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Hon. Frank Oliver Says British Columbia is Alarmed at the Volume it is Assuming

(Special to Herald.)

WINNIPEG, Man., August 26.—Hon. Frank Oliver, Minister of the Interior, gave to the press a long statement of his view on the invasion of British Columbia, which he had been investigating.

The Japanese influx, he says, is a little different from any Oriental question that has arisen hitherto.

Labor organizations and all laboring classes naturally object to the presence of a large number of men who are not competent, and are able to work for very much less wages but the feeling extends beyond this class.

There is a panicky feeling among inhabitants generally, who fear that it is a pre-concentrated movement with some sort of mysterious responsibility behind it, the limit of which they do not know.

It is only this spring that movement has taken place and its suddenness has alarmed the people.

The important feature of the case is that the immigrants are not coming from Japan, but

from the Sandwich Islands, and they are Japanese citizens. The Japanese government has no legal control over their movements. There is no restriction to the movement to the Sandwich Islands and after they obtain permission to go there, they may go whither they choose.

Mr. Oliver says he cannot quote his authority, but the people who are landing in British Columbia hold passports to the Sandwich Islands, dated only this spring. If the passports were dated years ago it could be readily conceived, so it is argued that the conditions of the labor market there might be the cause of the present influx.

The idea prevails that the Sandwich Islands is being used as a cloak to cover a pre-concentrated move towards Canada.

"If the Japanese government," adds the minister, "could show that it was adhering in spirit as well as letter to the understanding of years ago I think there would be comparatively little cause of complaint."

FRENCH CANADIAN BIRTH RATE HIGH.

Three Times That of Paris and
Double That of New York—
Aggregates 47.66 per
1,000.

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 23.—Further figures available in connection with the annual report of the medical officer of health for the city, Dr. L. Laberge, show that during 1906 the French-Canadian birthrate per thousand was 47.66, as against 44.19 for the previous year, being an increase of 3.47 per thousand.

This is over three times the birth rate in Paris and double that of New York. The birthrate of the city of Montreal as a whole is double that of the French capital, being upwards of 31 per 1,000. English Roman Catholics and English Protestants average about the same.

Dr. Ward, the new statistician, is working at the details of an estimate of the population of Montreal by nationality. He finds the last census quite useless for that purpose as it showed only 16,000 Jews in the whole of Canada, while it is well known, Dr. Ward avers, that there are more than double that number in Montreal alone and they have been coming in by boat loads since the last census was taken.

WHERE IT PAYS TO DEAL.

THE INTERCOLONIAL

Deputy Minister Butler Says it was Never Before in Such Good Shape

OTTAWA, Ont., August 23.—"The Intercolonial Railway was never in better shape than it is today and was never before handling the volume of business."

This statement was made by M. J. Butler, deputy minister of railways, who has just returned to Ottawa, after a three weeks' inspection trip which took him over the whole system of government railways in the Maritime Provinces and Quebec.

"We made the whole trip by daylight and ran at high speed, making stops at every point where there is work going on," said Mr. Butler. "I did this for the purpose of testing the track and at the same time seeing every mile of the system by daylight. The road bed was never in better shape. As far as rails, ballast and bridges

are concerned, there is not a better road today in America.

"The rolling stock is in good shape, though like all other systems on this continent we are short of cars and locomotives. We could use from three to four thousand more cars and fifty freight engines with the traffic that is available. The shortage is being repaired as expeditiously as possible, Rhodes & Curry, of Amherst, who have the contract for a thousand freight cars, have promised to hasten deliveries.

"As soon as the new shops in Moncton are completed, we will be able to do a great deal toward keeping the supply of locomotives and cars up to requirements.

"During the month of July the earnings of the Intercolonial were the largest in the history of the road."

ENGLISH GIRL'S ROMANCE.

She Came to America, But Her Lover Was Not on Hand to Meet Her: All Was Put Straight at Amherst.

ST. JOHN, August 24.—The romance of pretty Florence Evans, a young English woman, who arrived in Boston August 1 on the steamer Saxonia from Liverpool to join her betrothed husband, terminated happily yesterday, when the delinquent groom came up from Maine to claim her.

They had been childhood lovers, and when he came to this country he promised to send for her as soon as he had provided a comfortable home. He went to Amherst, N. S., and then to Maine.
