

DISCOVERY OF NEW TRIBE

Famous Traveller who recently brought back Strange
Tale of a New People from far Northwest is
Native of Prince Edward Island.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Nov. 18.—Among the Prince Edward Islanders who have been winning fame for themselves abroad is Dr. George B. Gordon, son of Captain James Gordon, and a native of New Perth, where he formerly resided. Dr. Gordon has been engaged in many exploring expeditions in the interests of archaeology, and is the author of a valuable work on the subject. A correspondent from Philadelphia furnishes the following interesting facts concerning his recent experience in the Frozen North.

"Dr. George B. Gordon, who is now curator of the University of Pennsylvania's archaeological department, during his six months' expedition through the wildest regions of the Northwest, discovered a new race living along the Koskowi River in Alaska.

"Dr. Gordon brings back a strange tale of this new race, which had never before been seen a white man, and which differs from all other tribes of Alaskan Indians. Dr. Gordon heard rumors of them in 1905, and after innumerable hardships he reached the territory in which these aborigines live in Adamic simplicity.

They are called by the Eskimos 'Kuskwagmites,' and show strong traces of Mongolian ancestry. Crime and vice are utterly unknown among them, and their religion is Pantheism. They know absolutely nothing of the corruption and degeneracy

with which the White have infected the Athabaskan Indians and Eskimos. Dr. Gordon lived for several months among them.

"Though they are dying out," Dr. Gordon said, "they are strong and clean physically and morally, and are intelligent. They have retained the most ancient characteristics of dress and speech. In clothing, instead of wearing furs, they wear the breasts of loons and various species of ducks, which abound in the river.

"They are monogamists, and no such thing is known among them. They are permitted by their priests to have more than one wife, but never do so. They have no laws at all, but are governed by patriarchs. They are tall, and the women graceful and beautiful. There are only four hundred of them left.

"Dr. Gordon added:—
"It is to be hoped for their own sakes that they may die out before the white traders get to them. Then they can die as cleanly and happily as they live.

"Dr. Gordon and his helper traveled down the Koskowi 1,500 in a small sloop. When they reached Behring Sea, they sailed for Nome, were caught in equinoctial gales and were adrift three weeks. Dr. Gordon was forced to throw his provisions overboard to save his specimens. He landed at Nome nearly dead with hunger and exposure."

Scandalous Tactics of the Moncton Tory

Ottawa Free Press: Some of the lesser Conservative newspapers never seem to be able to grasp the point that the political battle should be fought with honor and without resort to the methods of the gutter. One of these organs is the Times of Moncton, N. B., which, being unable to find any real flaw in the armor of the Liberal government, has to have recourse to the vilest kinds of personal insinuations.

Here is a sample of its political warfare. The other day when the Minister of Railways and his party passed through Moncton the Times published a statement that when a certain man under the influence of liquor at Dorchester was asked where he "got his load," he "rather proudly declared that it was the result of beverages obtained on the Minister's special."

When the reader is told that there was no liquor of any sort upon the special train the wickedness of this insinuation is apparent. Both Hon. G. P. Graham, the Minister of Railways, and Mr. M. J. Butler, the Deputy Minister, are total abstainers from the use of intoxicating liquors and would not countenance the presence of liquor on any train on which they were travelling if they knew it.

Surely there are limits to this sort of political blackguardism! Personal insult and slander are but poor weapons for a party organ, and it is to be hoped that some of the more reputable of the Conservative newspapers will administer to the Times the rebuke which it deserves.

A WATCH IN A RING.

London Overtaken by a New Fad.

London, Nov. 18.—Tiny watches, that tell the time with surprising accuracy and which are worn on finger rings over milady's glove, are the very latest novelties in the form of practical ornaments to be seen now in the windows of a Bond street jeweller.

The jeweller in question received one of these ring watches recently from his Swiss watchmaker, who had his workmen make the ornament as a result of an argument over the question into how small a space the works of an accurate timepiece could be composed.

The jeweller placed the tiny ornament in his window as a curiosity, but one day a smartly-dressed lady entered the shop to make a close examination of the curiosity and persuaded him to sell it for \$250. She slipped it upon her finger over her glove and left the shop.

Shortly after the jeweller had so many calls for ring watches that he ordered a dozen from his watchmaker and now the fashion seems to be fairly well established.

But this latest luxury is an expensive one, for the cheapest ring watch costs \$100, and from this the price ranges up to three or even four times that amount, the price varying, of course, with the number and quality of gems used. The workmanship, however, is the same in each watch, and the works will stand a surprising amount of knocking about before requiring repair. They keep excellent time, to within a minute a day.

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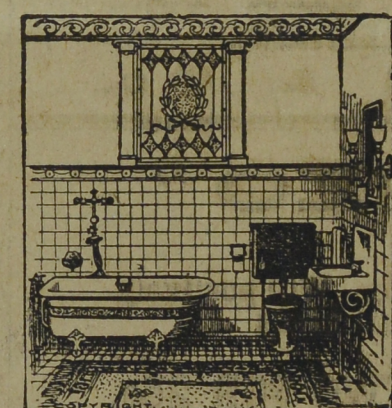

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MIXED MARRIAGES

Roman Catholic Archbishop of Mon-
treal Springs a Surprise.

Montreal, Nov. 18.—In a circular letter read in all Catholic churches in Montreal yesterday, Archbishop Bruchesi notifies the clergy under his charge that he will not in future grant permission for mixed marriages.

"Tell your parishioners in our name," says his grace, "that we will no longer grant dispensations for mixed marriages, as we have done in the past. They cannot, in future, expect to obtain these dispensations, even though they bring forward the weighty reasons of temporal advantage or mutual affection, even though they threaten to seek the services of a minister of another religion."

Attention is then drawn to the fact that any Catholic who is married by a Protestant minister will be liable to be excommunicated.

The letter has come as a surprise as marriages between Catholics and Protestants are frequently celebrated here, as, in fact, there are unions of the faith between the best Montreal families.

Archbishop Bruchesi writes, in his letter, many exhortations from the holy see to discourage such marriages, which the Catholic church has only tolerated, but can never forget that non-Catholic churches are opposed to her teaching. It is shown by the archbishop that the regulation he issues is not to cause any feeling of antagonism to those of another faith, but is solely in the interests of Roman Catholics.

ON THE GRIDIRON

Dalhousie Wins Nova Scotia Champion-
ship—Big Games in the States.

HALIFAX, N. S., November 18.—In the final game of football series played on the Wanderers' grounds on Saturday afternoon, Dalhousie defeated the Wanderers, 11 to 0. Three thousand persons saw the game, which was stubbornly contested. The Wanderers had the best of the forward play, but the superior work done by the college half-backs won the game for them. The trophy again goes to Dalhousie for eight successive years.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., November 17.—Football, with all its brilliant variations which had been predicted for it by recent rule-making and backed up with the best that there is in the old style of play, the latter undoubtedly made possible by her strength in both line and back field, won for Yale yesterday by a score of 12 to 10, her annual game with Princeton on Yale field in the presence of a throng which could have not fallen under thirty-four thousand.

BOSTON, Mass., November 17.—Twelve hundred of the Dartmouth students, with half as many more of the younger Dartmouth Alumni flushed with their victory of 22 to 0 over the Harvard football team Saturday afternoon, swarmed the corridors of the down-town hotels last night and made the night gay and hilarious with their songs and cheers.

MAURETANIA'S TRIP

Sister Ship to Lusitania on Maiden
Voyage to New York.

QUEENSTOWN, November 18.—The steamer Mauretania, on her maiden voyage to the United States, was 207 miles east of Fastnet at ten o'clock last night. As she left Queenstown at eleven o'clock yesterday morning her position shows her to have made 265 miles in 11 hours.

The Mauretania did not attempt to make speed on her way from Liverpool down here as she only steamed from 19 to 21 knots an hour. She arrived at 8.15 yesterday morning, and transferred the mails and the passengers.

There was no hitch in the engine department, and everything went most satisfactorily. Capt. Pritchard said he had never sailed a vessel that behaved or steered so well.

When getting under way to leave Queenstown, the huge vessel swung around in almost her own length. She entered and left this harbor at almost low tide. She passed Rothes Point, outward bound at 1.45. A message received from the steamer says the weather was grey and calm and that she was as steady as a cathedral. She passed Fastnet at 1.31 yesterday afternoon.

A great number of excursionists came into Queenstown yesterday to see the new liner.

UPRISING FEARED IN CHINA.

Chinese Oppose Construction of British Railway Because it Will Disturb Ancestors.

WASHINGTON, D. C., November 15.—A serious uprising in China was reported to the State Department today by Consul-General Denby, of Shanghai. The immediate cause of the trouble appears to be the crossing of native cemeteries by the British railroad, which is being constructed from Shanghai to Du-Chow.

The Chinese, according to Denby's report, are pulling up the track laid and threatening violence to the men employed on the work. The conditions in that section of China confirm the reports recently received that China was on the verge of a very serious crisis and that the widely advertised progress of Chinese people is largely superficial and confined almost entirely to Imperial decrees. Unless further and more reassuring advice is received from Denby the Navy Department will likely be asked to send some small gunboats now in that vicinity to Shanghai to protect American interests there in towns further up the Yang Kiang.

The impression has been given that the Chinese people had made such progress that they would further railroad building and that the superstition that the iron monster would disturb the sleep of their ancestors no longer obtained, but the latest development is regarded as indicating that China is still as barbaric as she was centuries ago.
