A COLD TOUCH

A large section of the Tory party is evidently heartily ashamed of the western land speculators, and the reproach they have brought on their political associates.

This feeling is so strong that it finds expression in the Montreal Star, which implores Mr. Borden not to attempt to take Mr. Foster and Mr. Fowler with him on his stumping tour of Canada, and the St. John Telegraph gives editorial prominence to the Star's article which appeared in Thursday's Herald.

"Two members whom Mr. Borden should certainly leave at home," says the Star. "are Hon. Mr. Foster, of Toronto, and Mr. Fowler, of New Brunswick. In the former, the people have lost confidence; and the latter has no business to go before a popular audience as the representative of a great party, until he makes good his insinuations uttered on the floor of Parliament."

This is a cold touch for the land dealers from one of the leading Tory organs and its publication, while pleasing to the better class of Tories, will create consternation among those of the Tory party who seek to condone and apologize for Foster and Fowler.

The Tory party is in bad condition when one of its chief organs declares that men who occupy such prominent positions in Tory councils should not be permitted to appear on the same public platform with the leader.

Alas! poor Foster, alack poor Fowler, their land dealings with Foresters' funds, will yet overwhelm them and drive them far from public life.

The public conscience may be slow to get aroused, but its activity comes sooner or later and is a force that politicians cannot ignore, and to which they must succumb.

A SUCCESSFUL BANKER

Mr. David R. Forgan, of Chicago, who is spending today in Fredericton, and who was a resident of this city some fifteen years ago, as the manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, is now one of the leading banking men of his adopted city, president of the National City Bank its founder and one of its chief owners.

Mr. Forgan has had a remarkably successful career in Chicago. Previous to starting his own bank, he was vice-president for some years of the First National Bank, the largest financial institution in that city but he had long cherished the desire to be head of a bank of his own creation, and under his own control, and toward the close of last year he saw the opportunity of realizing his ambition, and the result of his effort has proved eminently successful. Mr. Forgan opened the doors of his new bank on the first of January in the present year, with a staff of twenty-five helpers, business flowed freely in from the start, and at the end of the first six months the bank's deposits reached the enormous sum of \$5,000,000. The new bank has already reached a prominent position among its competitors, a monument to the shrewd business ability of its founder, whose own modesty would forbid these few words of admiration for the success which he has met in the great banking circles of Chicago.

Mr. Forgan has also won fame on the golf links and in the associations formed to encourage that popular sport and has been president of the Golf Association of the United States.

British Columbia Tory politicians were participants in the graft, with which Caron was charged, yet Sir Hibbert Tupper has not raised his voice in condemnation of them.

The most enthusiastic reception of their tour of the Maritime Provinces, was the verdict of the vice-regal party respecting their welcome to Fredericton.

There is some unpleasantness in St. John because the American consul there took affront at the place assigned to him at the corporation dinner to Earl Grey, but the question is not likely to become a serious international one.

The county of Cape Breton, N. S., has repealed the Scott Act by a sweeping majority, reaching in the vicinity of nine hundred, nearly all the towns recording large votes against the law. In the city of Sydney every ward voted against the act.

Mr. Borden is likely to be hampered in his stumping tour by the demands of the election court at Halifax which has fixed the date of the trial of the petitions against the Liberal members there and of the cross petition against Mr. Borden for Sept. 3.

Sir Hibbert Tupper's sudden appearance in Nova Scotia, and his visit to Pictou, his old constituency, has aroused a hornet's nest among the Tories there. Mr. A. C. Bell, ex-M. P., is an aspirant for the Tory nomination in Pictou, and he and his friends resent Sir Hibbert's hint that if his party want him to run he will be at their command.

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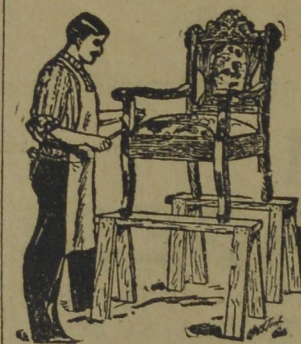
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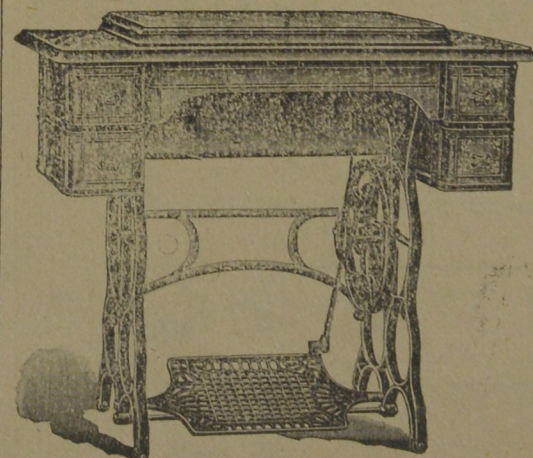
