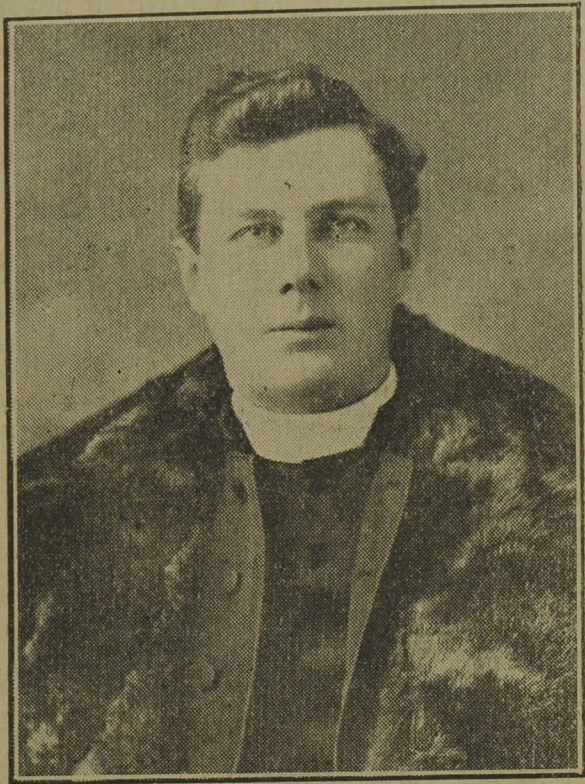


IMPOSING CEREMONY

New Bell for St. Anthony's Church Blessed
by Bishop Casey Last Evening--The
Bishop's Sermon.

Another mark of the devotion of the congregation of St. Anthony's church towards their parish work was given last evening when His Lordship Bishop Casey of St. John, blessed in a solemn manner the new bell which lately arrived from Baltimore.

The ceremony took place at 7.30 o'clock in the presence of a congregation which completely filled the sacred edifice. Bishop Casey conducted the ceremony and was assisted by Rev. Fathers LeBlanc of Kingsclear and Carney of this city. Rev. Fathers McGill of Caribou, Me., Hannigan of this city, and Ryan the energetic and hard working and beloved pastor of the congregation were also present in the sanctuary.

The bell was placed in the chancel of the church, immediately in front of the altar, and was admired by all present. The pretty church was well lighted, and the altar being ablaze with scores of candles, presented a grand appearance.

THE BISHOP'S SERMON

At the conclusion of washing and blessing the bell, Bishop Casey delivered a most eloquent sermon, which held the attention of the large congregation present from the opening sentence until the closing remarks.

In opening His Lordship congratulated the congregation on the series of successful works they had carried out, and he said the magnificent bell which had been just blessed was the crowning glory. The ceremony was a new one to those in St. Mary's parish. The Bishop continuing explained the ceremony, which he said was the same service and in the same Latin language as used by the Catholics in all parts of the world. This is one mark of the Catholic or universal church, which is not for the English, French, German or any other nation, but for all. As Christ had no nation but had "come to seek and save all that which was lost," so with the church which had carried that message down through the ages for nineteen hundred years, and will continue to do so until the end of time. In the midst of our struggles and trials in this world we are apt to forget God. The people of the twentieth century are up-to-date and busy and many of them forget the Christ who died for them. This is a mistake for which they will be called to account. We will be asked "Did you believe in Christ and practice His law?" and on this will rest our fate. Christ came down from heaven, became man, lived thirty-three years on earth, doing good, and ended on Calvary's Cross to save that which was lost. What was lost? Why the human race, said His Lordship. He arose in triumph on the third day, Christ said to His apostles, "Go in to the world and teach all nations." He said to Peter, "Upon this rock I will build my church and the gates of hell will not prevail against it," and despite the powers of the devil and of many wicked men within and without, they have not prevailed against her, and if, as we must believe, Christ has kept His word, that church still stands in the world, and to be universal it must have the same language and same ceremonies in all parts of the world.

The Bishop then gave an explanation of certain doctrines of the church in regard to Baptism, Forgiveness of Sin, and The Real Presence, and continuing said that as every person who said "Lord! Lord!" would not be saved, so also every person who was a member of the Catholic church would not be saved. People are not looking so much at what the church teaches as at what its members are doing, at their piety, their honesty, their purity, their justice and their paying of their lawful debts. "Are you," said His Lordship, "illustrating in your daily lives the grand truths the church teaches? Are you letting your light so shine before the world that you are a good

example to others, and a credit to your church? A Catholic who does not live well never should have been baptized."

In closing His Lordship expressed his appreciation of the generous gift to the church of the very excellent bell, and wished especially to thank Mr. William Boyle who was the principal donor. He prayed God to bless the parish of St. Mary's and wished them every success.

Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was then given by Bishop Casey, and the congregation received the Bishop's blessing. At the conclusion of the service Bishop Casey gave the bell the first ring, and was followed by Mr. William Boyle, the principal donor. Then the priests and members of the congregation, each in turn, passed up the aisle and rang the bell.

The new bell, which was purchased from the McShane bell foundry, Baltimore, is a very large one, weighing more than one thousand pounds. The inscription on the face of the bell reads "Anthony William, presented to St. Anthony's church, St. Mary's parish, N. B., by William Boyle and parishioners of St. Mary's Oct. 24, 1907." Rev. John J. Ryan, pastor; Rt. Rev. Timothy Casey, D.D., Bishop of St. John.

A unique departure in jumper frocks is shown in this sketch, the bolero overblouse being of an entirely new and original design. The Mikado sleeves are attached to the overblouse, and the latter is attached to the pretty box-pleated skirt in back and front by the strap extensions. The guimpe is included in the pattern, but is made separately. As shown the dress is made of shepherd's plaid, and the guimpe of lawn trimmed with lace insertion and edging; but for cold weather wear the guimpe might be made of silk or of fine French flannel.

For the medium size the guimpe requires 1 1/2 yards of 36 inch material, and the dress 3 1/2 yards of 27 inch material.

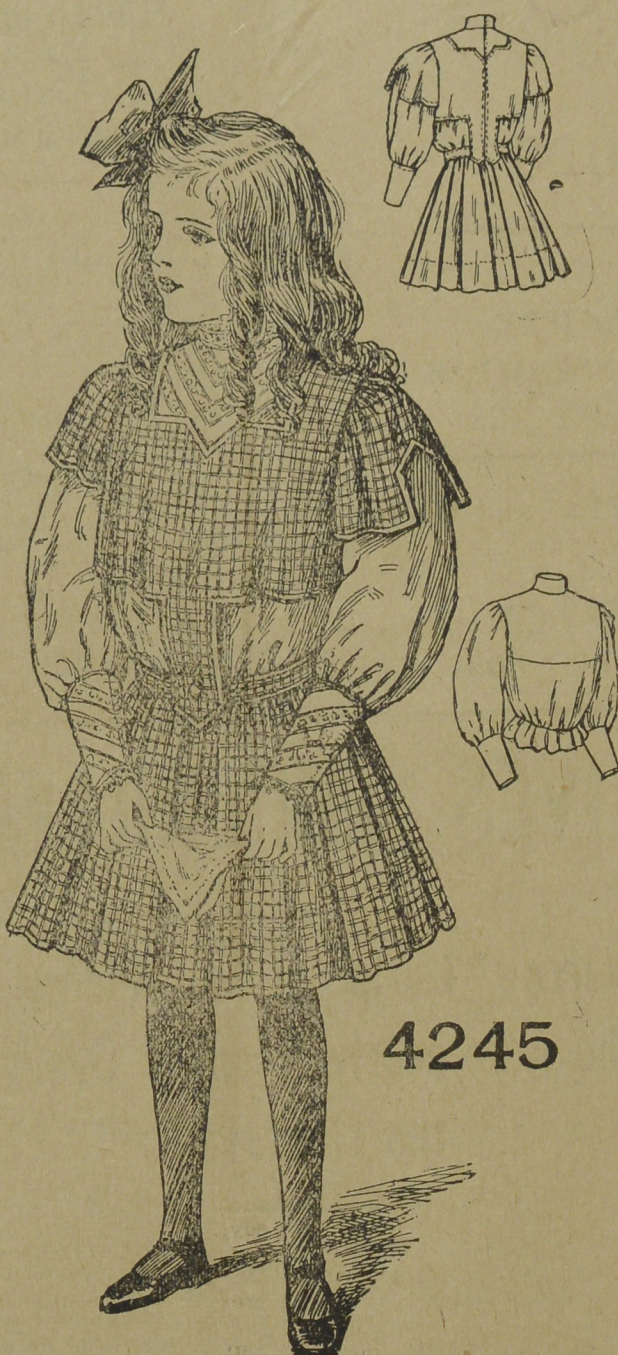

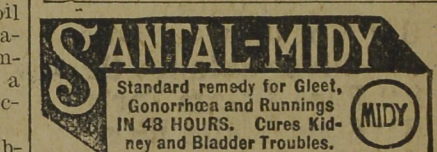
