ARMY OF WORKERS.

Thirty-eight Thousand Men Building the Transcontinental Railway.

OTTAWA, Oct. 4.—There should be no problem of caring for the unemployed during the winter months. Reports received at the office of the National Transcontinental Railway Commission state that the contractors on the various sections of the new railway, now under contract, intend to vigorously push construction work during the whole of the winter and instead of laying off men this fall they are still anxious to add to the good sized army now at work.

This fact taken in conjunction with the fact that reports from all over Canada to the labor department show in almost every line of industry, a continued and pressing scarcity of labor combined with rising wages, goes to indicate that the flood of new immigrants need fear nothing from the usual slackening of the demand for labor during the winter months. On the 600 miles of the National Transcontinental Railway now under contract between Winnipeg and Montreal, it is estimated that over 18,000 men are now at work. The average wage for ordinary labor is from \$2.25 to \$2.50 per day, while experienced or skilled men get from \$2.75 to \$3 per day. The monthly pay roll on the government section alone of the new transcontinental is now over \$1,000,000. The section of the road from Winnipeg west and employed generally in railway construction work in the west, it is estimated that another army of 20,000 men is engaged.

The contract for the building of the Moncton-Chipman section of the G. T. Railway has been signed at last, and Mr. Corbett, who has the contract, will soon have a large gang of men at work. His equipment, which includes eight steam shovels, will be brought to New Brunswick at once, the Grand Trunk may furnish him with cars. The duty on this machinery will amount to a very large sum.

A Soldier's Memorial.

The grim humor of soldiers is not often displayed on tombstones, but here is an inscription from the cemetery at Winchester, revealed on a walking tour in those parts:

"In memory of Thomas Thetcher, a grenadier of the North Regiment of Hants Militia, who died of a violent fever contracted by drinking small beer when hot, the 1th of May, 1764, aged twenty-six years.

"In grateful remembrance of whose universal good will toward his comrades this stone is placed here at their expense as a small testimony of their regard and concern.

"Here sleeps in peace a Hampshire grenadier.

Who caught his death by drinking cold small beer.

Soldiers, be wise from his untimely fall.

And when ye're hot drink Strong or none at all."

"This memorial, being decayed, was restored by the officers of the garrison, A. D. 1781.

"An honest soldier never is forgot.

Whether he died by musket or by pot."

"This stone was placed by the North Hants Militia when disembodied at Winchester on April 26, 1802, in consequence of the original stone being destroyed.—London Tribune.
