SOMETHING DOING.

Montreal Man Shot by the Police While Try- ing to Kidnap a Girl.

MONTREAL, Oct. 5.—(Special)—While attempting to kidnap a young lady, while she was on her way to her home on Dorchester street last night, a young Greek, named Nicholas Peters, clerk in a St. Lawrence street store, was shot in the leg by Police Officer Fisher, who was attracted to the spot by the screams of the young lady.

Peters, who is 25 years of age, followed the young lady after she had alighted from a car, and caught her when she was unlocking the door at her home.

HORRIBLE! HORRIBLE!

Japanese Cartridge Factory Exploded Killing 63 Girls and Injuring Over Three Score Others.

TOKIO, Japan, Oct. 5.—(Special)—A terrible explosion occurred this morning at Takastake factory, Osha, while a number of girls were at work sorting shells and cartridges which had been condemned.

Sixty three girls were killed and over sixty others injured. As this despatch is sent the factory is on fire, and a number of boats containing explosives are also burning.

The boy died a few hours afterwards.

ESTEEMED LADY'S DEATH.

Mrs. William Mitchell, Mother of the
Late Premier Mitchell, is Dead.

The death occurred at her home at Keswick Ridge this morning of Mrs. Ann Mitchell, widow of the late Mr. William Mitchell, and mother of the late Hon. James Mitchell, at one time premier of New Brunswick. She had reached the advanced age of ninety-two years and was in the enjoyment of excellent health up to a fortnight ago when she suffered a stroke of paralysis. Although every thing possible was done for her she failed to rally from the effects of the stroke, and members of the family were quite prepared for the announcement of her death.

The deceased lady is survived by a family of two sons, George of Keswick Ridge with whom she resided, and William, hardware merchant of Souris, Man., and two daughters, Mrs. Thomas McKeen of Tripp Settlement, and Mrs. Samuel Burpee of Edmundston. Mr. Robert Mitchell of this city and Mr. John Anderson, ex-M. P. of the Barony are brothers-in-law and Mr. John A. Campbell, M. P. of Kingsclear a nephew of the deceased.

The late Mrs. Mitchell was a lady of noble Christian character, and had a very large circle of acquaintances who will be sorry to learn of her death. Although called upon to bear a heavy burden of sorrow during her long life time, she always maintained a cheerful demeanor, and sought comfort and solace from a higher power. Her many excellent qualities made her beloved by all who enjoyed her acquaintance.

The funeral will take place on Monday morning at ten o'clock with services at the house by Rev. G. Rose, congregationalist. Interment will be made at Scotch Settlement. Mr. R. B. Adams is the officiating undertaker.

BIG LUMBER DEAL.

American Concern has Bought Ernest
Hutchinson's North Shore Prop-
erties for Half a Million.

Another big New Brunswick lumber property is passing into the hands of American capitalists.

The seller this time is Ernest Hutchinson ex M. P. of Douglastown, Northumberland County, who possesses large lumber interests in that vicinity, and the purchaser is the International Paper Co. Mr. Hutchinson was in St. John yesterday on his way to Bangor to formally complete the transaction.

The property which Mr. Hutchinson is selling—consists of forty-five square miles of granted timber land and 300 square miles of crown lands held under lease from the government. In addition, there is a general store and a large and well equipped mill. The transfer will take place immediately, but Mr. Hutchinson will finish sawing the season's cut and the new owners will probably will not take active control till spring.

The new company intend to make a large number of improvements and it is reported that, in the near future, they may start a pulp and perhaps a paper mill in connection. The price paid is said to be in the vicinity of half a million.

This is the fifth big property on the north shore to be absorbed by Americans during the past couple of years.

HOME FROM EUROPE.

Fielding and Brodeur Return from their Long Stay Abroad.

QUEBEC, Oct. 5.—Hon. Messrs. Fielding and Brodeur landed from the steamer Victorian at 2 p. m. yesterday, and were met by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Premier Gouin, Hon. Mr. Pugsley and others of their colleagues. Madame Brodeur and Mrs. Fielding and members of their families were taken down the river by Capt. Gourdeau on board the Lady Grey to meet the steamer.

RIMOUSKI, Oct. 5.—Hon. L. P. Brodeur, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, in the course of an interview, during the brief stay of the Victorian here, said that in Europe the attention of all classes of people was turned toward Canada. "Our financial situation inspired great confidence in the markets of Germany, Russia and Australia. Formerly the great European countries did not find out native products quoted on the market, but this has been changed."

Mr. Brodeur said the greeting he had met with in France had been cordial. As for the Franco-Canadian treaty he could say nothing for the moment. It was the first time Canadians had negotiated a treaty for their own country. A new era of autonomous emancipation was opening for Canada.

Before embarking for Canada, Messrs. Brodeur and Fielding were tendered a luncheon at Liverpool. Hon. Mr. Brodeur met Mr. Davidson, the engineer who was called to Montreal by the Harbor Commission while in Bristol. The minister added that he was delighted to be in Canada again, after six months' absence.
