### 230,000 IMMIGRANTS SO FAR THIS SEASON.

Total Number of Newcomers to Canada Since 1897 Now Amounts to 1,148,949.

OTTAWA, Oct. 4.—For the first eight months of this year the total immigration to Canada was 216,865, an increase of 50,038, as compared with the first eight months of 1906. The total for the eight months is more than the total immigration during the whole six years, 1896 to 1902, and the increase for the eight months alone is compared with last year is nearly three times the total immigration during the first year of the present government's regime.

The immigration via ocean ports was 143,394, the increase being 43,900, or 44 per cent. The immigration from the United States totalled 31,253, a decrease of 2,668, or 8 per cent as compared with last year.

For August the immigration via ocean ports was 16,936, and from the United States 3,683, a total of 20,619.

The figures for September are not yet available, but it is known that the total immigration to Canada to date for this year is over 220,000.

Of the arrivals from European ports during the five months, April to August, 88,228 were males, 28,502 females and 26,644 children under 12 years of age.

Since 1897 the total immigration to Canada up to the end of August last has been 1,148,949.

### THE UNWORLDLY CHURCH.

The only one that can Dominate the Future.

RICHMOND, VA., Oct. 4.—In a sermon in Holy Trinity Church during the celebration of the 300th anniversary of the founding of Anglican Christianity in America the Lord Bishop of London, gave his idea of the characteristics which the Church that shall dominate the future must possess.

The most evangelistic, the most catholic, the most orthodox Church, he said, will produce no effect upon the world if it is not clearly and unmistakably, and before all the world, unworship itself. Bear with me, then, when I say, as my last word, that the greatest danger of the Church on both sides of the Atlantic is worldliness. In one case it is impossible for the Church to mix too freely with the world. Into the slums of East London, into the business of Wall street, into the mining camps at Klondyke, the Church must go, and no human interest in the world is outside the interest of the Church.

But on the other hand, to run a church simply as a man runs a successful business is to spell ruin and failure and shame for the most orthodox Church in the world.

### FLOATING THEATRES.

Plays will be Given at Sea on Cunard Liners.

LIVERPOOL, Oct. 4.—It was announced yesterday that the Cunard Steamship Co. had accepted the offer of Chas. Frohman to give theatrical performances on the big liners by regular players who for the time being may be travelling to and from the United States and England. The company is now planning specially designed halls for plays and concerts on board three of the ships of the line. Other transatlantic line companies are considering Mr. Frohman's proposition.

The scheme will probably be tried first on the Lusitania. It is not necessarily a money-making venture, but has a financial basis. While theatrical companies are on the water, travelling from continent to continent, their salaries go on the same, and the managers suffer a deficit during that period. By playing to

transatlantic steamship passengers, this deficit would be made up in part. Light comedy will be tried at first, and if successful other branches of theatricals will be put on steamship boards.

### GERMANY WANTS TREATY.

Would Like to Enter into Agreement with Canada.

BERLIN, Oct. 4.—The Reichstag will be requested about the end of November to empower the Bundesrath to grant Britain and her colonies a continuance of commercial favors under the most favored-nation clause. It has not yet been ascertained whether the proposal will be limited to two years or will contain a clause enabling the Bundesrath to make the concession for an indefinite period of years. It is regarded as certain that Australia as well as Canada will be exempted, but hopes are entertained here that Germany may be able to conclude direct arrangements with both for the regulation of their commercial relations. The German Consul at Montreal recently conferred with his government with a view to promoting a commercial treaty between Germany and the Dominion. Germany will continue to bring all possible pressure to bear to prevent Canada and Australia from favoring the export trade of Britain at the expense of Germany.
