

SEEING NEW YORK.

Sight-Seeing Automobile Mobbed by East-Enders and Canadian Girl Pelted.

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—After a hug sight-seeing automobile had killed a small boy on Christie Street, in the heart of the East Side, this afternoon, a mob of men and women, numbering many hundreds, drove the terrified tourists from the car by a shower of missiles from windows and roofs. But for the arrival of the police reserves the crowd would also have destroyed the machine by fire.

Tony Pasquetti, nine years, one of a dozen or more boys stealing a ride on the running board of the big auto, missed his footing when William D. Hamilton, the man with the megaphone shouted, "Beat it!" In falling he slid beneath one of the wheels, being instantly killed.

The automobile left the Bartholdi Hotel, Broadway and Twenty-third Street, at ten o'clock, and after a trip about town, including a progress through the Wall street district, went north through the East Side. Eleven passengers, including one young woman, said to be a Canadian college student, made up the party.

Hamilton was "spouting" his usual rignarole about "typical East Side scenes," while he pointed out crowded fire escapes, overloaded ash cans, mattresses in the street, and called attention to the everlasting odors of the section, when he spied half a dozen small boys "hooking on."

Lowering his megaphone he shouted: "Hey you kids! Beat it!"

There was an instant scattering of youngsters from the running boards and at once the heavy wheel killed Tony.

From the sidewalk and windows a shrill cry went up. On whirled the big auto, the chauffeur paying no heed to the clamor, being used to the noise of children on the East Side. But while some men only shouted, others hurled missiles, even the push-cart peddlers joining in. In another moment things were serious.

ATTACKED FROM ROOF AND WINDOWS.

When the attack came the driver at once brought the machine to a stop.

Upon the helpless sightseers descended bottles, ears of corn, hot and cold, pieces of watermelon, and old cans. Hamilton yelled to his eleven charges to "get away quick," and hauled down the lone college woman without waiting for the ladder. She was plucky in spite of the din. Christie street was quickly choked with enraged humanity, and Hamilton and the girl dodged into a hall way.

One of the passengers, J. C. Rooney of Omaha, Neb., was struck with a bottle, but got away with only a damaged hat. While the mob stood in the way of the auto, Klushin, the chauffeur, couldn't budge the big machine. The crowd hurriedly produced several old mattresses and shoved them under the car, touching matches to the straw. The chauffeur, realizing that they were going to make a bonfire out of his vehicle, shouted to those who blocked the way, and shot the machine twenty feet ahead, when more decayed fruit was hurled at him and he was obliged to climb down and run.

Patrolman Cannon meanwhile had sent word to the Eldridge Street Station house that only the reserves could handle the situation, and he rescued the chauffeur, who was faring badly at the hands of a dozen men. Sergeant Clifford and a dozen policemen soon reached the scene, and while the body of the boy was being removed to the station house, all the available patrolmen were employed to scatter the crowd. Policemen were also put in the auto to protect it and Klushin was ordered to drive to the station house. On the way the angry men and women followed, and the throwing of missiles was resumed. Hamilton had disappeared.

Christie Street needed a corps of sweepers for the next hour, and a wagon load of broken glass and "mixed garbage" was carried away. The chauffeur explained that he was so used to the shouting East Side mob that he wouldn't know the cry of danger from the "hello" of a telephone girl in that section.

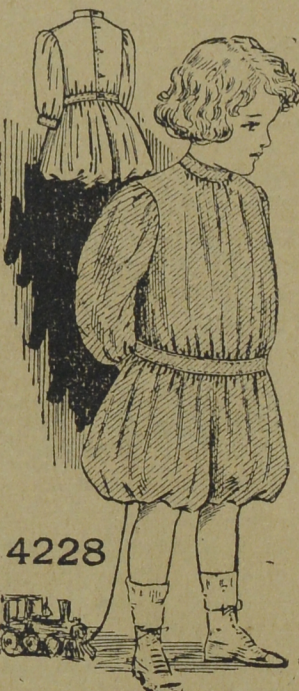

TORNADO IN MINNESOTA.

Twenty Persons Reported to have Been Killed.

ALBERT LEA, Minn., Aug. 9.—A tornado swept across Winnebago County, Iowa, last evening and, according to some reports, killed twenty persons. It was known that one person was killed in Joice village, which was destroyed, and that several persons were injured. The course of the storm was from the northwest to southwest. The destruction of property is said to be great. The Minneapolis & St. Louis Railroad is out of commission and its trains are being run over the Rock Island tracks.

MASON CITY, Iowa, Aug. 9.—Three persons were killed and four injured, and several thousand dollars' damage done throughout this section of Iowa last night by a tornado.

Shipping at Clear Lake and many cottages on the shore were destroyed. A half dozen barns and four houses near Rockwell were demolished, and the roof was blown from the Roman Catholic Church at Rockwell.

A good way in which to keep water cold in hot weather is to take a thin glass jug or bottle and wrap a piece of well-wetted linen (or a stocking leg) tightly around it. Fill the bottle with cold water and stand it in a shallow dish filled with water. Place the whole in the shade where there is a draft, if possible, and the contents will remain cold for a long time. If the linen around the bottle becomes dry before the water is used the linen should be moistened again.

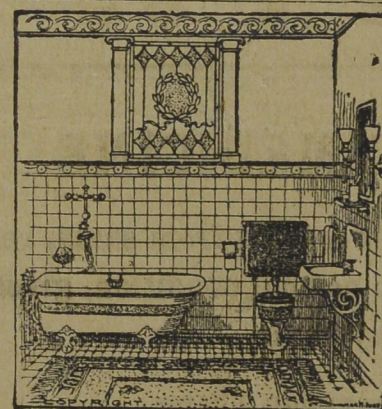

CROWN LANDS DEPT.

Surveyor General Says Stumpage Receipts this Year will be Larger Than Ever.

Speaking to a Sun reporter last night, Surveyor General Sweeney said the Crown Land Office is at present busily engaged in collecting stumpage, and every indication points to the total stumpage being greater than ever before.

That collected in 1907 was the greatest amount in the history, at New Brunswick, and Mr. Sweeney said he expected that it would be surpassed by about \$10,000 this year.

Game is plentiful throughout New Brunswick and the number of foreign sportsmen who will hunt here this fall will be larger than ever. For some time past the Crown Lands Department was not aware that game was being killed out of season in defiance of the game laws. The game wardens were instructed to proceed quietly with their investigations until sufficient evidence was collected to ensure convictions. The case of the two American millionaires on the Miramichi was an instance of these methods. These two gentlemen had evidently the idea that they could ignore completely the game laws of the province. They have already been fined upwards of \$300 and there is reason to believe that further fines will be imposed. One charge against the two is that they are using two guide from the Adirondacks region of New York. The use of unregistered guides in this province is illegal and punishable by a heavy fine.

At present the wardens in the different sections of the province are considering the effect that the introduction of motor boats and motor canoes into the lakes and streams of the interior has upon the game. Some persons claim that the moose deer and caribou are easily frightened by motor craft and will be driven from their usual haunts. If investigation and observation bear out this contention it is likely that regulations and laws prohibiting the

use of motor craft on game waters will be passed by the government.

STORAGE OF POTATOES.

Aroostook Man Talks to "The Beacon" on Subject.

The farmers of Carleton County are exercised over the storage of the great crop of potatoes, which they have raised this year. On Friday last, the Woodstock board of trade had a conference with representatives of the government and the C. P. R. when a variety of suggestions was made, but no definite action taken. One man wanted the provincial government to provide potato houses, another suggested a loan to the farmers, another that the C. P. R. erect houses, and so on.

Mr. Hall, of Aroostook Co., Maine who is the owner of four potato houses told the Beacon on Saturday that with the exception of a potato house, built at Houlton by the C. P. R., all the rest of the houses throughout Maine are erected by farmers or by private companies or individuals. The average potato house say 40 x 80 feet, can be erected for about \$2,000 and if properly built and maintained will last indefinitely.

The cost of heating is a small item if the buildings are properly constructed. About two cords of wood will keep a house heated throughout the winter, maintaining the temperature at about 35 degrees. In the building of his houses he uses a six inch stud. This is boarded outside and shingled. The inside of the studs are also boarded, and the intervening space filled with dry sawdust. If the sawdust is damp it makes the building sweat and rot it. Then three inch studding is used inside of this and boarded over, the air space between being used to carry the heat from the stove which is in the cellar. The cellar need not be more than five or six feet in length.

In some places in Maine the farmers have pooled together and erected buildings 200 feet long each owning having his own potato bin apart from the others. This makes the cost of maintenance lighter.

Mr. Hall says that if the Carleton County farmers are assured of a permanent and profitable market they should lose no time in putting up potato houses. He regards his potato houses as the best investment that he has got yielding him 10 to 15 per cent. If he never used them for his own purposes he could always get them hired, as more potatoes are being raised in Maine than there is storage space for. He thinks this will be the history in New Brunswick.
