AN ELOPEMENT IN GALT.

Church Elder and Domestic are Missing.

Galt, Ont. Aug. 29.—During the old boys' reunion here there was employed at the restaurant of Mr. O. Osgood a woman, Mrs. M. Jennings, who formerly worked for Mr. John Maule at the Central hotel in Dundas. Nothing was known of the woman outside of the fact that she performed her duties creditably. During the week Mr. Osgood was having some painting done on the premises, and Peter Meyer was engaged to do the work. Nothing unusual was noticed and Meyer worked around the restaurant for several days. On Saturday, however, both Mrs. Jennings and Meyer were missing, and the only conclusion that can be arrived at is that the twain have departed for parts unknown. A friend of the woman arrived from Dundas on Saturday, and immediately drove to Berlin in search of the missing parties, but was unable to locate them. Nothing is known of the woman, with the exception that she was married in Dundas and has no family. Meyer has a wife and a number of children in Galt, who is recently elected an elder in one of the city churches.

Peel the fruit—peaches or pears—weight them, and to every pound of fruit allow a half-pound of sugar. Place the fruit and sugar in alternate layers in a preserving kettle, bring slowly to the boil, and, for six pound of fruit, allow a pint of vinegar spiced with a tablespoonful each of ground mace, cinnamon and cloves, each of these spices being tied into a small muslin bag. Pour the vinegar over the fruit and boil for five minutes. At the end of this time remove the fruit, spread it on platters and boil the syrup until thick, then pack the fruit into glass jars, fill to overflowing with the syrup (from which the spice bags have been removed) and seal.
