SUDDEN DEATHOld Gentleman from Lawrence Station
Dropped Dead at St. Stephen.

ST. STEPHEN, Oct. 25.—A sudden death occurred here yesterday afternoon. Winslow G. Small, a respected resident of Lawrence Station, drove into town yesterday morning with his little granddaughter. In the afternoon at about four o'clock they were in the yard at the back of John E. Robinson's store preparing to start for home. Mr. Small was seen to fall suddenly to the ground and when those near at hand reached him it was seen that he was in a serious condition. He was carried into the store and medical aid summoned, but life was extinct before the physician arrived. His remains were forwarded to his home by P. R. last evening. Heart trouble is ascribed as the cause. A wife, one daughter, Mrs. Harrison Dunn, and two sons survive.

LIVES IMPERILLED.The Narrow Escape of St. Andrew's Men
who were nearly Swept to Death by
the Flood Tide

St. Andrew's Beacon: A foolhardy attempt which two young men made to cross Minister's Island bar, on Sunday morning last, almost led to the loss of two human lives. As it was, it caused the drowning of a valuable horse.

On Saturday night, it was arranged between Frank Miller, James Henderson and Eugene Worrell, that the latter, who is employed at the Hartt-Cockley stable, should drive over to the western side of the bar and take them from there to Bartlett's. Worrell started out for the bar a little before eight o'clock on Sunday morning. Finding that neither of the young men was at the appointed rendezvous he crossed over to the island to get them. It was flood tide at the time and the water was rising rapidly on the bar. Miller was found after a few minutes' wait, but Henderson was at another part of the island, and was about setting out in a boat to cross over.

As the carriage with Worrell and Miller drove down to the bar, Henderson shouted to them to go back, that it was dangerous to cross. They pushed on, however, and Henderson who knew something of the perilous condition of the bar at that time of tide—having lost a brother at the place two years ago—rowed with all his might toward them.

In the meantime the horse had lost his footing, and Miller was thrown out of the carriage. He went down

once or twice and then succeeded in grasping the horse. Worrell fell out a moment afterwards and after a desperate attempt to stem the current, got hold of the wagon and clung to it.

The two youths were well nigh exhausted when Henderson reached them with the boat. Exercising the greatest caution to prevent them from upsetting the boat and imperiling his life, he managed to get both of the young men into the boat. By this time the horse had ceased struggling, having been drowned by the waves which broke over him, and being unable to swim owing to the weight of the wagon on him.

The half-drowned men were rowed quickly to the island and a telephone message was sent into town for Dr. Wade. He drove out to the bar, was boated across, and rendered whatever assistance was necessary. The young men speedily recovered from the effects of their experience. Miller was in the worst shape, having been kicked in the breast and head by the horse while endeavoring to get him loose from the wagon.

The dead body of the horse was afterwards towed ashore and relieved of harness and wagon.

Recent experiences in crossing this bar when the tide is upon it should dissuade others from needlessly exposing their lives. It is risky enough when the tide is ebbing but when the tide is on the flood it is but courting death to attempt to cross.

COOPER'S TESTIMONYRespecting Quebec Bridge Collapse
Surprised and Shocked President
Parent

QUEBEC, October 25.—Hon. S. N. Parent, president of the Quebec Bridge and Railway Company, was interviewed on the subject of the story told by Engineer Cooper in New York to the Royal Commission. Mr. Parent said that he could not believe that Cooper had been correctly reported, so serious were the misstatements and exaggerations imputed to him in the reports from New York. He had no desire to interfere at all in the investigation which was in progress, but he could not allow palpable misstatements of fact to go unnoticed.

In regard to the statement that the company had no efficient engineer, he declared that Cooper himself had full control and that McClure was Cooper's own choice of competent men to control the work of the Phoenix Bridge Company at the bridge site.

Speaking of the alleged statement that the executive of the bridge could have made and should have made repairs to the defective member which would have cost but a trifle and safeguarded the structure when the Phoenix Company failed to do so, Parent said that the chief of the Quebec Bridge Company executive, so far as these technical details were concerned, was Cooper himself. He had ample authority in every respect and was paid \$7,000 a year by the company to take full charge of the work. The bridge company completely relied on Cooper for the completion of the work, and nothing during the progress of the work was done without Cooper being made acquainted with it by Mr. Hoare, the Quebec Bridge and Railway Co.'s chief engineer on the works here.

Moreover, said Mr. Parent, Cooper himself had testified to him in New York as to his confidence in Hoare.
