"Dr. Pugsley said he had too kindly a feeling for the audience to make a speech at the late hour, especially as he knew so many of the people present were anxious to meet the Premier at the close of the meeting and shake him by the hand.

"As one of the newest Ministers of the Cabinet he must confess that there was not a prouder man in Canada than he, because he was to sit in the council of the country with such a leader as Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his able lieutenant, and right hand man, Mr. Fielding, who was being so honored by this meeting. He hoped the noble and patriotic work of Mr. Fielding in the interests of Canada might inspire him so that at least to some extent he might leave a record for like honest and patriotic effort.

"As Minister of Public Works, coming from the sister city of St. John, he wished to say that he would endeavor to look after the best interests of the province as well as all other provinces of Canada and endeavor to do justice to all.
