MR. GRAHAM'S CAREER.

Mr. Graham is forty-eight years old, and has been a member of the Ontario legislature since 1898. After the defeat of the Ross government, a reorganization of the Ontario Liberal party became necessary, under new leadership. Hon. Geo. W. Ross went to the Senate, and Mr. Graham became leader of the opposition.

Mr. Graham is a journalist. He managed the Morrisburg Herald for eleven years, was associate editor of the Ottawa Free Press for a time, and later managing director of the Brockville Recorder. He is a native of Eganville, Ontario, and of Irish descent. While living in Morrisburg he was active in Municipal affairs, and since 1898 has represented Brockville in the provincial legislature. When the Hon. J. R. Stratton in November, 1904, resigned the provincial secretaryship, Mr. Graham succeeded him, but went out with the Ross government in the following February.

The Montreal Herald says:

Mr. Graham is just what the Liberal party in Ontario needs, a sociable, fighting Liberal, with a clean record. These were the qualities that prevailed with his associates in the Ontario legislature to select him for the leadership of the opposition after the retirement of Mr. Ross. And after he had been chosen, and the legislature had adjourned after giving him his first experience of leadership, he addressed himself to the work of reconstructing the fighting effectiveness of the party in all parts of the province, with a success that was patent from the first.

The Liberal party in Ontario, after the smashing defeat it re-

ceived at the hands of Mr. Whitney a couple of years ago, is already in a situation to face another election with good hope of winning back lost ground whenever Mr. Whitney sees fit to call for the encounter. With the Conservatives everywhere putting forth great efforts at organization so as to be ready for the next election, it is gratifying to note that in Ontario, at last, the Liberals appear to be resolved to revive the fighting spirit which won the province for Liberalism when the Conservatives held office at Ottawa.

HOW LINCOLN HEARD.

Mrs. Lincoln had returned to City Point with a party which included Senator Sumner and Senator and Mrs. Harlan. They made a visit to Richmond, accompanied by Captain Penrose, while the President remained at City Point, the guest of Admiral Porter, until the 8th. Then, having heard of the injury to Secretary Seward when he was thrown from his carriage in a runaway accident, he felt that he must go back to Washington. He had intended to remain until Lee surrendered.

He reached home Sunday evening, the 9th. The President's carriage met us at the

wharf. There Mr. Lincoln parted from Captain Penrose; he took the captain by the hand and thanked him for the manner in which he had performed his duty. Then he started for the White House.

The streets were alive with people, all very much excited. There were bonfires everywhere. We were all curious to know what had happened. Tad was so excited he couldn't keep still. We halted the carriage and asked a bystander:

"What has happened?"

He looked at us in amazement, not recognizing Mr. Lincoln:

"Why, where have you been? Lee has surrendered."—Harpers.

MILLIONS HAVE VANISHED

LONDON, August 28.—The next issue of the Bankers' Magazine will print a table of millions evaporated in the Stock Exchange by the depreciation of securities of all grades and of all varieties, which the editor likens to "a survey of a district afflicted by some devastating calamity." For August the decline in 387 representative stocks reached the staggering total of \$690,000,000. This makes an aggregate of \$1,725,000,000 since the beginning of the year, of which \$555,000,000 is in American railroad shares, \$240,000,000 in British funds and \$180,000,000 in British railway and ordinary stocks. Judged purely from a percentage basis, however, the most serious losses have been in the South African market, averaging about 25 per cent. As regards the month itself the table indicates that American railroad securities are far in the front with a shrinkage of \$260,000,000.

NATIONALIST M.P. ARRESTED WITH FORTY OTHERS.

James P. Farrell and Many Others Charged With Holding Unlawful Assembly.

LONGFORD, Ireland, Aug. 29.—James P. Farrell, Irish Nationalist member of Parliament for North Longford, and forty other persons were arrested early this morning and are now being tried by a special court, convened for the purpose on the charge of taking part in "an unlawful assembly likely to cause a riot."

Mr. Farrell had been holding meetings throughout his constituency, at which exciting scenes occurred between Nationalists and members of the Sinn Féin Society. In addition, many cattle have been driven from the grazing lands district, which the prosecution alleges was encouraged by Mr. Farrell and other speakers. Large forces of police are being dispatched here, trouble being anticipated. Mr. Farrell is the editor and proprietor of the Longford Leader, a Nationalist newspaper circulating in the counties of Longford, Westmeath, Roscommon and Leitrim, and is the author of a history of the county of Longford and other books.

At the general election of 1900 Mr. Farrell was returned unopposed from North Longford, succeeding Justin McCarthy, who resigned.

TURKS RAVAGING PERSIAN VILLAGES.

They Have Killed Officers, Carried Away Women and Deified Churches.

Teheran, Aug. 27.—General Sum-san Dowleh and other Persian officers, according to reports received here, have been killed by the invading Turks, after having been taken prisoners. Many inoffensive villagers, including women and children, have been slaughtered, a number of women have been carried off, a church has been defiled and much grain and other property has been taken or destroyed. Turkish regular troops, with artillery, were within four miles of Brumiah, on August 15. There are no signs of the withdrawal of Turks from Persian territory.

Another report says that the Turks have occupied Merivan, in Persian Kurdistan, east of Sulaimania. In a telegram asking for help, the clergy and inhabitants of Merivan add that if the Persian government is powerless the people must beg Russia to assist them.
