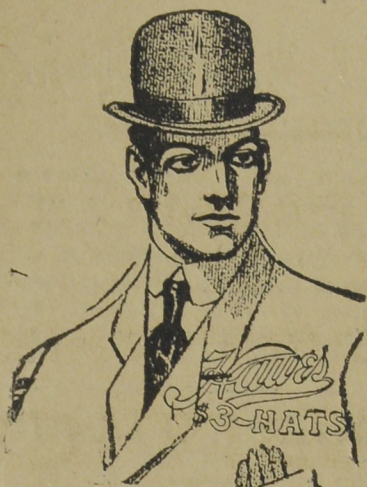

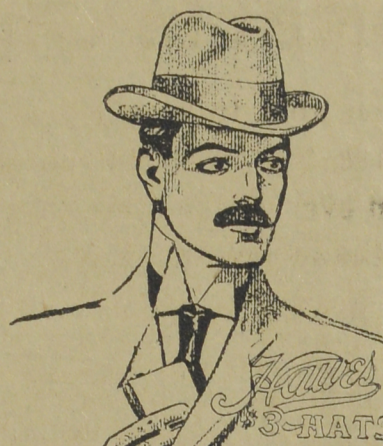

ALBERT ACCIDENTS

Boy Killed and Man Perhaps Fatally Injured

HILLSBORO, Aug. 29.—John Taylor, the fifteen year old son of Jas. Taylor of Lower Hillsboro, met with a terrible death yesterday morning. While oiling the machinery of a car he got entangled in the chain and was so crushed that he only lived a few minutes after he was extricated. Another shocking accident occurred at Plaster Quarry yesterday afternoon. S. Reynolds being the victim. While stepping into a car in the tunnel Mr. Reynolds missed his footing and fell under the car, which passed over his limbs, cutting off both feet and breaking one leg. He is not expected to recover.

LETTER FROM DR. IRVINE.

In Which He Discusses Matters in Connection with the Hospital.

To the Editor of The Herald:

Sir, In Monday's issue of one of our daily papers, as well as in one of the St. John dailies of the same date, it was stated that I was included in the applicants for appointment to the visiting staff of the Victoria General Hospital.

It is true that some three years ago, I offered to the trustees of that institution certain suggestions regarding what I considered desirable modifications of the bye law governing the appointment of the visiting medical staff of the Victoria General Hospital, "by which provision this institution would be used as originally intended (bye law No. 13) regarding ward patients, viz: Charity to the sick and disabled &c., &c., and the advancement of medical science." And to quote further from my letter to these gentlemen, dated March 6th, 1905—"Under the present regime the advancement of medical science is now limited to six visiting physicians, which in my judgment is unfair, especially when we consider that there are other physicians residing and practising in the city who are as well qualified professionally as many of the present staff, and who have demonstrated their interest in the institution, who would also like to benefit by any hospital work that would naturally come under their supervision were they members of the visiting staff."

The appointment of the visiting staff reads thus, (or did at that time) "Such resident medical practitioners as shall from time to time to be appointed." You perceive therefrom that the founder of this institution or at least its original trustees or possibly both did not specify or intend that the clinical advantages and benefits accruing from the study of the diseases or accidents commonly seen in the wards of the hospital should be monopolized and used for the benefit of a few physicians, whose tenure of office ends only with life. "This, I contend is not fair, especially to the younger members of the profession, who probably may need such opportunities more, and use them possibly to better advantage than those may years in the profession, and to whom they are as an old story frequently repeated."

"This hospital has increased in size, importance and reputation commensurate with progress in all lines, and I trust shall continue to increase, and I feel satisfied that you must regard it as only reasonable and fair that the visiting staff might likewise be increased."

"Under the present arrangement only two physicians are on duty during the same months. An increase of the visiting staff simply means a longer vacation for those off duty."

"Further—and one of the most humiliating features—the absence of one's name from these cards or programs, which may be seen in any drug store, hotel, office or wherever it happens to be with foot notes in large type—'Kindly preserve this notice and put in a conspicuous place for reference' (a most unethical thing, I admit) is not very complimentary to those off the staff and in many ways militates against their prestige and professional standing in the eyes of many people, even among the majority of our most intelligent citizens, and almost universally with out of town people. This, I have good grounds for realizing, as this very fact has on several occasions operated to my own detriment, for many think that a hospital appointment implies superior professional attainment, (which is really the case in most great hospitals.) Hence, speaking for myself, I feel that I should like to be on your visiting staff, and thus participate in any benefits that may result therefrom."

You will therefore see Mr. Editor, that my application was contingent upon the adoption of the above suggestion in change of bye law.

I may say that this communication received but scant courtesy by these gentlemen, and learning that a revision of the entire book of bye laws was anticipated, the following communication, dated April 26th, 1906, was addressed by Dr. B. M. Mullin and myself:

"To the Trustees of Victoria General Hospital, Fredericton, N. B.:

Sirs,—Being legally qualified physicians within the city of Fredericton, and natives of the province of

New Brunswick (Dr. Ryan having assured us that he intended removing) whose names do not appear in your revised bye laws, or on your programs, so conspicuous in all drug stores, hotels, offices and many other places of business elsewhere, we feel that we are unjustly discriminated against in the eyes of the public by not being placed on a par with other physicians as members of the medical staff of the public department of the Victoria General Hospital, which fact we realize acts to our professional disadvantage in a variety of ways."

"Hence we feel, being in every way eligible for such appointment, and there being no provision in the bye law precluding the same, and no reason ever vouchsafed why such an increase in the staff might not be advantageous, and it being solely the prerogative of the trustees, and not of the medical staff, to make these appointments, that we are deprived of the courtesy and consideration, which, being on an equal with our contemporaries, we have a right to command."

"Having thus acquainted you with our feelings in this regard, we hereby make formal application for appointment on the staff."

This, Mr. Editor, met with similar fate.

So you see that any application I ever made was not with the intention of procuring said appointment over the heads of my seniors in years, residence or practice. Neither have I ever made any further application as the report of the secretary implied in one of our dailies some months ago, and which statement has been reiterated in Monday's issue of the same journal, for which statement he has had not one iota of authority or valid reason for making.

If you can spare the space for this somewhat exhaustive letter, you will go both my colleague and myself a courteous act, placing us in a correct light in respect to our attitude towards this institution.
