SONOMA GIRL BEATEN

POUGHSKEEPIE, N. Y., Aug. 13.—Sonoma Girl the most famous race horse of the year met her first defeat in the grand circuit races at the Driving Park to-day when she was beaten by Watson in the Oakland Baron Stakes for a purse of \$1,000. Breaks in the first and third heat lost Sonoma Girl the race. She was steady in the second heat and won that one with ease in 2.06 1/2.

Before the race, Sonoma Girl was an almost prohibitive favorite, selling for \$50 to \$70 for the field, while in many of the pools she was barred from them. It was another bad day for favorites, only one first choice winning, and that was blacklock in 2.07 pace, and he did not win until his supporters had about given up when two other horses had each won a heat.

The 2.20 class trot was won easily by Sea Sea, a second choice, in straight heats. Tokio, the favorite not being a contender until the last heat when he managed to finish second.

Aileen Wilson was the favorite in the 2.10 pace, but Leland Onward driven by "Tommy" Murphy, won it straight heats.

KID MCCOY IS A WEALTHY MAN.

Norman E. Selby, or Charles Kid McCoy, as he was known to followers of the boxing game, is attracting much attention in Indianapolis. Starting from that city in 1890 as an illiterate youth, he fought his way to pugilistic fame with a stout set of arms and the ability to hit harder than any man of his weight in the world. McCoy never was robust and his appearance was extremely deplorable. Expert ring followers have expressed the opinion that he could hit harder than any other boxer the ring has ever produced, without regard to weight.

He won the middle weight championship fairly from Dan Creedon, and defeated many of the leading heavyweights. In the ring he gained a reputation for craftiness that evidently was well founded, judging from his career since quitting the squared circle.

He has succeeded in business ventures, and today is probably the wealthiest man who ever made fighting a profession. He married the widow of a New York millionaire broker. They have a fine residence in a costly quarter of the metropolis. McCoy's matrimonial escapades have filled many columns of print.

He is tall, five feet, 11 inches, and appears taller on account of his slight figure. Extremely dark, of good features and figure, he was known as the Beau Brummel of the ring.

McCoy probably has made his last appearance in the ring, although he is remarkably well preserved, and believes he is just as strong and skillful as ever. He is known in the automobile business and made the trip to Indianapolis in a Peerless racing car.

The Conservative Peers were delighted and cheered Lord Rosebery to the echo. His speech was the event of the evening, but the Conservatives themselves doubt whether it will have much practical effect.

A NAIL IN HIS BRAIN.

Three-Inch Spike Driven Into Man's Skull.

NEW YORK, August 16.—When the surgeons of the Williamsburg Hospital made an examination yesterday of William Albright, an iron worker who fell from the new elevated structure at the Brooklyn plaza of the Williamsburg Bridge on Monday afternoon, they found under his hair the head of a nail flattened against the skull. Surgeons took out the nail, which was three inches long, and found it had driven a hole into Albright's brain.

The physicians believe that the nail was upright on the pavement when the iron worker fell. The surgeons could not see that he had been injured, but they were puzzled that the iron worker did not regain consciousness. They say he cannot recover.

OXBOW, SASK., Aug. 15.—Early yesterday a very serious fire devastated the business section of this town. The fire originated in the rear of Christmas block and laid in smouldering ruins the premises of Walsh Bros., general merchants; W. W. Christmas, confectioner; Percy Gleiser, jeweller; M. Gleiser, Palace Hotel; W. J. Ferron, butcher; H. C. Disney, general merchant; R. G. Shaw, barber; T. E. Osten, pool room; Hames & Wylie, hardware merchants; A. Pither, artist; Lee Ling, Chinese restaurant; R. J. Noble, grain buyer; W. J. Morrison, buggies; A. Williams, harness and T. H. Gregory, insurance agent. Several guests of the Palace Hotel had narrow escapes. The damage, it is roughly estimated, will run over \$175,000, and several of these parties, it is understood, have no insurance. Had it not been for the vigorous efforts of the fire brigade and citizens the entire town would have been wiped out, as there was a strong wind blowing from the southeast.
