

A LOST GIRL

Kept Diary of Her Own Growing Insanity--Finding of Notes Leads to Belief New York Student Took Her Life

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—Evidence that a fear of insanity from over-study was responsible for her disappearance was found in a personal diary kept by Miss Alice B. Bennett, winner of Helen Gould scholarship entitling her to a post graduate course at the New York University, who has been missing from her home at No. 10 East Eleventh Street since last Monday.

Records in the diary covering a period of two years indicates that Miss Bennett had gradually felt herself losing her reason and had expressed the wish that she would die before she became hopelessly insane. These revelations as to her own fears have led her friends to believe that she may have committed suicide.

Miss Bennett's diary, containing a remarkable and minute account of her actions which inspired her belief that she was becoming mentally unbalanced, was found among her effects by Dr. J. Rice Gibbs, at whose residence the young woman made her home. The book contained a complete record of the daily events in the girl's life and showed how for the last few years she had battled against the

fate which she believed to be in store for her. The latter pages reveal that in the last few months she had become convinced that her struggle against insanity would prove unavailing and that she was anxious that death should end her mental suffering.

From the notes which the young woman had transcribed it appears that her own actions and thoughts had furnished her with the means by which she was to pass judgment on her own mental condition. The diary relates how the fear first came to her, and how, after making the discovery, she kept a careful observation of her actions, and had finally decided that she was being driven insane by over application to her studies. Then is recorded the story of her fight to keep away from her books, a struggle, which ended in the triumph of an overpowering craving for study.

Miss Bennett wrote also that she had visited specialists in insanity with regard to her case, but that they had been unable to help her in any way. It was this fact that at last caused her to long for death believing that she would be better off dead than living.

TWO WOMEN CLAIM HIM.

W. R. McConnell of Toronto Has Marital Troubles.

BUFFALO, Aug. 15.—The marital woes of William H. McConnell of Toronto, who was arrested on Friday night on a warrant sworn out by a woman who says she is Mr. McConnell's wife and who alleges that her husband ran away from her, leaving her without any means of support and with two children, were aired in the Police Court yesterday.

The Buffalo police located McConnell, who is now employed as a collector for a local firm, at No. 66 Whitney Place with another wife, with whom he came from Toronto last April.

Her name was Miss Pearl Holliday. Wife No. 1, on her arrival here was greatly surprised to learn of the second marriage and she told her story to Judge Murphy. After the case had been called in the Police Court and adjourned at the request of counsel for Mrs. McConnell No. 1, the police talked to McConnell and he said to them: "Mrs. McConnell, my first wife, is an habitual drunkard. That's why I left her. I am willing to take the two children I had by her and give them a home with Mrs. McConnell (No. 2) and myself."

Friday of this week was set down as the day on which the case will be straightened out.

MILLIONS FOR CARS

The G. T. P. Will Soon Have Spent \$7,000,000 This Year for Locomotives and Engines.

Montreal Aug. 15.—With the daily delivery of engines, passenger coaches and freight cars, the Grand Trunk Railway is rapidly approaching the day when the last of nearly \$7,000,000 worth of rolling stock will have been received by them during the present year. There were in all about sixty passenger coaches ordered, costing about \$12,000 each, laid down in Montreal, which makes a total of \$720,000. Thirty of these have already been delivered.

There were 100 engines ordered, and of these sixty have been received. The average cost is \$15,000 each, or an aggregate of \$1,500,000.

The tremendous increase in freight traffic may be imagined by the delivery of 5,200, and the average cost is \$850 each, so that the great sum of \$4,420,000 is being spent for freight cars alone. With the daily delivery of many of these the G. T. P. people are hoping to get well on the way to lift the present congestion.

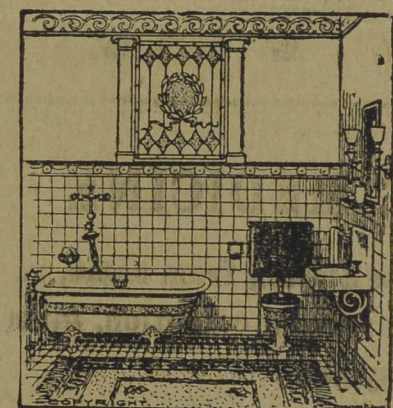
