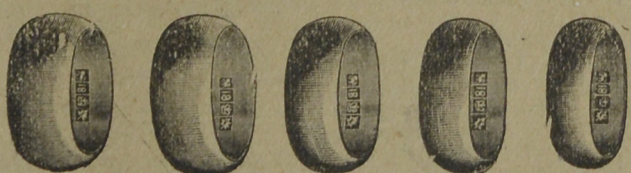

Monday was a big day at the Fredericton exhibition and the crowds which thronged the grounds afternoon and evening were delighted with the excellent and varied character of the exhibits. The total number of people who passed the turnstiles was 2,083, which is a very gratifying increase over the first day's attendance last year when 1502 people passed the turnstiles. The total paid admissions to date is 2,389, including the attendance Saturday which was really an extra day.

There was a parade of horses in the show ring Monday afternoon in the presence of a large crowd of people. Many magnificent animals were shown, including Percherons, Clydes, French Coach horses and hackneys. They made a very fine appearance and were much admired by the spectators. A hackney mare owned by Ald. Jewett shown to halter attracted much attention from the spectators.

The Royal Tokio Japanese Troupe gave a free performance on the grounds yesterday afternoon, and in the evening performed in the amusement hall. A large crowd saw them on both occasions. These clever performers from the Orient execute marvelous feats of jugglery, and their work is most sensational and pleasing. They are a family of little people but everyone is an artist in his or her particular line. They will give two performances daily and are bound to draw big crowds.

The 71st. band played on the grounds yesterday afternoon and in the evening the Fredericton Brass Band gave a concert. The musical arrangements this year are first class and the band boys are doing all in their power to please the management.

The attractions on the pike this year are more numerous and varied than ever before. A huge man eating alligator is being shown in a tent, there is also a two headed calf, a Punch and Judy show and other fearful and wonderful sights to be seen for a dime. The ring toss, ball tossers and jewelry men have been doing a rushing business so far. The management have arranged with the Intercolonial authorities to hold the Marysville suburban train until eleven o'clock each evening during the week.

AT THE GROUNDS TODAY.

Today was ushered in by a heavy downpour of rain, but along towards noon it began to show signs of breaking away. The weather, how-

ever, is still unsettled, and may interfere somewhat with the attendance at the exhibition.

The special attractions are now all here and visitors to the exhibition today will have no lack of amusement. Dolores Vallecia arrived by the late train last evening with her troupe of trained leopards. The animals were shipped in stout cages, and will be exhibited twice daily in a large steel cage erected on the grounds in rear of the main building.

The educated dogs, Japanese troupe and Golden Gate Quintette will give two performances daily in the amusement hall.

Judging in nearly all the departments commenced this morning at 9.30 o'clock and is progressing satisfactorily. Mr. Duncan Anderson of Orilla, Ont., is judging the beef cattle and finished with the Herefords this morning. Mr. W. W. Black of Amherst made a clean sweep of the prize list as was generally expected. Mr. Anderson pronounced the herd of the finest he had ever seen.

Mr. R. H. Stevenson of Lancaster, Ont., who like Mr. Anderson, is an expert on cattle, is engaged in judging the dairy breeds, and is making satisfactory progress.

Dr. Standish of Ontario commenced judging the horses in the large show ring this morning. There are many fine animals being shown and his task is by no means an easy one. Mr. Joseph Landry of the Truro experimental farm is at work judging the poultry.

The fine collection of cut flowers and potted plants shown near the centre of the main building is one of the features of the exhibition. Miss Edith Gregory and Mr. Abraham Alward of this city are the principal exhibitors, and they are showing some splendid asters, gladioli, pansies and a great many other varieties.

The large stuffed moose from the Crown Land Office has been loaned to the exhibition and has been placed on the ground floor of the main building near the main entrance.

The Steamer May Queen arrived from St. John this afternoon with a large number of excursionists on board from St. John and the Steamer Champlain brought a large part from Cole's Island and other points in Queen's County.

The C. P. R. will run a special train tomorrow from Presqu'Isle and intermediate points, arriving here about noon. This train will leave on the return trip at seven o'clock.

The Carpenter's Union of St. John ran an excursion on the May Queen today bringing up a crowd of about 300. The City Cornet Band accompanied the "handlers of the banner and saw." The excursion returns to St. John at 5 o'clock this afternoon.

THE ART GALLERY.

Some very handsome art work is being shown at the exhibition and the sketches give evidence that we have in this vicinity artists of merit.

Miss Grace Palmer daughter of Ex. Mayor Palmer of this city has on exhibition a number of handsome paintings, among others a large picture in water colors on tapestry and two oil paintings, two nicely decorated oil painted cushions and a number of other fine works of art.

Miss Ethel M. Doone of St. Marys has several handsome original oil paintings, and water colours which are much admired by visitors at the fair. They include an oil painting entitled Black Diamonds, also three paintings in oil from still life representing fruit and flowers, a landscape painting in water colors of the Wooden Bridge from St. Marys and that of An Indian Child taken from life. Still life—Flowers and two drawings from cast are also shown by this young lady.

Miss Mildred Walker daughter of Mr. Joseph Walker of this city has several drawings from casts in pencil which are certainly excellent.

Mrs. E. F. Bridges has several paintings which are fine and her pencil drawings from casts need no apology on her part.

Mrs. Arthur J. Ryan has several ice small oil paintings which are receiving much favorable comment. An interesting collection of drawings are those of J. V. W. Hatheway of Springhill a boy only twelve years old whose work in pencil would be certainly creditable to a much older person.

Mr. G. H. Crawford who has several pictures from life done in oil is being complimented on the collection. The charcoal drawings from casts shown by Mr. W. M. Mitchell are considered particularly good by art critics.

WARSHIP EXPLOSION.

(Special to Herald.)

TOKIO, Sept. 17.—Forty of the crew were killed and injured on board the Japanese warship Kashima, by the explosion of a twelve-inch shell within a shield, after target practice near Kure at 4 p. m. September 9th.

The Kashima, under command of Captain Koizumi, reached Kure at 6 p. m., where the wounded were placed in hospital.

The fatalities included a lieutenant, two cadets, and one staff officer.

The exact details regarding the explosion are lacking, but it was terrific, and the ship is badly damaged. The explosion followed an attempt to remove an unexploded shell from a gun.

The majority of the bystanders were fearfully mutilated.

BORDEN INVITED TO TAKE ACTION IF HE DARES.

Although the withdrawal of certain constituency in this province where at the most recent general election a fund of \$25,000 had been expended by the Conservatives without opposition, part of which was ing decided not to put up a candidate, the minister made what in some portions could be called a fighting speech at the meeting which he addressed in Fairville Monday night.

In the course of his address he made some statements in reply to Mr. Borden's purity campaign that would give the opposition leader some moments of hard thinking.

Dr. Pugsley said that the Conservatives in the general election of 1904 had a campaign fund of half a million dollars, and challenged Mr. Borden to bring an action against him if the statement was not true. Then, he said, the facts would be disclosed and the country would have in plain sight evidence that while the Conservative leader is making savage attacks on the political honor of the Liberals, his own party had raised an immense sum of money for the purpose of debauching the electorate.

Dr. Pugsley spoke in a manner that indicated that he could turn to the chapter and verse whenever occasion demanded it. Dr. Pugsley also referred to a
