

A FAMOUS POISONER.

Christiana Edmunds Dead in Broadmoore Asylum--Dis-tributed Chocolates Doctored With Strychnine to Children Thirty-five Years Ago.

LONDON, October 3.—By the death of a woman from sende de ay in the Broadmoore Lunatic Asylum this week was one of the most extraordinary crimes in judicial annals was recalled.

Christiana Edmunds, a well educated woman, in easy circumstances, lived with her mother at Brighton. She formed the acquaintance, as a patient of a local medical man and his wife. After a period, during which the Edmunds woman's friendship for the doctor developed into a passion, the doctor's wife died under circumstances suggesting that she had been poisoned by eating sweets.

Thereupon, with systematic cunning she entered upon a scheme of distributing poisoned chocolates, to divert suspicion from herself. She sent a boy she met in the street to buy chocolate creams at certain confectioners. These she doctored with

strychnine and then returned them to the shop to be exchanged for another kind.

The unsuspecting confectioner made the change and resold the poisoned chocolates to another customer named Barker, one of whose children died within a few hours after eating them.

At the inquest Christiana Edmunds told an artful story of having been ill herself as the result of eating sweets bought at the shop referred to.

The verdict of the coroner's jury was "accidental death," exonerating the confectioner, who was a man of the highest probity.

For nearly a year afterward Miss Edmunds distributed little bags of poisoned chocolates, giving them to children in the streets. Six or seven children were made dangerously ill, but survived. The woman was finally convicted of the death of the Barker boy and condemned to death. Her sentence was commuted and she was sent to Broadmoor Asylum thirty-five years ago.

The eager benefactor addressed his letter to the Guildford Board of Guardians, and it has just been read to that body. The letter is as follows:

"I guess you will be kinder surprised at me writing to you, as you don't know me or I you, but I want you to help me, if you can, and I think you can. Well, I come right to the point. I am in want of a wife—women are scarce out here and I know there are plenty in the Old Country, and I guess some of you gentlemen knows of some nice girl who would like a husband. I am in a position to be comfortable, but I ain't a millionaire. I'm a tradesman and I've got a good job and earning \$5. a day or in English money about a pound; and if I got a good helpmate I am going to start a business of my own.

"I am an Englishman. I came out to this country about five years ago. My home was in a midland county. I am the son of a respectable tradesman. I am 26 years of age and big and strong; stand 6ft. in my socks, weigh 13 stones, am of a dark complexion, and ain't bad looking. Sources like selling a horse, don't it? Well, I kinder guess I am putting myself up for sale alright. Well if you know of a nice girl who stands anything over five ft. 6 in. up to the 6 ft. and who ain't bad looking, and who has got nice ways and dispositions—I don't want an angel—but a sensible girl about 20 to 23 years old. NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—Formal announcement of the engagement of Miss Gladys Vanderbilt to Count Laszlo Szeichony, of Buda Pest was made today, but no date is set for the wedding. It is expected to take place at the Vanderbilt mansion in Newport some time this Autumn.

The Count is 28 years old, rich, good looking, has a hereditary seat in Hungarian parliament, and is one of the Chamberlains, of the Austrian Emperor.

Miss Vanderbilt is the youngest child of the late Cornelius Vanderbilt, and inherited from her father a fortune of more than \$10,000,000. She became into possession of her inheritance on attaining her majority last August.

HONEST SECOND-HAND DEALER.

Found \$2,500 in a Bag He Purchased for Six Dollars, and Turned it Over to Montreal Police.

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 3.—The conscience of a second-hand dealer saves one of England's aristocrats \$2,500 and his family tree. Three days ago two men entered the second-hand store of Julius Miller and sold a leather grip and a pair of field glasses, getting \$6 all told. Miller later examined the bag and found in the pocket an envelope containing one hundred five pound notes, about \$2,500 in Canadian money, the family tree of Hon. Percy Holt and a number of documents relating to the family, one of which was of the date 1563. Miller says he was sorely tempted to keep the money, but after a wrestle with his conscience he phoned Chief Carpenter. He found out that Hon. Percy Holt was on his way to Vancouver and his trunk were to be forwarded to him there. Part of his baggage, however, was stolen from the C.P.R. wharf.

Robert Hazelton, sentenced last week to ten years for the St. Croix Bark burglary has been identified as a man who served two years some time ago for stabbing a man near Quebec. He is also thought to have been one of the gang who robbed the jewelry store in Alexandria, Ontario, a year ago.

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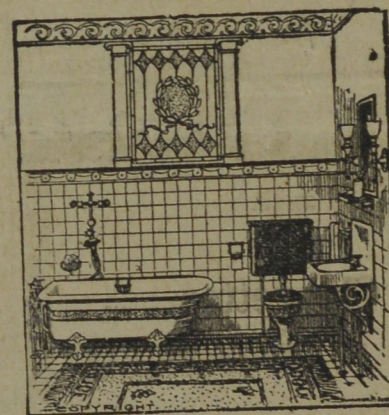
