A RED TAPE RECORD

How Business is Done in French Colonial Office.

PARIS, December 31.—A red tape record has been established by the French Colonial Department, says The Matin. Some eighteen months ago the governor of Martinique found that he needed some pins and a cork-screw in his office. He sent for his secretary and asked him to get them.

The secretary pointed out that any such expenditure must be sanctioned by the Ministry of the Colonies. The governor accordingly telegraphed to Paris, "Please send at once 1½ pounds of pins and two corkscrews."

The minister sent the telegram to the accountants' department "for approximate estimate of the outlay to be incurred. The chief accountant noted that in his opinion the outlay would be excessive, observing that his wife did not use so many pins even for her most elaborate dresses. So he sent the telegram and the note to the director of the political department and drew up a long, and on the whole, favorable report of the governor's character, and thought the request for the pins was reasonable if they were not purchased at an exorbitant figure.

The dossier went next to the commission of purchases which was divided as to whether the pins should be bought by private contract or otherwise. They finally decided on the former, and returned the dossier to the political department, which sent it back to the accountant's office, and it was passed on to the minister, who thought the purchase should not be made by private contract, and sent

it back to the accountant, who transferred it to the political department, who handed it on to the commission of purchases, which decided after all that private contract was not the best method and sent the huge dossier back to the minister, via the political department and the accountants.

Then the minister sanctioned the expenditure and after more journeyings the dossier returned to the commission of purchases, which was given a free hand. By this time the governor's telegram had been travelling for fourteen months, and was buried in the midst of 2,427 documents concerning it, while the pins in the bundle were nearly as numerous as those the governor needed.

THE LITTLE ONE'S NIGHT-GOWN.

The simple little model for a child's nightdress here sketched will be found most practical for home making. It is roomy and comfortable, allowing plenty of freedom for the small wearer, yet its shaping is very graceful and attractive, the tucked front and gathered back providing the necessary fullness. The gown may be closed in front or back, as seems most convenient or desirable, either adjustment suitable. The collar is slashed back and front, the effect being the same for either style of closing. Longcloth or flannel may be used for making the gown, which may be trimmed or not, as preferred.

For the five-year size 2½ yards 36 inch goods are necessary.

THE SPANISH ESCURIAL.

It is a Marvellous Specimen of Spanish Architecture.

The Escorial, the palace of the Spanish king, an architectural marvel, formerly described as the "eighth wonder of the world," is now seldom spoken of even by those who are ready to go wild over much less pretentious structures. The cornerstone of this "Spanish St. Peter's" was laid by Philip II. in 1563, but it was 302 years (1865) before the monstrous building was pronounced finished. It was built by Philip in fulfillment of a vow to "erect the finest monastery in the world" should his forces be successful in their great battle with the French. That battle was fought at St. Quentin on Aug. 10, 1557, St. Lawrence day, and in order to honor that saint as well as to fulfill his vow the king had the foundation of his great memorial laid off in the shape of a gridiron, the implement of torture upon which the goodly Lawrence is reputed to have suffered martyrdom.

To those who have never visited the Escorial the size of the gigantic structure is beyond comprehension. It is 740 feet from north to south and 580½ feet from east to west, the square towers at each corner rising to a height of over 200 feet. Within this monstrous building are the king's palace, a cathedral, a monastery of 200 cells, two colleges, three chapter houses, three libraries, five large halls, six dormitories, three hospitals and over 3,000 other rooms. In order to make St. Lawrence's gridiron complete, the building is built in quadrangular form, with seventeen rows or ranges of monstrous stone structures crossing each other at right angles, these forming the gridiron's ribs, the handle being a wing 470 feet in length. The church, which is a part of this vast pile of masonry, is 364 feet long, 230 feet wide, with a dome 330 feet in height. It is estimated that the building cost \$50,000,000.
