

COLONEL GAMERON DEAD

Canadian Officer Who Served With Distinction in South Africa, Passed Away at Winnipeg

Winnipeg, August 30.—Lieut. Col. G. W. Cameron, D. S. O., of the 5th Royal Scots, Montreal, answered the last roll call this morning. His disease was entirely unexpected as prior to yesterday he was in the best of health. His illness, perforation of the bowels became so severe towards evening that he was removed to the General Hospital, where he succumbed between six and seven o'clock today.

Col. Cameron left Ottawa for the West a year and a half ago to take command of the Canadian Mounted Rifles. He was 49 years old, and was born at Thurso, Que. His father was the late John A. Cameron, a well known lumberman of Ottawa. Col. Cameron had a long military experience. When the South African war broke out he was in business in Montreal and was a major in the 5th Royal Scots of that city. He went to South Africa as a major of the Strathcona Horse, and also saw service in South Africa with the Canadian Mounted Rifles. Col. Cameron leaves four brothers and four sisters all living in Ottawa. The brothers are Alexandra Cameron, J. A. Cameron and H. H. Cameron. The sisters are Mrs. McCullough, Mrs. H. G. Bate, Mrs. J. A. Garvin and Miss Cameron.

Montreal Herald.—The sudden death of Col. George Cameron has cast a gloom over the Canadian military community, of which he was such a conspicuous and brilliant figure, and has created a profound impression among the wide circle of friends with whom he was acquainted here, in Ottawa, and other centres.

Col. Cameron was a comparatively young man, with a splendid record behind him and a future full of promise. He stood for the finest specimen of soldier Canada produces. Six feet high, of magnificent physique, herculean strength and an adept at all kinds of sport, he has been for years a prominent figure in every kind of vigorous outdoor sport.

Well known throughout Canada as one of the most fearless of riders, Col. Cameron took a great interest in all equine sports, and secured many trophies for cross-country riding. He was, in fact, a sportsman through and through. There was not a single game he did not follow with interest and he was one of the best supporters of baseball in the city, he having been the first president of the Montreal Baseball Club when it started years ago, as well as a member of the M.A.A.A.

Col. Cameron's brother, Russell Cameron, met his death under painful circumstances in Ottawa some time ago.

I. C. R. SURPLUS

OTTAWA, Ont., August 30.—The financial showing of the Intercolonial Railway continues to improve. A four hundred thousand dollar surplus was earned during last year, ending June 30th. The year before the surplus was \$60,000, and the year before that there was a deficit of a million and three-quarters, and in 1904 the deficit was \$900,000.

During the nine months ending March 31st, which comprised a new fiscal period, the Intercolonial earned a surplus of \$219,000.

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KILLED BY A LION.

Pittsburg Woman Mauled to Death at Show.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Aug. 30.—Mrs. Anna Huckle died at her home on Van Buren street, this city, Friday, from injuries inflicted by an escaped lion at Luna Park, a local resort.

The attack occurred when the park was crowded with women and children. Without warning the lion appeared from behind one of the buildings, and with a roar he sprang at Mrs. Huckle, who was nearest to him. She screamed, and attracted the attention of the crowds. Soon screams from the hundreds stampeding for the exits added to Mrs. Huckle's cries.

The noises drew the attention of W. A. Downing, chief of the park police, who came on a run to the rescue. He found the lion tearing away at the woman's clothing, and having drawn his revolver, he emptied all of the chambers at the animal. Downing reloaded his revolver repeatedly, and fired, with but little effect. Other rescuers got rifles from the shooting galleries, and Remingtons from the concessionaires, and soon a score were firing at the lion. Still standing over the prostrate woman, gnashing his teeth, and lashing his tail, the beast stood with the ground about him ploughed up by the hundreds of shots fired.

Soon the lion turned and rushed towards the show known as the "Mystic River," where he made his last stand, but the steady bombardment caused the brute to sink down upon the ground. He turned over on his back, and with a few kicks and gasps died. His hide was riddled with the small calibre bullets.

Mrs. Huckle was taken home, where she died.
