

OLD TIMES REGALLED.

A Glance Into the Local News of Fredericton Twenty-six Years Ago.

(Farmer Files, Aug. 25, 1881.)
Mr. John H. Reid, has been asked to act as one of the judges on horses at the Dominion Exhibition, Halifax.

The proposed exhibition, under the auspices of the York County Agricultural Society, has fallen through, for want of financial encouragement.

Master Frank Gregory, youngest son of ex-Mayor Gregory, leaves for Boston about the middle of September to pursue his legal career at Harvard University.

Dr. T. H. Rand, chief superintendent of education for New Brunswick, was on Saturday at Yarmouth, N. S. elected president of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces for the ensuing year.

We were in error last week in stating that only one of the candidates for grammar school licenses was successful in the recent examination. The correct number was three, one of them being Mr. Croscup, principal of the model school.

J. L. Inches, secretary to the Board of Agriculture, and T. F. Barker, Esq., left this afternoon for Quebec via St. John, to attend to the landing of the government stock importation, which is about to arrive there.

Ald. G. F. Atherton, of this city, at the Y.M.C.A. convention at Moncton last week, was elected a member of the executive committee for the ensuing year. During its session, the convention passed a resolution expressing its regret at the death of the late Thomas Logan of this city.

The children of St. Paul's Sunday school, had a very enjoyable time at their picnic on Col. Robinson's grounds, Nashwaak, last Thursday. The sports of the youngsters were mainly directed by Mr. Hugh Matheson, superintendent of the school, Mr. Samuel Owen, and Mr. F. B. Gregory.

The river at the present time is within a foot of being as high as during the spring freshets, and has done an immense amount of damage to the island and intervalle crops. Through Mungerville and Sheffield, the hay fields are submerged in water a foot deep. Charles Harrison has lost about 30 tons, W. D. Perley is a heavy loser, and G. A. Sterling, James Hamilton, and many others suffered more or less. The damage can scarcely be estimated.

LOST A DAUGHTER.

We sincerely sympathize with Mr. P. A. Logan and his family in the sad bereavement they have met with in the sudden loss under painful circumstances of their eldest daughter, Mrs. Frank N. Risteen, who died at 8 a. m. Sunday at Gibson, and was interred at the Methodist cemetery of this city Tuesday afternoon. Her death is doubly regrettable from the fact that her young husband is absent in Winnipeg, and must be terribly shocked by the sad news which was communicated to him by telegraph. The officers and employees of the Gibson Leather Company, of which Mr. Logan is manager, showed their respect for the memory of the deceased lady by attending her funeral in a body. The services were said by Revs. Brewster, of Marysville, and Evans, of this city. The remains were enclosed in a chaste rosewood casket, which was adorned with beautiful crosses and wreaths of natural flowers.

DOUBLE DROWNING ACCIDENT

The sad news of the drowning of Andrew Rosborough, of this city, and John Elliott, of Stanley, at the latter place at 3

p. m. on Sunday caused many sincere expressions of regret from those with whom the deceased, especially Mr. Rosborough, had been intimate. The particulars of the sad affair so far as we could learn, are as follows:

Mr. Rosborough had a contract from the local government to build a bridge over the Nashwaak, at Stanley, and during the freshet of Sunday, it seemed in peril from the run of logs that were carried past by the turbulent stream.

In the afternoon, Mr. Rosborough, with John Elliott and George Reid, launched a scow and endeavored to turn the logs aside. On attempting to catch some that were nearing a dam which is about thirty rods above the site of the bridge, they were carried by the rapid current towards the abyss below, into which to fall appeared certain death. There was scarcely a moment for thought, and the three men leaped into the rushing waters, hoping by some means to reach the shore in safety. Reid, with almost superhuman effort, succeeded, but his two companions were swept to a watery grave in the seething waters below the dam.

A moment after, the spectators on the banks observed one of the unfortunate men rise to the surface, but only to sink beyond human assistance, and a moment later one was seen to grasp at the staging of the bridge, but his strength was insufficient to save himself, and he went down. Both of them were drowned within sight of their friends on the shore, who were unable from the circumstances, to render help.

Mr. Rosborough was a native of this city, and was a son of Mr. Robert Rosborough, who lives on Shore street, and a brother of Mr. William Rosborough. He was well known in this city, and had many warm friends. He was of powerful build, extremely active and in former years took a great interest in sports. An aged mother and father, a wife and three children are bereaved by his sad death, to whom we offer our sympathy. The deceased was about 35 years of age.

John Elliott was comparatively a young man, and was the sole stay and support of his father and mother, who live at Stanley. He was a son of Mr. Bernard Elliott.

The unfortunate affair has cast a gloom over Stanley. Up to the present the bodies have not been recovered.

WINNIPEG'S FINANCES.

Will Borrow Money at Six and a Quarter Per Cent.

WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 29.—Mayor Ashdown will sail for Great Britain on September 13, in accordance with a resolution of the city council, appointing him to go to London on financial business.

"It should be distinctly understood," said the mayor today, "and I am not going to London to sell bonds. I am going to look over the situation, and it seems probable that it will be necessary to have a representative for Winnipeg appointed in London."

The controllers have passed a resolution in favor of borrowing \$300,000 from the Trust & Loan Company of Canada at 6 1/2 per cent., the amount to be repaid in six installments of \$50,000 each, the first installment to be paid not later than December 10. A by-law authorizing the loan will be placed before the council for consideration at a special meeting called for tonight.

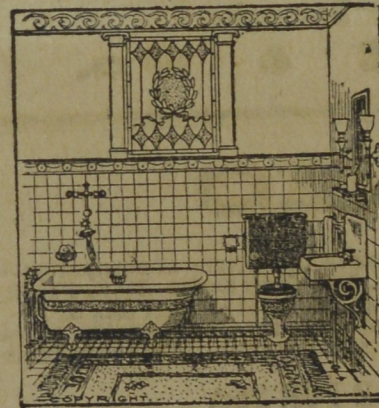
