DYNAMITE EXPLOSION

Three Men Killed and Many Injured at Essex, Ont.

WINDSOR, Ont., August 12.—Three men are dead, the Michigan Central station and several other buildings in Essex are wrecked, and all buildings on Talbot street, the main street of Essex, were more or less damaged by an explosion on Sunday of a car of dynamite in front of the station.

Baggage man Joseph McNary, and brakeman Leo Colon picked up some boxes which had jolted about in the car and were just about to leave the car when the explosion took place, and killed both of these men. So great was the shock that it killed Dr. Brown, of Essex, who was in bed in his residence.

The injured are: David Cottrell, engineer, Amherstburg; Thomas Barry, conductor, St. Thomas; A. O. Stiner, station agent at Essex, likely to die; Jas. Madigan, fireman, Thomasburg.

The explosion wrecked the M. C. R. station, Lang & Ritchie's planing mills, J. McDougall's carriage works and S. B. Green & Co.'s warehouse. It also damaged the Methodist church. Rents were torn in many buildings on Talbot street, and there is scarcely a whole pane of glass in any building on the street.

THE GUARD OF HONOR.

The old uniforms were a little the worse for wear and members of the local militia companies were not very jubilant over the prospect of turning out in them on Thursday. With new uniforms, however, no difficulty is anticipated in getting the required number of men, so that applications should be sent in early to Capt. Osborne or Guthrie. The guard will parade at the drill hall this evening for training.
