BIG FAIR FORMALLY OPENED BY LIEUT. GOVERNOR.

Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick.

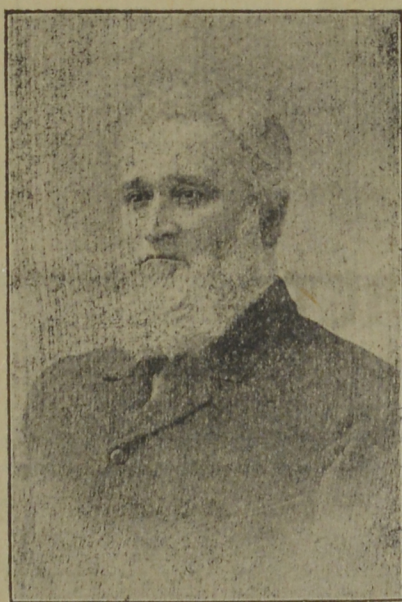
The Fredericton exhibition is now in full swing and promises in point of attendance and in the general character of the exhibits to eclipse all previous exhibitions ever held in this province.

The formal opening took place on Saturday evening in the presence of a fair sized crowd of spectators. Nobody expected a record breaking attendance, but it was thought advisable to have the opening on Saturday evening, so that everything would be in readiness for a good start on Monday morning.

The building and grounds were brilliantly illuminated with electric lights both air and incandescent generated on the premises. The front of the main building was dotted with colored electric colored bulbs and the effort was very striking and pretty.

The exhibition was formally opened by His Honor, Lieutenant Governor Tweedie, who delivered a stirring address, which was very heartily applauded and brief addresses were also delivered by Mayor McLeod and Hon. L. P. Farris, commissioner for Agriculture.

Punctually at eight o'clock His Honor the Lieutenant Governor entered the hall, accompanied by Major Bridges, A.D.C., Private Secretary Barker, John A. Campbell, M.P.P., president of the Agricultural Society, Mayor McLeod, Alds. Dougherty and Moore, Col. Marsh, Hon. L. P. Farris, Speaker Osman, and Messrs. F.

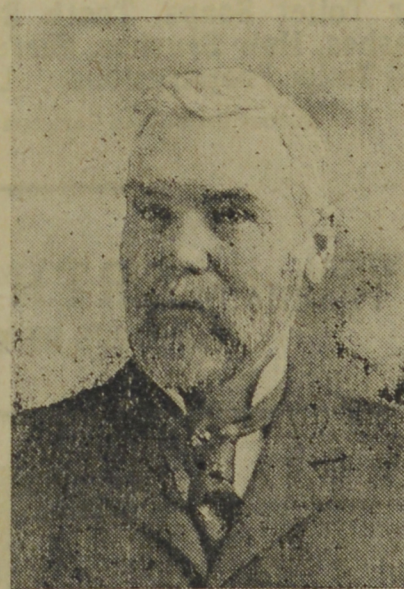
P. Robinson and C. H. Giles, members of the executive. The hall was comfortably filled with spectators and the Governor and party were enthusiastically applauded.

President Campbell called the meeting to order and in a brief speech introduced the Lieut. Governor, whom he stated had kindly consented to open the exhibition.

GOVERNOR TWEEDIE.

His Honour, who was most cordially received, on coming forward delivered a spirited address of ten minutes duration, which was most attentively listened to. He said it was a little early perhaps to prophesy the success of the exhibition

but he could say that in the whole Dominion of Canada there was no place with more delightful surroundings and more suitable for an exhibition than the little city of Fredericton. It had been a source of great pleasure to him when His Excellency the Governor General, when planning his recent visit to the province had consented to take the river route from St. John to Fredericton. He felt, though we have no government house, that it was only right that

His Excellency should visit the capital of the province. He was pleased to say that Earl Grey was delighted with Fredericton and its people, was greatly impressed with the appearance of the city and its comfortable homes, and greatly enjoyed the sail on the river. It would not surprise him if His Excellency returned to Fredericton next year to spend a few quiet days.

His Honour remarked that many changes had taken place in Fredericton in the thirty years that had elapsed since he first had occasion to visit the city as a member of the Legislature. The fine homes and well kept lawns which one noticed on every side showed that there was public spirit in the city, and that he considered was worth more than any help a government could give. It was his belief that the exhibition of 1907 would excel any ever held in the province. There was no doubt that it would be a splendid success, and he wished to tender his congratulations to the members of the executive. They gave their time freely to the cause and he was aware of the fact that a large amount of work had devolved upon them during the year. An exhibition could not be made a success without the expenditure of a large amount of energy, and he was happy to accord all credit to the members of the executive. The exhibitions held here in the past had been more successful than any held in the province, except perhaps those held in his own county of Northumberland. They had on several occasions asked the government for a guarantee, but the money had never been called for to assist in making up a deficit. He hoped that they would be favored with fine weather and that the exhibition would be a grand success in every detail. (Applause.)

MAYOR McLEOD.

Mayor McLeod was next called upon by the chairman and he also responded with a spirited address which was well received. He extended a hearty welcome to the visitors and praised the work done by the

members of the executive. They had made a success of former exhibitions and he was confident to believe that this would be the top loftiest ever held in New Brunswick. He regarded exhibitions as being very educative, and while we hear the tramp of thousands to the west it is well to teach our young men that the resources of our own province are far from being exhausted, and as a matter of fact offer as fine inducements as any province in the Dominion. The man who would say that the resources of New Brunswick are exhausted is as unpatriotic as the man who would say that the great west is unsuited to the production of wheat. It was pleasing to know that the work on the farm is no longer drudgery but is carried on in a scientific manner, and the calling is one of the noblest. If exhibitions such as this have a tendency to keep our young men at home they have not been in vain. It is men that this country wants to develop its boundless resources.

His Worship in conclusion thanked Governor Tweedie for his kindly allusion to Fredericton, and expressed the hope that the visitors would one and all enjoy themselves and go away determined to come back again.

JULIA KUTTNER ENTERS DEFENSE.

Tells Why She Came Between Earle And His Wife.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—In a written statement, which she declares is final, Julia Kuttner, who is to marry Artist Ferdinand Earle, after Mrs. Earle, who has gone to Paris for that purpose, shall have secured a divorce, defends her course in coming between husband and wife, and says she hasn't a single regret notwithstanding the criticism heaped upon her.

"I realize that our case has been rather unusual and perhaps, at first, a slight misunderstanding was to be expected, but, after this, I feel sure that the sympathy of the public will go out not only to Mrs. Earle, but to me and to the grossly maligned Mr. Earle," she says.

"It was, of course, natural for those who did not understand to feel a great deal of sympathy for Mrs. Earle, but as she has always stated that she was entirely happy contented, as can also be seen from her published letter and friendly attitude throughout, such sympathy is now out of place.

"About a year and a half ago Mrs. Earle had the intention to return to her parents in Paris on account of the evident incompatibility that existed between her and her husband, but as neither she nor Mr. Earle could bear parting from their child, and separation was postponed.

DIDN'T LIKE AMERICA.

"Mrs. Earle never felt really at home in America and her frequent trips abroad made her even more homesick than before.

"It was only because Mr. Earle and Mrs. Earle's family assured me of this existing misunderstanding that I agreed to accept Mrs. Earle's invitation to come to her home at Monroe with my brother to consider the situation.

"At first I thought seriously of the possibility of bringing these people together and of healing the breach between them, for I seemed to understand both their temperaments and the cause of friction between them.

"Only when Mrs. Earle herself in the middle of the night came to my room and assured me very seriously that in spite of their combined efforts it was impossible for them to live in happiness and that she preferred to return to her parents, did I definitely think of marrying Mr. Earle.

"I had up to then been in the house for a full week, and both I and my brother saw that their incompatibility was too deep-rooted to be surmounted.
