

OLD TIMES RECALLED.

A Glance Into the Local News of Fredericton Twenty-six Years Ago.

(Farmer files, Sept. 29, 1881)

Mr. C. E. Grosvenor, of Canterbury, sent down a large stock of cattle on Saturday to the Halifax exhibition.

Sheriff Temple, Mayor Fisher, Robt. Orr and Mr. Barry Smith, left by train for the Halifax exhibition on Monday.

A valuable bay lumbering horse belonging to Mr. William Fowler, died in his stable, Regent street, on Tuesday night.

Mrs. James Considine, Jr., who had been ailing ever since she returned home with her children from St. Joseph, Missouri, where her husband now is, died on Tuesday of consumption at the residence of her father-in-law, Regent street.

We would suggest to the secretary of the sports committee, the propriety of asking, as a favor, that owners of cows keep their cattle housed on Monday next, so that they will not interfere with the carrying out of the programme of sports.

A requisition praying that Conductors Brown, late of the St. John & Maine Railway, be reinstated in his old position has been taken about town lately by John A. Morrison, Esq. It is being universally signed by the travelling public.

Messrs. Caleb and Charles Evans, of Cardigan Settlement, brothers of Mr. Ben Evans, of Nashwaakisis, left here by train yesterday morning for Colorado.

The city, it is said, is now paying 7 per cent. for money to redeem the 7 per cent. issue of debentures which was called in, in order to float debentures at 5.

The repairs to the Free Baptist church will likely be completed on the 1st of November. Mr. Milden, sub-contractor for carpenter work, on the Parliament buildings, is in charge of the work.

Mr. J. D. Hazen, secretary of the Union Cricket Club, received a letter from Sussex yesterday stating that if our eleven will not have heard to the contrary by Saturday, they will be here to play the holiday cricket match on the Officers' Square.

The locomotive "Oronoco," of the Fredericton Railway has been thoroughly overhauled and repaired by Mr. Robert Donaldson, one of the employees of the road, and is now in splendid condition for the fall and winter work. As this has been the first job of this kind done by Mr. Donaldson, the thoroughness of the work of reconstruction reflects great credit on him as a workman.

Mr. Jas. Roberts, late of the police force, has, since his resignation, been working up quite a business in a quiet way. He is constantly exporting game fowl, of which he has a great variety, to different parts of the province, and has lately found that the orders which come in to him are more than he can attend to. His henery on Campbell street is well worth a visit.

On Monday several lots of hemlock bark lands, containing in all 2,959 acres, were put up at auction by Mr. Andrew Inches, pursuant to notice, in the Crown Land Office. It seems to have been understood that there would be no opposition. The only interested parties were Mr. Chas. Miller and Mr. Geo. McLeod, and the former purchased all the lots for \$2 per acre.

The Hotel DeVeber, which was so well known by all travellers passing through Gagetown, was burned there on Thursday night. It was owned by Jas. W. DeVeber, had no insurance, and was occupied by a man named Standish, who ministered spiritual comforts to passers by, contrary to the provisions of the C. T. A.

The American Fish Co.'s quarters, on Phoenix Square, was quite a popular resort during the past week, owing to the fact that the manager had an immense sword fish on the counter. It measured 10 1/2 feet in length, and weighed 244 pounds. The sword, which was taken from it and which is in possession of Prof. Bailey, and will hereafter be found in the University museum, was three feet long.

The drying house of the Jones & Jeffrey Furniture Company, St. Mary's, was destroyed by fire Saturday night. The main body of the factory would also have been reduced to ashes but for the prompt action of the St. Mary's fire brigade, under Major Staples. There was insurance on the property destroyed which was valued at \$200.

Among the young men who have lately left Fredericton to pursue their studies abroad is Mr. John Gregory, eldest son of the late Dr. T. V. Gregory. He left this city enroute to Guelph, Ontario, where he intends to enter on a two years' course at the agricultural college.

A severe accident, which has excited general sympathy on the part of her acquaintances both at home and in this city, befell Miss Harrison, daughter of Mr. James Harrison, of Mauderville, on Thursday evening. Miss Harrison was driving to the parlor concert at the rectory there, when she was thrown from her carriage, dislocating her elbow and breaking her arm a little above. Dr. Brown was soon in attendance and set the injured member, but the lady is said to be still suffering intense pain.

More lumber has been rafted by the Fredericton Boom Company the past season than ever before, owing to the special advantages that the spring and summer offered. At the Douglas boom, above the city, 19,

051 joints of logs, containing about 57,000,000 feet have been rafted; and at the Glasier booms the men have rafted 12,000, representing 36,000,000 feet. In the Douglas boom 7,000,000 and in Glasier's 3,000,000 feet still remain unrafted. The whole season's operations by the company will amount to the rafting of over 100,000,000 feet of lumber.

ACCIDENT.

Mr. Hamilton McKee was the victim of a slight accident on Tuesday morning at the York Driving Park where the fine weather drew all the trotters of the city. There were probably a dozen members of the driving association with their horses on the track, and Mr. McKee was making his way with his trotting mare past them in a sulky. He was in the act of endeavoring to pass speedily between Mr. A. A. Sterling and Mr. John Wiley, as the latter were walking their horses, but the space between them proved too small. Mr. Wiley turned to one side and the McKee mare drew one wheel of the sulky over the axle of Mr. Sterling's gig, throwing Mr. McKee to the ground and smashing the sulky to pieces. Mr. Sterling's sulky had its axle also sprung by the accident. Fortunately Mr. McKee held a tight rein, and received only a big scare and slight injuries, so that he was able to walk home. His mare acted peaceably and is still as sound as ever.

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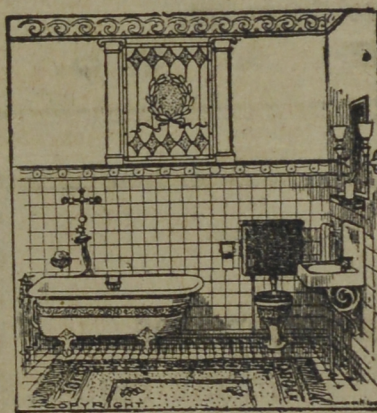
