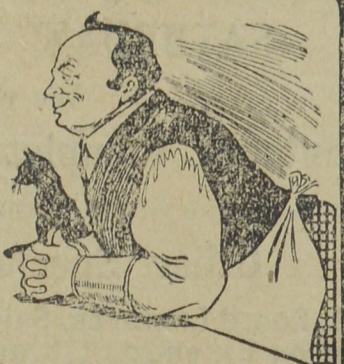

POLITICS IN QUEBEC.

Effect and Reason of Mr. Prevost's Resignation.

MONTREAL, Oct. 4.—In conversation today with a prominent member of the Quebec Legislature the question of the present cabinet mix-up was discussed.

"What is really the cause of Mr. Prevost's resignation?" your correspondent asked.

"Well, he gave as a reason that he wanted to meet Mr. Asselin on a level in the coming libel suit," was the answer.

"But what was the real reason?"

"Well, perhaps he was not always wise and judicious in his actions. While there was no irregularities in his department, he has in a measure lost the confidence of the people, and his action will restore any lost confidence of the people. Mr. Gouin has promised and will hold an investigation into the whole affair at the next session of the House. At this investigation we will prove that Mr. Turgeon is blameless and that Mr. Bourassa's charges are groundless."

"What about Bourassa's influence in Quebec?" was asked.

"He is only 'a feu de paille' as we say in French. He has been given twenty counties by Mr. Leblanc, leader of the Conservative party, and will try to carry these, but it is a certainty that he will not carry

four. Wherever he goes it is the Conservatives who welcome him. With their seven members of the house and the Liberals with 67 the Conservatives grasp at anything that will help them. Mr. Bourassa may help them a little, but he is vastly overrated and has very little real influence over the mass of the people. All his speeches are based on rumors, and when investigation comes it will be found that all his charges are false. For instance, his charge that Baron Delepine made \$85,000 is false. He never made one cent. Then his charge against Hon. R. Lemieux was based on false rumor. Mr. Lemieux and Senator Dancurand never offered him a portfolio."

"Was it Mr. Bourassa who forced Mr. Prevost to resign?" was asked.

"No, not at all," was the decided answer. "Mr. Prevost was simply innocuous in a few minor points and lost the confidence of the people. His resignation and the coming government investigation will restore confidence not only in himself but also in Messrs. Turgeon, Gouin, and the whole administration. Premier Gouin has given good government to the province and before he goes to the country, two years hence, he will be stronger than ever."

KIPLING AT WINNIPEG

Eloquent Address Before the Canadian Club

WINNIPEG, Oct. 2.—Through the efforts of Secretary Mitchell, Rudyard Kipling was induced to speak before the Canadian Club this evening. The attendance of members was without doubt the largest ever held at the club. Mr. G. R. Crowe, President of the Club, in proposing the toast of the King, said there was no name more a household word in Canada today than that of Kipling, and that he was famous, if for no other reason, through the creation of the immortal Recessional.

Rev. C. W. Gordon (Ralph Connor) introducing the guest, said Mr. Kipling's voice had struck the imperial note in his writings, and that was his fidelity to his conviction.

Mr. Kipling on rising received a tremendous ovation. He said in part:—"I am only a dealer in words, and you can scarcely wonder that I can find no words to thank you for the honor you have done me. I have done my best for about twenty years to keep all men of the sister nations within the empire intended for each other, because I know at heart all men are created much alike. They have the same problems and aspirations, and have only each other to depend upon. If through any good fortune any work of mine has helped to keep the boys throughout the world a little more interested in each other, then great is my reward."

"Fifteen years ago I was in Winnipeg, and at that time the city was seriously considering the wherewithal it should be paved. Today I find Winnipeg a metropolis and I drove this morning over twenty miles of asphalt to look at some small part of your marvelous city. Visions that your old men saw fifteen years

ago are translated today into stone, brick and concrete, and there is evidence of room today for vaster and more far-reaching imagination. But the mere building up of the streets of a town do not tell the story to the outsider of the bitter sacrifices of the men who have gone before. No man who has been present, as I have been present, at the building up of a new city can fail to hear that story cried aloud, as it were, by every block, store or residence that he passes. Therefore my heart goes out to the city of your love and pride, because I know of the sacrifices that have gone to the building of it, and that will continue to go to that rebuilding."

"But I have also realized the spirit of an assured nationhood, the spirit of a people not contented to be merely imitators of another people, but contented to themselves. That spirit, of course, existed fifteen years ago but it was then a little doubting. But, thank God, I find no echo of that here today. With the national spirit that I see here today the meanest collection of pecking cases that was ever tacked-hammered together on the prairie can dominate a continent. You are fortunate beyond most other communities. Your own labor has given you material prosperity in overwhelming abundance, but the gods have not denied to you the light that shows traces of that material prosperity. One is forced back to the old words, that you stand on the threshold of an unbelievable future. No man can foresee or set the limits of your destiny. But any man, even I, have the right to remind you that to whom much has been given, much shall be required."

A brown October mail, matching the tints of the waning season, looks out from the cover of the current issue of the Canadian Pictorial, 142 St. Peter street, Montreal. She truly Canadian, healthy, out-of-door girl, and leaning on her rifle, is proud of the trophies of the hunt which she has secured. The Canadian public man of the month is the Hon. Geo. P. Graham, the new Minister of Railways. As promised last month, there are two pages of gems from the recent photographic competition. The terrible disaster near Quebec, in which more than three score and ten men lost their lives, is strikingly illustrated. The distorted ruins of the bridge was composed are shown with wonderful clearness. The stirring events in Morocco have made specially interesting two pages illustrating the Sultan's army and navy, the latter consisting only of two merchant vessels. This is in sharp contrast to a

page showing Britain's naval power as demonstrated in a review which brought out 85,000 officers and men, who, with their vessels, made twenty miles of frowning night. There is an intimate picture of the king as he is now and another taken in Canada forty-seven years ago. Those who contributed to the Chinese famine fund will be interested in a page showing how the refugees lived before the new crops were harvested. The riots in Belfast, the great pageants in England and other current events are depicted.
