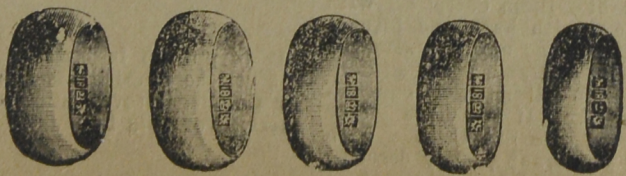

SWINDLE UNEARTHED

Detectives Succeed in Locating Man Who
Successfully Gulling the Public

(Special to Herald.)
NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Aug. 31.—One of the most far-reaching swindles ever operated in Canada, came to grief here last night, by the capture of a chief swindler and his outfit. For a number of weeks past people all over Canada have been receiving letters from The Rogers Mfg. Company, of Niagara Falls, Ont., stating that those addresses would win a prize which would be sent if cents were forwarded to pay for charges and packing. Hundreds of people were taken in and sent their money. For weeks past letters have been arriving at the post office here addressed to the Rogers Mfg Co. and the Rogers Silver Co. No one called for them for a long time. Last evening, however, a short, dark man entered the office and asked for mail probably over a thousand dollars in them.

Detectives were on watch and after he had received a big wad of letters, they stepped up and required the man to explain the scheme. The man said his name was Erlanger, and he produced a letter purporting to be from a Philadelphia man named Moore, instructing him to get the mail and forward it by express, and he was found to have in his possession letters in which he had been instructing that he had been in Montreal, New York, Philadelphia and other American cities. The prizes for which people were to send money are stated to be handsome pieces of silverware. At the post office are three or four bushels of letters for ever, a short, dark man entered the office and asked for mail probably over a thousand dollars in them.

DISASTROUS FIRE

Manufacturing Buildings, Plant and Other
Property Burned at Pugwash, N. S.

AMHERST, N. S., Aug. 31.—A disastrous fire occurred at Pugwash, this county, at midnight last night, when the Maritime Manufacturing Co's building, plant and stock, with the store, stock and warehouses of John A. Ash also completely destroyed. The fire broke out in the overall department of the Maritime Company's factory. The Maritime people are manufacturers of overalls, aprons and ready made clothing and employs 30 hands. Their loss will be about twenty thousand dollars, with insurance on plant and stock of ten thousand. The building occupied by them belongs to the Independent Order of Foresters, whose lodge is on the upper flat. They lose besides their building, all their paraphernalia. Their loss is \$2200, with insurance of \$1200. Ash kept a general store. His loss will be about \$30,000, with no insurance. The cause of the fire is not known. The Maritime people have been running for several years and were doing a large business

ALD. HANLON'S DEATH

Members of City Council and A.O.H.
Will Attend the Funeral on
Monday

The sad death of Ald. J. D. Hanlon at the Victoria hospital Friday afternoon was a great shock to the community, and many expressions of regret was heard about the streets. Ald. Hanlon had spent his life time in Fredericton, and few men had a wider circle of acquaintances or enjoyed to a greater extent the esteem of all classes. Ald. Hanlon's illness dated back a period of about six weeks, and in that time he declined in weight over fifty pounds. He consulted Rev. Father Morrissey at Chatham a few weeks ago, and upon his return to Fredericton placed his case in the hands of Dr. Atherton. His case refused to yield to the treatment prescribed by the doctor, and an operation was decided upon as the only possible chance to save his life from the insidious disease which was gnawing at his vitals. The operation was performed at the hospital yesterday afternoon, and the physicians found it necessary to remove a portion of his stomach. When he was recovering from the effects of the anesthetic he was seized by a fit of choking, and quantity of blood getting into the air passages and lungs, caused him to expire in a few minutes. Even if he had survived the operation the doctors consider it very doubtful if his life could have been prolonged more than a few weeks. The deceased played in the orchestra at a garden party on Thursday evening, and yesterday, prior to going to the hospital, he was about the

The body was removed from the hospital to his late residence on King street, last evening, and the funeral will take place at nine o'clock on Monday morning, with services at St. Dunstan's church by Rev. Father Carney. It will be under the auspices of the A. O. H., of which the deceased has for years been a prominent member. The city council at a meeting held at noon today decided to attend the funeral in a body. The flag on the city hall is flying at half mast today, out of respect to the memory of the deceased.

MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS

A Sharp Contest Being Carried on in
Several of the Parishes

Polling in the elections for the York County council will take place on Tuesday next, and the result is awaited with considerable interest. There are contests in Stanley, St. Mary's, Douglas, Southampton, New Maryland, Kingsclear, Dumfries, Canterbury and McAdam, the other five parishes having returned the old councillors by acclamation. The hottest campaign seems to be in Douglas, where a dead set is being made on Marden McFarlane. Elections are always uncertain, but if reports which are received here from that parish are well founded, the warden will retire from municipal politics on Tuesday. The candidates for Douglas are addressing meetings nightly, and were at Mouth Keswick last night.

In Kingsclear there are no less than five candidates in the field, viz: Coun. B. W. Fox, Coun. M. B. McNally and Messrs. Tabor Everett, David Essency and F. W. Hatheway. They are all conducting a vigorous canvass, and nobody knows who will come out on top.

In Stanley a very vigorous campaign is also being carried on, with the result just a trifle uncertain. The old war horse, Coun. John Hinchey, is putting up a game fight, and is confident of his ability to do up Coun. Pond.

The value of free goods entered for consumption at the port of Fredericton last month was \$23,225, and of dutiable goods \$30,331, making a total of \$52,556, on which \$31,631 was paid in duties. For the corresponding month last year the total imports amounted to \$42,130, and the duty to \$6,778.29.
