

OLD TIMES RECALLED.

A Glance Into the Local News of Fredericton Twenty-six Years Ago.

(Farmer Files, Aug. 11, 1881.)

The sudden death from heart disease, is reported of John Hazlett, a young man on Con nors' drive. He was found dead camp on Tuesday morning.

WEDDING.

At 11 a. m. today in the cathedral, Miss Isabella, second daughter of Andrew Inches, Esq., deputy surveyor-general, was united in marriage with Prof. Fletcher, late of the University of New Brunswick, but now of Queens College, Kingston, Onta- rio, the Metropolitan, as- sisted by the Coadjutor Bishop, performing the ceremony. The bride was magnificently attired in white satin with a long train and bridal veil, and looked very handsome. She entered the cathedral leaning on the arm of her father. The bridesmaids were Miss Inches, youngest sister of the bride, and Miss Al- mon, of St. John, the former being attired in light blue, and the latter in pink silk. The groomsmen were Messrs. Geo. W. Allen, and W. Bliss Carman. After the ceremony the bridal party lunched at Mr. Inches' and the prof. and his fair part- ner left for St. John by the af- ternoon train enroute to King- ton.

STEAMER BURNED

The steamer Royal, Captain Vanwart, was entirely destroyed by fire early Friday morning. She had arrived from St. John at seven o'clock the previous evening, and after discharging a quantity of freight on this side of the river, proceeded to Gibson, where she was moored at the railway wharf. The cap- tain and other members of the boat's company retired about eleven o'clock, and about fifteen minutes past twelve they were aroused by the cries of the cook Mrs. Delong, and found the en- tire boat in a blaze. They had merely time to escape with their lives and with scarcely any clothing. The moorings of the boat were soon burned off and the steamer drifted helplessly out into the river, presenting a magnificent sight. The boiler, which had been filled with wa- ter the night previous, became heated, and the steam made a terrible noise as it escaped through the pipes. It was a beautifully clear night. There was scarcely a ripple on the bosom of the river, which was illuminated for miles around by the blazing steamer. A gener- al fire alarm was sounded in the city and hundreds of citi- zens rushed to the bank of the river to view the strange spec- tacle, and small boats in scores put out from the wharves, but no assistance could be rendered and two hours after the origin of the fire, the fine new steamer was reduced to a smoking hulk, with nothing visible above the water line but the stern wheel and portions of the machinery which moved out of its position as the hull of the boat disap- peared before the devouring element. When the fire had about concluded its work, the Forest Queen ferry put out from Gil- son and beached the wreck jus above the N. B. Ry. machine shops where it now lies. The fire probably originated from the boiler. However, there is a mystery connected with the matter that may never be thrown aside.

The Royal was a stern wheel boat of two hundred and seventy-one tons, and was built at St. John last winter by the owners. Her length of keel was one hundred and fifty-six feet, breadth of beam ninety-three feet, depth of hold five and one-half feet.

She cost nearly \$17,000 and was insured for \$10,000. The owners were George F. Baird, L. S. Vanwart and Captain Vanwart, of Indiantown.

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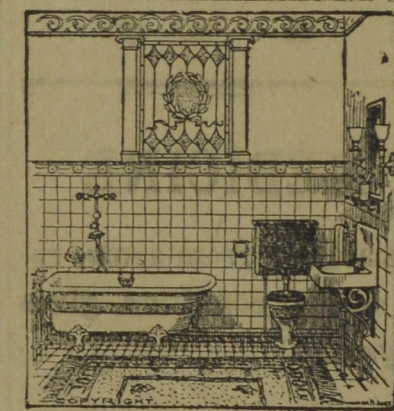
