BOSTON CRICKETERS.

Will Arrive Here July 31st and Play the Following Day.

Mr. H. G. Fenety, Secretary of the Fredericton Cricket Club, yesterday received a letter from the manager of Thorp's cricket team, of Boston which is to visit the maritime provinces the latter part of this month. The team will arrive in St. John July 29th, and play at St. John on the following day. On the 31st, they take the steamer for this city and on August 1 play a match with the Fredericton Club, returning to St. John by train the same evening. On Friday they will proceed to Halifax by way of Digby and the next day are booked to play the Halifax Wanderers. On the next day they play the Garrison Club and on the sixth they will go up against an all-Halifax team. They play the Windsor club on the seventh and return to St. John on the eighth. It is possible that before returning to Boston they will play a return match with St. John or play a Moncton team at St. John. Members of the local club are preparing to give

the visitors a good time during their stay here. The party will likely number about thirty persons.

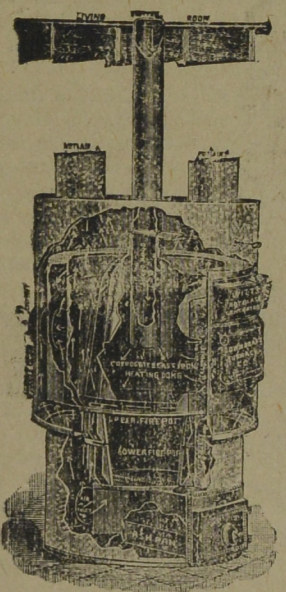

Midland, Ont., July 18.—(Special)—An explosion which caused the death of two men and the injury of another, occurred yesterday in O'Hara's woolen mills. The dead are: Edward O'Hara of Midland, and Elmer Hewson, of Thornbury.

THE TRANSCONTINENTAL.

Commission Lets Contracts for Nearly \$2,000,000 Worth of Steel Rails to be Made in Canada.

Ottawa, July 18.—(Special)—The National Transcontinental Railway Commission has awarded contracts for 65,571 tons of steel rails and fastenings.

The Soo company will receive over 22,000 tons for the Abitibi section, one half to be delivered in November

1st, 1908, and the other half in 1909. The balance of the rails over 43,000 tons, goes to the Sydney, N. S., company. The first half will require to be delivered in November, 1907, and the balance in July, 1908. Delivery will be at Edmonton, Quebec, and Levis. In round figures the cost will be about \$1,850,000.

CONFERENCE CLOSED.

C. of E. Sunday School Workers Depart for Home.

The annual conference of Church of England Sabbath School workers, which has been going on at the Church Hall since Tuesday, was brought to a close at six o'clock last evening, and the delegates have returned to their homes.

At the opening of the afternoon session yesterday an excellent paper on missionary work by Sunday school children, prepared by Mrs. Langford of St. Andrew's, was read by Rev. Canon Montgomery.

Miss Ethel Jarvis of St. John gave a sand table lesson which was much enjoyed.

Mr. T. B. Kidner, director of manual training, read a valuable paper in which he dealt in an entertaining manner with the history of education. Quite a lengthy discussion took place on the desirability of the conference uniting with Quebec in the appointment of a general secretary for Sunday school work. It was decided to refer the matter to the synod.

After the customary votes of thanks had been adopted the meeting adjourned with singing and prayer.
