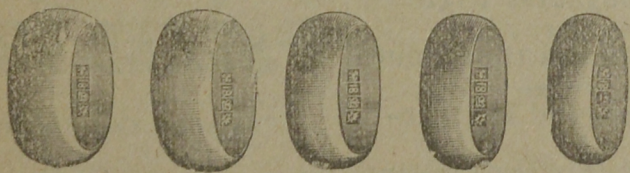

WELCOME TO FIELDING.

Finance Minister to be Honored by People
of his Native Province at Halifax.

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 10.—(Special.)—A reception by the people of Nova Scotia will be tendered to the Hon. W. S. Fielding at Halifax on Tuesday evening next the 15th inst. in the Empire Rink.

Mr. Fielding has just returned from London and Paris where in conjunction with the Minister of Marine and Fisheries he had been for several months attending to matters that are bound to prove of inestimable benefit to Canada.

So successful has Mr. Fielding been that the leading newspapers at home and abroad acclaim him as one of the empire's leading statesmen.

It is fitting, therefore that the citizens of his native province should in a special way mark their appreciation of his five and twenty years of public service.

His record is a singular one inasmuch as he is probably the only leading figure in public life who has never

tasted defeat or sat for one moment in opposition.

For a quarter of a century he has administered some department of government and it is the pride of all Nova Scotians both Conservative and Liberal that the breath of suspicion has never been raised in that connection.

It is expected that on the occasion of the reception in Halifax Mr. Fielding will be accompanied by his chief, Sir Wilfrid Laurier and by two of his Ontario colleagues, Messrs. Aylesworth and Graham.

They will be heard in Nova Scotia for the first time and as they have been making history in Ontario in recent months thousands will flock to hear them.

From all the counties of Nova Scotia there will be large numbers attend. Cape Breton, for which Mr. Fielding has loyally and faithfully worked will see to it that it is well represented.

BAD FIRE AT AMHERST.

Large Business Block in Centre of Town
Seriously Damaged.

AMHERST, N. S., Oct. 10.—(Special.)—At 12.35 fire broke out in the basement of Wilson & Brawn's dry goods store on Victoria street and a time of writing the appearance are that the stock in this and some of the adjoining shops will be destroyed and the block badly damaged.

The block is the Rhodes Steel block on Victoria street, opposite the Public Park. The floors are occupied by Wilson and Brawn, dry goods, W. P. Smith and Co., stationery, B. D. Bent, grocery, upstairs, H. W. Rogers, insurance agent, W. M. Manning, barrister, H. R. McCully, Dentist, and O. Myers, con-

tractor. The upper flat is occupied by the Marshland's club.

The building is one of the finest in the town and is owned by N. A. Rhodes and Wm. A. Fillmore. Wilson and Brawn carry about \$20,000 worth of goods fairly well covered by insurance. Mr. Brawn in attempting to put out the fire had both hands badly burned.

The firemen are making a desperate fight and the chances of saving the block are good, although the goods in Bent's and Wilson & Brawn stores will be badly damaged.

A later despatch from Amherst says the fire is under control.

INFANTICIDE AT AMHERST

Body of Newly Born Male Child Found
on a Doorstep.

AMHERST, N. S., Oct. 10.—(Special.)—The body of a new-born, fully developed male child was found on the door step of Mr. Dennis Madden's house, Prince Arthur street, last evening. The police were notified and removed the body to a physician's office nearby.

The little one was apparently just alive when found, but expired almost immediately.

The body was well wrapped up. No clue has yet been found as to the perpetrators of the foul deed, but the police are making efforts to locate them.

An inquest will be held this afternoon before Coroner Avar.

DEATH AT ST. JOHN.

James Monson, Veteran Dry Goods
Merchant, is no more.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 10.—(Special.)—James Monson, probably the oldest dry goods merchant in this city, died this morning, aged 77.

He was one of the early kings of the dry goods business here. His commercial place for years has been the finest in the city.

He was a native of Scotland and leaves a grown up family.

Miles for years a well known Sunbury County physician residing at Burton. The deceased lady was in her 71st year and is survived by one daughter Mrs. Wm. A. Gibson of St. John with whom she resided. The remains will be brought to Burton on Friday by steamer Majestic and interment will take place in the Methodist cemetery near the Court house at that place.

The late Mrs. Miles was a lady who had many friends in this city as well as in Sunbury County and all will be sorry to learn of her death.

VERY SUDDEN DEATH.

Mrs. Jesse Moore of Springfield Ex-
pired While Churning.

Mrs. Jane Moore, wife of Mr. Jesse Moore, of Springfield, died very suddenly at that place yesterday afternoon from heart failure. The deceased lady was around the house during the day and appeared to be in the best of health. She was operating a churn when she suddenly dropped to the floor and expired almost instantly.

The late Mrs. Moore was sixty-four years of age and is survived by her husband, one son, at home, and two daughters in the States.

The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon at Springfield under the direction of R. B. Adams.

SPRINGHILL STRIKE

A Basis of Agreement Likely to be
Reached in a Day or Two

HALIFAX, N. S., October 9.—There appears to be a good chance of a basis of agreement for settlement of the Springhill strike within the next day or two. When the conference between the miners and government adjourned last night it seemed there were some insuperable difficulties, but today a new suggestion was made which will come up for consideration before a conference called for tomorrow afternoon. The nature of this suggestion none of the parties will divulge, indeed they are keeping the whole proceedings very quiet.

It did not come from the company, which is taking no part in the negotiations, and stands flat on the conciliation board's awards, but from the government, if it proves acceptable to the delegation from Springhill, which is here, a special meeting of the board with the workingmen's lodge, P. W. A. association, will be called in Springhill on Friday evening, when the whole membership will hear the report and the strike, on the strength of it, may be called off.

The government is hopeful that the trouble will be ended, but the committee, while somewhat hopeful, are not specially confident. It depends to a large extent on a statement to be made at tomorrow's conference by Grand Secretary Moffatt.

AN INCREASE OF PAY

Granted to Canadian Pacific Operators
Over the Entire System

MONTREAL, Que., October 9.—It was admitted today at C. P. R. headquarters that while the arbitrators have been endeavoring to reach an unanimous report on the dispute between the telegraphers and the company the latter has granted the men all over the system an increase of 12 1/2 per cent. with extra pay for Sunday work.

Telegrams have been sent to all divisional points with instructions that the increase was effective Oct. 1.

It is not known what position the O.R.T. will take. The heads of the union have called for a vote. They demanded a 20 per cent. increase. The company in granting the increase cut out the two weeks' holidays, which have in the past been given with pay. A hitch is likely to develop over this.

A CALL TO ENGLAND.

Rev. J. D. Freeman, M. A., for several years pastor of the Brunswick street Baptist church, of this city, has lately been called to the pastorate of the Belvoir street Baptist church, Leicester, England. Mr. Freeman has been in the old country several months, and it is not unlikely he will remain there. The Leicester Daily Post of Sept. 26th says in an editorial note: "Mr. Freeman has preached on several occasions recently, and should he accept the call he can hardly fail to prove a valuable acquisition to the Free church ministry of Leicester." The famous Rev. Robt. Hill was pastor of this church for more than half a century.
