respect. On the 14th I proceeded to St. Stephen, where I met Past Chancellor Porter of Halifax Lodge, when we made a visitation to Frontier Lodge, No. 4, of St. Stephen, together with Border Lodge, No. 8, of Milltown—another joint meeting, where we were received in true Pythian spirit and extended a most hearty welcome.

The Grand Keeper of Records and Seal, having forwarded to me under date July 27th, 1907, a petition signed by seventeen former members of Ivanhoe Lodge, of Woodstock, N. B., asking for their charter to be restored, I at once advised Bro. Moulson to restore to the petitioners the charter and all other property received by him from Ivanhoe Lodge. Great credit is due to Bro. Holyoke, for this re-construction which I have much pleasure in recording.

On the 21st of June I addressed Deputy Grand Chancellor Irvine of Fredericton Lodge, No. 6, by letter re-changing date of this convention from September to 27th of August. On receiving his assent I communi-

cated with all the Grand Lodge officers, who also agreed. I thereon advised the Grand Keeper of Records and Seal to notify all the subordinate lodges of the alteration in the date.

BOSTON, 1908.

December 1, 1906, and subsequent dates, I received from Grand Chancellor Scott, Domain of Massachusetts, communications re attending at Supreme Convention to be held in Boston, 1908, wherein he depicted in glowing terms the many attractions proposed and asking to be informed as to the probable attendance from this domain. To these letters I replied that I would notify all our lodges and at a later date would give him a definite reply. I am happy to state that many lodges have formed Boston Clubs and are preparing to deal with the proposed visit. I would earnestly request that prompt attention be given to his matter and that our incoming Grand Chancellor will vigorously forward the movement. From what I have learned of the Massachusetts Domain I would urge every effort on the part of our members to participate in this convention and enjoy the time of their lives. Since the inception of the New Grand Chancellor of the Domain of Massachusetts the same enthusiasm is being put forth, and I have already received numerous letters from the Chairman of the Executive Committee, (Bro. D. F. Woodworth,) urging on the good work, which correspondence has had my close attention as per letters in reply submitted.

That a committee be appointed to take into consideration ways and means whereby our subordinate lodges may become better acquainted one with another, forming a connecting link either by visits or correspondence.

That this Grand Lodge in future hold its annual convention on the last Tuesday in August.

Before closing I would again express my grateful thanks to all our brethren for their kind support and indulgence, and in relinquishing the reins of office earnestly invite one and all to unite in extending to my successor a like support, assisting him in every possible manner.

In conclusion, I have no hesitation in expressing the opinion that the condition of our Order throughout this Domain as indicated in the review I have had the honor to place before you, is, with one or two exceptions, fully abreast of the times in which we live and bright with hope of increased usefulness in developing the grand principles on which Pythianism securely rests.

The report of Mr. James Moulson, Grand Keeper of Records and Seals showed receipts for the year amounting to \$11,276.73 and disbursements amounting to \$10,316.54. The total cash on hand June 30th, was \$17,430.91. In addition to his report there is property amounting to \$33,946.08. The membership on June 30th was 2,134, a net gain for the year of 52.

The report of the Grand Master of the Executive, Mr. Parker Grimmer, showed receipts for the year amounting to \$1,488.77, and expenditures of \$1,080.63, leaving a balance of \$387.94.
