

DANGEROUS SITUATION

Labor Element May Resist With Force Any Further Arrivals of Laborers From the Orient.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 14.—Effort is being made by the civic authorities to ascribe the demonstration against the Japanese to hoodlums of the city and agitators from the United States. While there is no doubt that the rough element did the work of destruction, it is also a fact that every labor unionist in the city is pledged to resist entrance of any more yellow laborers, and they will resort to force if necessary. Communications from labor men at Victoria are to the effect that that course will be pursued there. At a meeting yesterday final instructions were given to the delegates who will attend the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress, which opens at Winnipeg next Monday. Messages were received from almost every corner of Canada uttering full sympathy with the struggle to preserve British Columbia as the white man's country. The suggestion was made by several that, if Canada should be called in order to show that this was a national affair. Delegates from Vancouver will ask the labor congress to demand that the Canadian government take immediate steps to have nullified that portion of the treaty which allows colored

to enter Canada on the same footing as white men and to substitute rigid exclusion.

OTTAWA, Sept. 14.—The following telegram, which was delayed in transmission, was received by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, dated Sept. 11: "Nine hundred Hindus arrived today, by steamer Montague; neither accommodation nor employment for them, nor is it possible to house them under sanitary conditions. Shall we house them in drill hall at Dominion Government's expense?"

(Sgd.) "A BETHUNE, Mayor." To this message the premier has sent the following reply: "I have your telegram asking permission to house in drill shed at government's expense nine hundred Hindus, landed yesterday at Vancouver. I would understand from such request that these Hindus are paupers, and therefore liable to deportation. The Minister of the Interior will send tomorrow a special officer to deal with the question." (Sgd.) "WILFRID LAURIER." It is understood that the Hindus are not paupers by any means, but that they have an average of \$50 each and are scattering over the province taking places.

GIRL LIVES IN WOODS FOR THREE MONTHS.

Rather Than Stay With Her Adopted Mother Child Ran Away. From Home on Farm.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 14.—Unclotted, except for a ragged shirt, with her hair matted, hanging about her neck and shoulders, and resembling an animal, Elsie Holland, thirteen years old, has been found. Rather than live with her adopted mother, who, she asserts, beat and otherwise ill treated her, the girl ran away three months ago, and has since been living in a pine grove at Berlin, N. J. The finding of the little girl was brought about through an anonymous letter sent to her mother.

About a year ago the girl's mother, Mrs. Hannah Perkins, turned Elsie over to Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Boone, of Camden, who had no children of their own. Soon after her adoption, Mr. Boone died and Mrs. Boone went to live on a farm. The child claims she was ill treated by her adopted mother and fled to the woods.

Since then Elsie has lived in a thicket near a swamp in the pine woods. After a long search, Elsie was discovered, hiding in the pines. The girl tried to escape, but was caught and turned over to her mother.

Being told that Mrs. Perkins was her mother, Elsie stared and said her father and mother were dead. After Elsie was pacified she was taken to a neighboring house, where she was bathed and given clothing and a pair of shoes. Then Mrs. Perkins took the child to her home in Christian street, Camden.

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—Two unidentified men fought with revolvers in East Fortieth Street, between First and Second Avenues, and escaped after two children and a woman had been wounded by their bullets. The scene was the notorious "Corcoran Roost" neighborhood.

The men began to fight with stilettoes in a hallway. One was well dressed and of sporty appearance, the other was elderly. After stabbing at each other in the dark they ran out into the street. The young man tried to run away and the other pulled a revolver and fired at him. The latter turned and about twenty-five shots while the people in the street ran in every direction. AN ASSIZE OF BREAD.

Mobile's Regulation of Bakeries Early in the Last Century.

In the latter half of the seventeenth and the early part of the eighteenth centuries the regulation of the price of bread by public authority was a familiar principle in the English colonies of America. In New Haven, for instance, the weight of the penny loaf was regulated by law about 1660, and in 1693 the Massachusetts general court also provided a regular assize, fixing the weight of the loaf according to the price of flour. At various times during the first quarter of the eighteenth century the selectmen of Boston likewise performed this duty.

It is interesting, however, to note a survival or perhaps a revival of this principle as late as the nineteenth century in the town of Mobile, a place whose economic history is marked by many peculiar features. After fifty-two years of French, seventeen years of English and thirty-three years of Spanish rule Mobile came under the control of the United States government in April, 1813, and was included in the Mississippi territory. On Jan. 20, 1814, by an act of the territorial legislature the town received a charter of incorporation, and at two meetings of the inhabitants, on March 11 and 14, the municipal government was organized and the charter publicly read in English and in French. The population at this time was composed of French, English and Irish elements.

On April 4 following, three weeks after the organization of the municipal government, a "tariff for bakers," or assize of bread, was drawn up by the commissioners (the governing body of the town) and proclaimed in English and in French. This fixed the weight of the loaf for the ensuing month in accordance with the price of flour. Instead of changing the price of bread, it was more convenient to make the loaves lighter or heavier as the price of flour rose or fell. On May 2, 1814, the weight of the bit loaf (the bit being a coin worth 12½ cents) was fixed at twenty-eight ounces, and the weight of the half bit loaf was fixed at fourteen ounces.

On July 8, 1815, Mr. Martin, the baker, appeared before the board and paid the sum of \$10, a fine inflicted on him for having his bread too light, one-half of which sum was paid to the police officer. On Jan. 24, 1817, a regular scale of weights for the bit loaf was adopted.

Beginning May 3, 1817, the assize of bread was proclaimed weekly instead of monthly, as before, and this system was continued for a little more than two years. The records do not show that the assize was proclaimed after 1819, but the town continued to exercise a control over the business of baking. Every baker was required to procure a license and to register his trademark, which was stamped on his loaves. A public bakehouse was also established and seems to have been managed in the same way that municipalities control public markets, the bakers renting the stalls from the town and being subject to inspection. As late as 1826 in the annual statement of the city clerk the following entry occurs in the statement of receipts during the year: "Sales of condemned bread, \$187."—Quarterly Journal of Economics.

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ST. JOHN BOY KILLED
