A FATAL ROW

Soo Blacksmith Dealt a Blow That Killed a Barber---Culprit Under Arrest

(Special to Daily Herald.)

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., August 17.—As the result of a drunken row at the Windsor Hotel, Edward Hynes, a barber employed at the hotel, is dead, and Thomas Ryan, a blacksmith who has lived in the Soo for many years, will probably have to answer to the charge of murder. Edward Hynes, a barber, died.

The row started in the barber shop. Ryan had a hair cut some days ago and twitted

Hynes about it, saying he was not satisfied.

Words followed and Ryan asked Hynes to go out into the yard to settle the matter.

The proprietor of the hotel went to call a policeman, but not seeing one, returned to the rear of the house. As he reached the yard Ryan was mounting the steps to leave and Hynes was lying on the ground dead.

Ryan was located at his home soon after and expressed surprise that Hynes was dead.

LACK OF GOLD STORAGE

Dominion Dairy Commissioner Explains Cause of Reduction in Butter and Cheese Export

(Special to Daily Herald.)

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 17.—A Canadian Associated Press cable says: "J. A. Ruddick, dairy commissioner for Canada, in addressing the Manchester Produce Association, assigned the cause of the decline in the export of Canadian butter and cheese to Manchester to a lack of reliable regular cold storage steamship service to Manchester."

He had seen excellent arrangements for storage of Australian and New Zealand meat and thought similar arrangements might be made for the preservation of Canadian produce.

The Canadian authorities, he said, appreciated the validity of the complaint regarding Canadian cheese, that had been shipped in a 'green' state, and were doing their best to remove all cause for dissatisfaction."

GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC

Hays & Morse Propose to Buy Hill's British Columbia Road

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 17.—Messrs. Hayes & Morse, of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, are enroute here for the special purpose of closing a deal to buy James Hill's line from Vancouver and Westminister to the Yukon, with charter rights.

The extension for the Grand Trunk Pacific connection a Fort George, six hundred mile north on the main line of the Transcontinental road involves bridging Burrard Inlet, near Vancouver, which is two mile wide at its narrowest.

Mr. Hayes said he was prepared to plan the G.T.P. coast branch at once. With the great Northern connection to Seattle, the Grand Trunk Pacific will have a line from Montreal to Vancouver.

LABOR TROUBLE

Hamilton Street Car Employees Pelted with Stones and Stale Eggs

CROWDING BORDEN

Cabal Among Nova Scotia Tories to Supplant Him With Sir Hibbert Tupper

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 17.—

While Mr. R. L. Borden selects Halifax as the place of opening his stumping tour, some of his Conservative friends here are quietly trying to boom Sir Hibbert Tupper as the Conservative leader.

Sir Hibbert, who deserted Nova Scotia after his party's rout in 1896, and who has prospered in British Columbia, has been spending a few days in Nova Scotia, awaiting the arrival of his son from England.

Two demonstrations ostensibly in his honor but really intended to boom the candidacy of A. C. Bell, ex-M. P., who is again seeking the Conservative nomination in Pictou, have been held in the county from which the impression spread that Sir Hibbert was anxious

to get back to politics.

There are many Conservatives in Nova Scotia who believe that Sir Hibbert is the strongest man in sight for the leadership and it is understood that the machine leaders in Halifax have already sounded him as to the probability of his re-entering politics. Sir Hibbert, however, is said to have given them little encouragement as he recognizes that the party has no chance of winning the next election.

It is stated that while Sir Hibbert would not be averse reentering parliament he feels that his political ambitions will be better served by waiting for Mr. Borden's retirement from the leadership, which is believed to be only a question of time and the way will be open for Sir Hibbert to come back as leader.

A HELPLESS INVALID

Hon. Edward Blake Returns to Canada in Bad Physical Condition

MONTREAL, Aug. 17.—Hon. Edward Blake has returned to Canada, not in fullness of his vigor and activity but an invalid who cannot move

without assistance. Attached to a special C. P. R. train which arrived at the Windsor station yesterday afternoon bringing the saloon passengers of the Empress of Britain was the private car Alberta. In it traveled Mr. Blake and his party and A. Creelman, C. P. R. solicitor, and his family. After the other passengers had alighted the Alberta was switched on to another track as a side platform, and your correspondent was admitted to the car and was received by Samuel C. Blake, the son of the distinguished statesman.

Edward Blake was reclining but Samuel Blake said his father had stood the voyage extremely well, although the rail journey from Quebec had been somewhat fatiguing. So far as the ocean voyage is concerned, Mr. Blake enjoyed it extremely and was frequently carried to the deck, where he took evident enjoyment in

watching the pastimes of the passengers and discussing the ordinary events of life on shipboard.

"Mentally my father is as vigorous as ever," said Samuel Blake, "although, of course, he cannot walk without assistance, the paralytic stroke having taken away the use of his left side entirely. The doctors are, however, hopeful that the effects of the seizure will pass away gradually, although, of course, it will take some time for a complete restoration to physical activity."

"Edward Blake has come back to Canada to live and will take up his residence in Toronto. It is possible he may make an occasional visit to England but his home in future will be here."

Mr. Blake added that his father had freed his mind of all political responsibilities and his main object now was to take a complete rest in hope of a change of air and environment. Mr. Blake is still a member of the British house of commons.

BODY BROUGHT HERE

The body of the late Mr. Burton McLean, the telegraph operator who died recently at Calgary arrived by the western train today enroute to his former home at Chatham for burial. It will be forwarded to Chatham by the I. C. R. this evening. Mr. T. R. Peebles of Winnipeg, an intimate friend and former room mate of the deceased accompanied the body to this city and will go to Chatham for the funeral. He will afterwards visit his former home at Mulgrave, N. S.

AN OLD ACQUAINTANCE.

Mr. W. J. Southern was among those who called on Earl Grey during his recent visit to this city, and they had a very pleasant chat together over old times. The Earl and Mr. Southern were boys together in Newcastle-on-Tyne, and when the Earl grew to manhood and entered politics Mr. Southern took off his coat and worked for him at the polls. Mr. Southern had not seen the Earl for twenty-seven years and quite naturally received a very cordial greeting from him.
