Fredericton Eleven Put up a Big Score Against R.C. R.—Meldon's Record Score.

The feature of the match was Meldon's fine exhibition of batting for Fredericton. The military bowlers Etienne and Galloway were well on the wicket but the gentleman from Ireland who has been a great stay to the local team this season, lifted the ball everywhere and ran up the magnificent score of 70 not out, the record for Fredericton, for the last half century. Mr. Meldon also had good success at bowling as the record shows.

None of the military men reached double figures at the bat but Etienne did great execution in bowling having eight of the ten wickets to his credit.

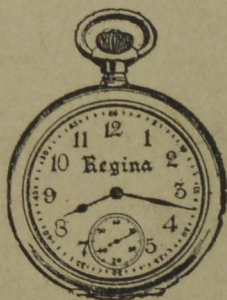

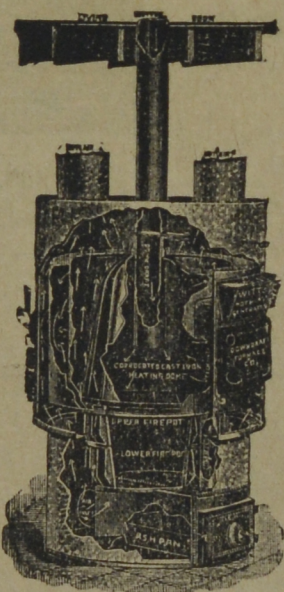

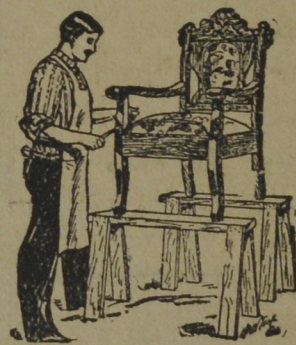
